3. Key Decisions

A key decision, as defined in the Council's Constitution is an executive decision, which is likely:

- To result in the Council incurring expenditure which is, or the making of savings which are, significant having regard to the Council's budget for the service or function to which the decision relates, or
- To be significant in terms of its effects on communities living or working in an area comprising two or more wards in the area of the city.

The Council Constitution defines 'significant' as being expenditure or savings (including the loss of income or capital receipts) in excess of £500k, providing that is not more than 10% of the gross operating expenditure for any budget heading in the in the Council's Revenue Budget Book, and subject to other defined exceptions.

Summary

At its meeting in July 2013, the Committee made the following recommendation: To request that the Assistant Chief Executive provide further information on the Digital Champions, including where they are based, and an update on progress with Code Clubs at a suitable date.

1. Introduction

1.1 The purpose of this paper is to update the Economy Scrutiny Committee, as requested, on progress made for the Digital City Strategy skills action plan, specifically outlining progress for the development of the Go ON Manchester programme and the increase in the number of Code Clubs in the city.

2. Go ON Manchester

2.1 Recruitment of Digital Champions and Go ON business partners

2.2 Manchester is delivering a Go ON Manchester campaign (a local version of the national Go On initiative), supporting digital literacy and inclusion and encouraging residents and businesses to make the most from life online.

2.3 Over the summer there has been a significant focus on recruitment events and a targeted approach to increase the number of Go ON Manchester business partners who can pledge their staff to volunteer as Digital Champions. We now have a network of over 2,100 Digital Champions willing to support residents across the city, with a target of 3,500 by the end of the financial year. This is an increase of over 1,200 Champions since the last report to Economy Scrutiny in July of this year.

2.4 Digital Champions offer as much or as little time as they can afford and the support they offer ranges from those that are willing to help their family members and neighbours; to those that are willing to regularly volunteer for MAES or in ICT Access centres.


2.5 There has also been a considerable increase in the numbers of Go ON business partners, with local, national and international businesses showing Manchester's campaign their support. New business partners include: Manchester City Football Club, CodeComputerLove, Microsoft, Hyper Island, UKFast, Midshire Business Systems, Orchard Recruitment and MediaCo.

2.6 Once recruited, Digital Champions are supported by training from Manchester Adult Education Service, tips and tricks and volunteering opportunities, as well as peer to peer support on the website.


3.0 Geographical spread of Digital Champions

3.1 There are Digital Champions both from across the city and from across Greater Manchester. Those from outside the city are, in the main, where Champions have pledged from one of our business partners.

3.2 **Map 1**: below identifies the locations of Digital Champions by ward, for the Champions who have provided their postcode. Although there are a concentration of Digital Champions across Hulme, Ardwick and Bradford, those Champions have identified that they are willing to support people in other areas, not the area they live or work.



3.3 **Map 2:** identifies the locations of Champions outside the Manchester boundaries, willing to support Manchester residents.



4.0 Digital Champion activities

4.1 When surveyed this summer, the Digital Champions were asked to identify who they are willing to offer support to and for some examples of the sort of help they have given to date. Over 58% of Champions identified that they have supported friends and family, 63% supporting community groups that have requested help, 52% helping individual residents.

4.2 There is a wide variety of support on offer, from simple support such as 'getting access to the internet', 'helping people to use a mouse and keyboard' and 'helping family with Skype and social networks' to much more involved support; examples include:

- Running a digital drop-in session for 2 hours, twice a week,
- Assisting at a web course at my local library and Ladybarn Community Centre,
- Ran a session on using Picasa (photo library and editing software),
- Cleaning machines of unwanted software and identifying what software may be required to help people achieve their aims,
- Provide help, support and training to ladies who attend my women's group. Provide support to a local charity to set up a website and electronic PAYE,
- Help people fill out claims for their benefits, print out important documents....upload documents such as CVs; and
- Ran a free seminar in Digital Marketing.

4.3 Go ON business partners have also offered other businesses support too. For example, Manchester Digital, the regional trade association for the creative digital sector, offered free tickets to their e-commerce workshop 'Cartologie Elements'; and 3 Sheep, a digital engagement agency, are running four free Go ON workshops covering the following topics:

- Creating a digital marketing strategy
- Commissioning a mobile app
- Making social media work
- Getting more from digital video marketing
- 4.3 Businesses are also supporting Manchester residents, for example:
 - Supporting digital drop in sessions
 - Providing incentive competition prizes to encourage further sign
 - Providing spaces, technology and expertise for support sessions
 - Providing second hand equipment where it is most needed

5.0 Digital Days

5.1 'Digital Days' were developed following feedback from residents and Champions. During the Go ON bus engagement sessions, residents old us that they didn't know where to go for help or who would be able to help them. They also told us that they often felt intimidated by walking into ICT access centres and asking for support.

