1. Introduction

1.1 This is a health update paper produced by North, Central and South Manchester Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCGs) for the Health and Wellbeing Overview and Scrutiny Committee. It provides a brief summary of issues or news items that may be of interest to the Committee.

2. Manchester Single Hospital Service Review

2.1 Manchester's Locality Plan is underpinned by three 'pillars': the development of a Single Hospital System, a Single Commissioning System and a Local Care Organisation. This is an update on the progress of the Manchester Single Hospital Service Review.

2.2 The Review was established to consider two areas:

- Stage One: Assess the potential benefits of developing a Single Hospital Service in Manchester
- Stage Two: Appraise the most appropriate and effective governance arrangements to deliver the identified benefits

Following each stage, a report will be presented to Manchester's Health and Wellbeing Board.

2.3 The Review is being led by Sir Jonathan Michael and has had the full support of the three Manchester Trusts – Central Manchester Foundation Trust, Pennine Acute Trust and University Hospital of South Manchester. The Review will not consider the specifics of future service locations.

2.4 There are a number of reasons for this work to take place:

- Health outcomes in Manchester are poor and existing arrangements do not serve the best interests of the local population.
- Care is fragmented with unacceptable variation in the standards of care provided to patients in different parts of the city.
- Opportunities to work together to improve services for patients are being missed.
- Duplication exists in some areas while there are gaps in others.
- There is a need to raise all services to the standard of the best
- System wide financial and operational pressures with significant workforce challenges

2.5 The Stage One report has been completed and was undertaken with extensive engagement and involvement of key stakeholders including a large number of clinicians. The Stage One Report has identified that a Single Hospital Service in Manchester would deliver benefits in the following areas: Quality of Care, Financial and Operational Efficiency, Patient Experience, Training and Education, Workforce, and Research.

2.6 The Review recommended that:

- A single hospital service in Manchester should be developed to deliver the benefits identified in the Stage One Report.
- The second stage of the review should be commenced.
- The development of a single commissioning function and a Locality Care Organisation need to be implemented alongside the creation of a single hospital service.
- Commissioner consideration should be given to the most appropriate configuration of surgical oncology services.

The Trust Boards have indicated their support for the Stage One Report and the Health and Wellbeing Board (HWBB) accepted the recommendations on 27th April 2016. The conclusions from the next stage of the Review will be considered by the HWBB at their June meeting.

3. Manchester Mental Health and Social Care Trust Transaction

3.1 In November 2015, NHS Improvement (formerly the Trust Development Authority) agreed to a managed process, entered into collaboratively by all partners, which will ensure the safe transfer of services from Manchester Mental Health and Social Care Trust to another service provider or partnership of providers. The following provides an update on progress.

3.2 After concluding a comprehensive options appraisal and in line with the Greater Manchester Devolution agenda, NHS Improvement (NHSI) approval was given to a transaction process open to local competition within the Greater Manchester footprint. The competition will be evaluated on the basis of an Acquisition Proposals submitted by the potential acquirers.

3.3 NHSI invited Acquisition Proposals from the competing providers (Greater Manchester West Mental Health NHS foundation Trust and Pennine Care Mental Health NHS foundation Trust) on the 14th March. Selection of the new Provider should take place by the end of August 2017 and service users and staff will be involved in the bid evaluation process.

3.4 A substantive item on this matter will come to the September Health Scrutiny Committee meeting.

4. Children and Young People's Mental Health and Well-being

4.1 The recent report of the Children and Young Peoples Mental Health Taskforce, Future in Mind, emphasises the need to make it easier for children and young people to access high quality mental health services when they need it.

4.2 Manchester's Children and Young People's Mental Health and Well-being transformation plan link sets out a clear and aligned ambition to transform the design and delivery of a local offer of mental health and wellbeing services for children and young people across the city of Manchester.
