
Data visualisation

- potential to migrate 'State of the Wards' data to this platform in the long term




User's selections from Fig 1.5









Growth

Population growth






- Manchester was fastest growing city in England between 2001 and 2011
- Official figures show rate of growth has slowed
- Local intelligence is being used to produce more detailed local forecasts which will be available at a later date

Economic growth




- GM South GVA rose by 3.8% during 2012 (UK=1.6%)
- Business growth outpacing Core Cities
- Number of jobs grew by 3.2% (2011-12)
 (England = 0.5%)
- Manchester has highest average workplace wage of all Core Cities but one of lowest resident wages



Skills



- Proportion of residents with no qualifications continues to fall (13% in 2013)
- Proportion of residents with Level 2 qualifications continues to rise (70% in 2013) [ward range: 44% to 92%]

Children



- School readiness = 47% (England = 52%)
- Level 4 achievement at KS2 = 75% (UK = 75%)
- 5 GCSEs at KS4 = 53% (England = 59%)
- Number of LACs rose by 5% during 2013-14 to stand at 1,374
- 36% of children living in poverty

Health



- Life expectancy at age 65 improving but almost 13% lower than England average
- 31% of remaining life (at age 65) spent disability free compared to 44% nationally
- Mortality from preventable causes almost double national rate
- Successful drug treatments for opiate clients rose to 8.1% in 2014, compared to 7.8% nationally
- Alcohol-related hospital admissions fallen for two consecutive years but 51% above national rate.
- Under-18 conception rate continues to fall: now 45 per 1,000



Community safety



- Recent trend of reduced victim-based crime reversed with 3.7% increase during 2013-14
- Thefts up by 4.6%
- Personal robberies down by 7.8%
- Offences linked to violence with injury down by 3%
- Firearms discharges down from 93 in 2007-08 to nine in 2012-13
- First-time entrants to Youth Justice System down by 31% in 2012-13 (to 704 per 100,000)
- The number of accidental primary (dwelling) fires fell by 2.5% to 501.

Environment



- CO₂ levels reduced by 16% between 2005 and 2010 against target of 41% by 2020
- NO₂ targets met in south Manchester but exceeded in Piccadilly Gardens and Oxford Road
- Proportion of household waste recycled or composted fell slightly during latest year, reversing upward trend
- Overall reduction in reported fly-tipping

Satisfaction and wellbeing

- 'Satisfaction with local area' and 'satisfaction with life' remain fairly constant and continue to be related to levels of deprivation
- Percentage of residents that feel they belong to neighbourhood increased from 76% to 79%
- 34 million visits to MCC's cultural and recreational facilities
- Galleries experience busiest year ever
- Sports participation rose from 36% to 41% (national = 35%)
