The Council Constitution defines 'significant' as being expenditure or savings (including the loss of income or capital receipts) in excess of £500k, providing that is not more than 10% of the gross operating expenditure for any budget heading in the in the Council's Revenue Budget Book, and subject to other defined exceptions.

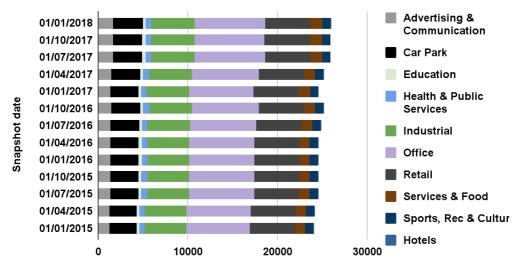

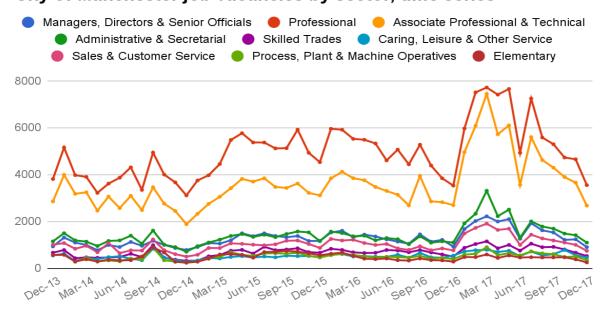

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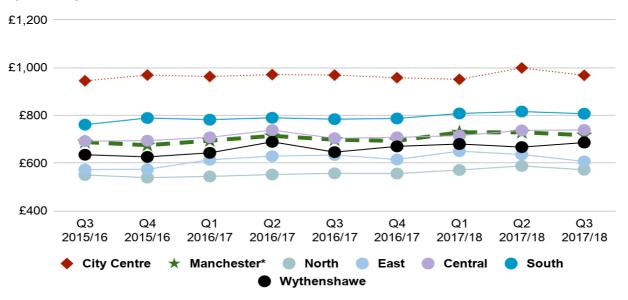

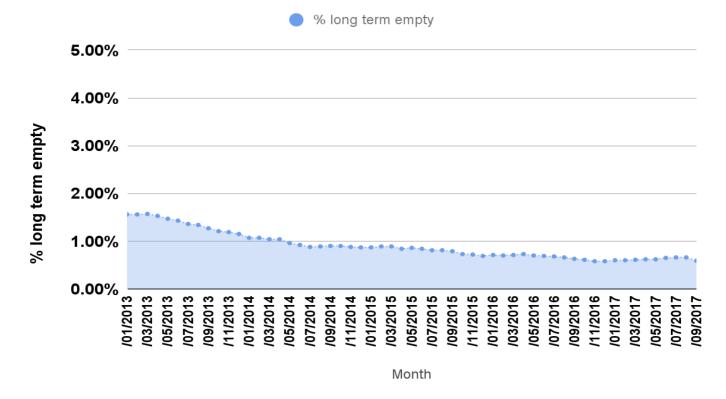


Rental market data

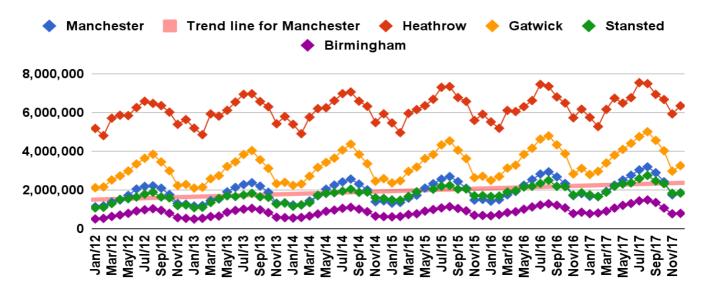

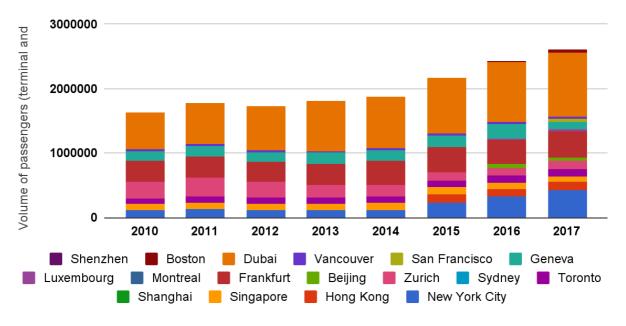


Business travel to and from Manchester airport

This section of the dashboard tracks the expansion of flights from Manchester to the major financial centres of the world. The ranking utilised for financial centres is taken from the <u>Global Financial Centres index</u> which measures the competitiveness of centres using a variety of indices. The ranking quoted below is from index 22 which was published in September 2017. London remains at position one in the index.

The chart below shows the month on month total number of passengers on flights to and from Manchester for the *current* top twenty financial centres from 2010 to 2017. There were no flights to Melbourne or Tokyo during the period so these airports do not appear in the chart legend.
