# 1.0 Introduction

1.1 At its meeting on 25 February 2016 the Health Scrutiny Committee agreed to launch a member led Task and Finish Group to monitor the transition of Home Care provision to the strength based model approach for both older people and people with physical disabilities in the context of the Care Act 2014.. It was decided that the scrutiny process was the most appropriate means by which to carry out this investigation.

1.2 At its meeting on 25 May 2016, the terms of reference and proposed work programme for the Home Care Task and Finish Group were formally approved by the Health Scrutiny Committee.

# 3.0 Objectives

3.1 The objectives and key lines of enquiry were agreed by the Health Scrutiny Committee at their meetings on the 26 May. The full terms of reference are attached at Appendix 1 to this report.

3.2 The objectives of the Task and Finish Group were:

3.2.1 To understand the current delivery of Home Care for disabled people and older people.

3.2.2 To review the findings that are relevant to Home Care of the recent Adult Social Care consultation exercise.

3.2.3 To understand the views of both service users and providers

3.2.4 To understand the proposed offer for the future delivery of Home Care.

# 4.0 Key Lines of Enquiry

4.1 The key lines of enquiry identified were:

4.1.1 The group will consider the current delivery model of Home Care.

4.1.2 The group will consider evidence from service users and a range of providers.

4.1.3 The group will conduct appropriate site visits to witness services provided and hear the views of service users.

4.1.4 The group will consider the future delivery of an integrated model of service delivery.

## 6.0 What is Home Care?

The NHS Choices website describes homecare as:

"<sup>1</sup>Homecare comes in many forms and has many names used to describe it, including home help, care attendants and "carers" (not to be confused with unpaid family or friends who care for you).

Homecare can suit you if you need:

- personal care, such as washing or dressing
- housekeeping or domestic work, such as vacuuming
- cooking or preparing meals
- nursing and health care
- companionship

Homecare can be very flexible, in order to meet your needs, and the same person or agency may be able to provide some or all of these options for the duration of your care:

- long-term 24-hour care
- short breaks for an unpaid family carer
- emergency care
- day care

• sessions ranging from 15-minute visits to 24-hour assistance and everything in between

# 7.0 Current Delivery of Homecare

#### Relevant Objectives:

#### Relevant Key Lines of Enquiry:

4.1.1 The group will consider the current delivery model of Home Care.

7.1 At its meeting held on 6 July 2016 members received a presentation which provided an overview of the recent consultation with adult social care citizens; the current homecare provision in the city; current challenges and issues and outlined the potential areas for scrutiny by the group.

7.2 A number of key issues and challenges were raised with current homecare provision including that the current system was fragmented and subject to workforce issues across the sector, providers were struggling to meet demand and/or make a profit and hospitals were experiencing delayed discharges.

7.3 In respect of the recent consultation with adult social care citizens members were advised that the response rate was low with 84 responses received from a total of 5,200 service users contacted. Key outcomes included that 57% either agreed or strongly agreed with the use of Community Assets, and that 71% either agreed or strongly agreed wit the concept of a good week. Members were advised that a review had not been carried out since 2008, largely because few complaints were received regarding homecare providers and their risk ratings monitored on a continual basis by the Council were generally low.

## 8.0 The views of Service Users and Home Care Providers

8.1 In order to consider evidence from service users and a range of providers members agreed to carry out a number of site visits to witness the services provided and hear the views of service users. Members were provided with information leaflets 'Care in Extra Care Housing' and information on the schemes in Manchester which they could visit.

8.2 Visits were carried out as follows:

8.3 Members reported their findings back to their next meeting held on 2 November 2016. Their feedback was generally positive and members reported that the visits had provided valuable insight into the services provided and the views of those using the services.

8.4 Providers of Homecare were also invited to the meeting held on 2 November 2016 and included representatives from a range of providers including Premier Care, Medacs, CASA and MRL Healthcare. All providers reported issues around the recruitment and training of homecare workers. Other identified issues included complicated relationships with commissioners and GPS and difficulties delivering an outcome based model alongside ensuring continuity of care for service users.