5.2 Digital Days were set up to offer friendly, drop-in advice in localities. They are a consistent, accessible and promoted digital skills support offer for residents in locations that have free to access PCs (ICT access centres, libraries and community centres) and are staffed by Digital Champions, business partners, library staff and MAES tutors. For the duration of the pilot's two hour sessions, the total number of volunteer hours being offered as a direct result of this campaign will have been more than 150 hours.

5.3 To date this approach has been tested in the North SRF. The pilot went live Monday 30 September for four weeks. The venues are: Manchester Miners Community and Arts Centre, The Avenue Library, North City Library, Harpurhey Neighbourhood Project, Crumpsall Library and the Whitemoss Centre.

5.4 Attendance at Digital Days is growing over the pilot period. Over 45 people have actively visited a participating centre to attend a session so far (as of 14 October 2013), with ICT Access Centres proving more popular than libraries. Attendees have been seeking assistance with anything from basic skills on how to use a computer, navigating the internet, how to shop online, search and apply for jobs or to how to set up an MCC online account. One resident was shown how to navigate the internet, was helped to set up an email address that he can access on his phone, and is now planning to purchase a laptop, all directly as a result of attendance at the drop in sessions. The next step would be to encourage those supported through Digital Days to become digital champions themselves.

5.5 Given the success of the pilot period to date and the interest shown in the previous Go ON Manchester bus approach, it is recommended that the Digital Days model is rolled out across the city in conjunction with Neighbourhood Regeneration Teams.

6.0 Code Clubs

6.1 Code Clubs are an after-school club for 9-11 year old, staffed by volunteers to teach kids basic coding. Code Club is a not-for-profit organisation, providing the curriculum for term time sessions. In March 2013, Economy Scrutiny committed to supporting the Code Club target of increasing the number of primary schools in the city with a club by 25% by the end of 2014. At that time, there were a total of 5 Primary School Code Clubs (3.8%) operating in the city. A further 15 schools in the city have either recently established a Code Club or are working with the Council and Manchester Schools' Alliance to secure volunteers to start a Club in the coming months. This means we are on track to achieve the 2014 target for primary schools. We also have interested High Schools, running clubs both for their primaries and their own year 7 students. Chorlton High School is the first to set up a club for their 11 year olds.

6.2 Over the summer there has been considerable activity to identify volunteers to run and support Code Clubs across the city. Manchester Metropolitan University have been heavily promoting the volunteer opportunity to their students in their School of Computing and Faculty of Education since their return in October, to date over 10 students have volunteered. They have included Code Club volunteering in their MMU Futures programme, designed to support students to enhance their employability and support their local communities. Volunteering for Code Club can help students earn points towards an MMU Futures Awards http://www.mmu.ac.uk/students/futures/. MMU have also offered to include volunteering for Code Clubs as part of the curriculum for the new BSc (Hons) Advanced Games Design course from September 2014. The University of Manchester have been promoting the volunteering opportunities to their students too.

6.3 Manchester Digital have offered to support the identification of volunteers from the Creative Digital sector as part of their schools programme – encouraging their members to commit time and resource to working more closely with schools and the development of the talent pipeline. They are in the process of developing fundraising activity to support the growth of Code Clubs in the city. Other businesses in the city have expressed an interest in supporting Code Clubs and work is taking place to identify how best to take this forward.

6.4 Code Clubs have been impressed by the approach Manchester has taken to increase the numbers of Clubs – stating that we have been delivering their growth programme for them – and have asked the Council to join an official partnership. The partnership consists of Manchester based universities, businesses and the Council. The partnership will coordinate activity in the city, ensure that businesses are celebrated for their support and offer opportunities to students to improve their employability. All activities that Manchester has already undertaken. The only difference is that business partners will be asked to make a small financial

contribution to the partnership to support the organisation and curriculum development for Code Clubs. Oldham College has also asked to join the partnership.

7.0 Next steps

7.1 Go ON Manchester – the focus of development for Go ON is the ongoing recruitment of volunteers to meet the target of 3,500 and the development and roll out of Digital Days across the rest of the city.

7.2 Code Clubs – to develop the formal partnership with Code Clubs, continuing to identify volunteers to support Manchester schools with their own Code Club.

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