9.1 At its meeting on 19 December 2016 members received a report on the plans for the development and implementation of a new model of homecare, where homecare is an integral part of wider health and social care delivery within integrated neighbourhood teams. Members were made aware at their meeting held on 6 July 2016 that Trafford Council and Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) were leading on a Cost Based Analysis (CBA) of potential alternatives to the current homecare system which would form part of a bid for transformation funding at a Greater Manchester level. Members were now further advised that Greater Manchester Directors of Adult Social Services had developed a programme to deliver improved outcomes for adults within a sustainable health and care system called 'Adult Social care- Radical Reform at Scale and Pace'. Two key issues were developing the skills of the homecare workforce to carry out low level nursing tasks to support medical professionals and free them up to focus on other tasks.

9.2 Members were broadly supportive of the proposals and the approach, which would be a Greater Manchester approach. Since the Local Care Organisation (LCO) would not be fully operational until 2018 members were advised that an alliance contract would be used in the interim similar to a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). An Interim CEO of the LCO had recently been appointed and would commence employment in January 2017 with the aim of getting services established by September 2017.

# 10.0 Conclusions and recommendations

# **Recruitment and Retention of Homecare Workers**

10.1 To note there are issues around the recruitment and retention of homecare workers. To welcome the proposals at Greater Manchester level to employ enhanced care workers making homecare jobs more attractive by offering a career path into wider health and social care roles. To support the proposals for a robust training programme to be developed that includes equalities training, and to recommend this leads to a recognised qualification; and one that is also recognised outside of Greater Manchester. To recommend that Health Scrutiny Committee monitor this development going forward.

10.2 To recommend that further consideration is given to how homecare workers can be encouraged to remain working in the sector. Including that trade unions are consulted with and given recognition, in particular by homecare providers, and that all staff are paid a living wage. 10.3 To welcome the impact proposals for employing enhanced care workers will have on District nurses and other medical professionals; freeing them up to focus on more complex tasks in a health and social care system subject to increasing demands.

10.4. To welcome the fact that care visits lasting 15 minutes are only used for welfare checks and not for involved care tasks (such as washing and cooking). To recommend that a 30 minute minimum for care visits which require care tasks to be performed is formalised as the LCO is commissioned and that consideration is given to improving the use of technology to assess whether a home visit is required; in particular with respect to short welfare checks.

# **Our Manchester:**

10.5 In light of the Council's 'Our Manchester' Strategy future homecare services should be tailored to individual circumstances and local requirements.

10.6 To provide the Final Report of the Homecare Task and Finish Group to Age Friendly Manchester, and to receive their comments at a future meeting of the Health Scrutiny Committee.

10.7 To recommend that the role of the voluntary sector is included in the commissioning prospectus of the Local Care Organisation so that the provider is required to consider how it can work with the sector to improve outcomes for the residents who use these services.

## Night care:

10.8 Members recommended that increased visits in the night or 'on call' be made available. Members also welcomed news of a 'Sitting Service' being commissioned and requested the details be circulated to all councillors for information.

## Hospital discharge:

10.9 Members recommend closer working between social services and hospitals in identifying and assessing care needs to ensure a smoother pathway of transition from hospital to home. Members also stressed the importance of good communication between the hospital and General Practitioners (GPs).

## Extra Care:

10.10 To request that on-site catering be provided; or if not possible be provided by a local caterer instead to strengthen community ties and consideration be given to the use of a co-operative model. To request that officers explore whether more Extra Care could be tailored to existing conditions and where new technology was available how this could this be used.

## **Recommendations Review**

10.11 To recommend that Health Scrutiny receives reports both in September 2017 and March 2018 from health commissioners reviewing the recommendations of the Task and Finish Group, and outlining how they have been put into practice.
