1.0 Introduction

- 1.1 On 21 September 2017, the Policy Committee considered a report seeking members' approval for consultation on a proposed revision to the Council's Licensing Policy to include a new special policy for the Ancoats and New Islington Development Framework area.
- 1.2 A 12-week public consultation exercise was undertaken from 6 November 2017 to 29 January 2018 in accordance with the proposals approved by the Policy Committee.
- 1.3 Members are advised that amendments to the draft policy may only be made if a relevant response has been received during the consultation period.

2.0 Results of the Consultation

2.1 A total of 274 responses were received during the consultation period. The consultation was anonymous although responses were submitted from local residents, residents associations, licensing solicitors/consultants, Manchester Pub and Club Network, and local businesses and landlords.

Setting a terminal hour

2.2 Overall, there was opposition against any time being set for licensable activities to conclude in the framework area (Table 1):

- 2.3 The responses opposed to any terminal hour being set are included at Appendix 1.
- 2.4 People objected to a terminal hour being set mainly on the basis of: (*points in bold signify the main recurring themes):
 - Likelihood of stifling development of the area*
 - Damaging impact on the reputation of the area and the city (seen as out of character)*
 - Likelihood of displacement to adjacent areas (e.g. Northern Quarter) therefore less attractive to new commercial investment
 - Negative effect on the vibrancy and culture/arts/creative scene (both of area and the city)*
 - Limiting choice of residents and forcing them to use other areas
 - Does not recognise the positive impacts of licensed premises in an area

- A standard terminal hour would create a peak (and increase risk) of issues, contrary to the aims of the Licensing Act
- Venues should be dealt with on an individual basis
- Is not reflective of the needs of a city centre neighbourhood
- 2.5 People supported the setting of a terminal hour mainly on the basis of:
 - preventing noise disturbance and antisocial behaviour*, as well as traffic
 - reducing (the risk of) alcohol-related crime
 - avoiding the area becoming similar in character to the Northern Quarter's NTE*
- 2.6 These were impacts that were identified in the responses as being unsuitable for a residential neighbourhood. There were also several mentions of needing to avoid a recurrence of problems previously experienced from Sankeys1 nightclub in relation to noise and disturbance as people made their way to and from the venue through residential areas. However, conversely, there was a response that the club had had no adverse impact on the locality.
- 2.7 Those who supported later terminal hours typically still aimed to protect residents' interests but considered a later terminal hour as a fair compromise to the needs of local businesses. Support for a later terminal hour generally related to weekends (Fri/Sat) rather than during the week.
- 2.8 The breakdown of opinion in relation to setting an appropriate finish time was as follows:

Responses for postcodes M4 (5)(6)(7)

- 2.11 125 of the 274 responses identified themselves as being from these postcode areas, which relate to the Ancoats and New Islington and surrounding areas. The vast majority (118) identified themselves as residents.
- 2.12 32 of the overall 37 people who agreed with the proposed terminal hour of 11pm were local to the area. Nevertheless, the majority of responses (57%) from people in this area did not want to see a particular terminal hour being introduced.

- 2.13 One response was received from a local residents association (Royal Mills Residents Association (ROMRA)) supporting 11pm (Sun-Thurs) and midnight (Fri-Sat) for licensable activities. A duplicate response on behalf of the same residents association (and others) proposed support for a 12.30am terminal hour for licensable activities on Fri and Sat. However, the former response has been established as being the true position of the ROMRA given it was submitted by the Chair of that association. Both responses are included in the total figures, however.
- 2.14 A breakdown of the terminal hours supported by those in the local area is set out below:

Exceptions for special occasions

2.15 Those who agreed with setting a terminal hour were asked if any exceptions should be made for special occasions. This was answered by 51 people as follows:

2.16 The main occasion identified was New Year's Eve, which has been traditionally unrestricted. Other occasions included bank holidays and Christmas. However, there was no consensus of opinion around this issue.

Suggested alternative measures

- 2.17 All consultees were asked whether there were any alternate measures to setting a terminal hour that would achieve the intended aim.
- 2.18 The main suggestions proposed as an alternative to setting a standard hours policy are set out below (*points in bold signify the main recurring themes):
 - visible police presence, particularly foot patrols to act as a deterrent*
 - engagement forum involving businesses and residents
 - (reinstate) public CCTV in the area*
 - improved lighting
 - being selective in granting licences
 - security staff at premises*
 - strict controls in place at licensed premises and robust enforcement
 - staggered hours for premises
 - ensuring alcohol service is refused to intoxicated patrons
 - diversity of establishments/offer
 - effective soundproofing (residential and commercial)
- 2.19 A key theme was the improving security of the public realm through increased natural surveillance (police presence, security at premises, CCTV, lighting), which is something that the night time economy can bring through populating the street scene and this is recognised in several responses. However, measures to mitigate against issues arising e.g. staggering hours to avoid large numbers attempting to disperse at once, and preventing drunkenness, are also recognised as important.

General Comments

2.20 The majority of responses were against the proposal, seeing it as a backwards step, disproportionate to achieving its intended aim, and out of keeping with the up and coming reputation of the area and the city. There are concerns that it will deter potential investment and negatively impact on culture.

2.21 Those supporting the idea of a terminal hour generally see the measure as one of putting the needs of residents first, which is something they welcome.

3.0 Proposed final policy

- 3.1 Taking into account the responses it is proposed to extend the terminal hour for licensable activities on Fridays and Saturdays to midnight.
- 3.2 Ultimately, the aim of the policy is to preserve the residential-led character of the area. The midnight terminal hour at weekends has support locally, including from a local residents association. Whilst there are local advocates for a later terminal hour, a midnight terminal hour for licensable activities (plus 30 minutes drinking up time for on-licensed premises) is seen as an appropriate compromise given the the actual and future residential-led focus in the development of the locality.
- 3.3 Although the majority of responses was against the proposal of an 11pm terminal hour and against bringing in any default terminal hour, irrespective of time, it is recognised that there was significant local support for a terminal hour and concerns from local residents about the prospects of a late night economy on the local area; particularly in relation to noise disturbance, antisocial behaviour and alcohol-related crime and disorder.
- 3.4 The current Licensing Policy recognises the important role that the hours for licensable activity can have on the promotion of the licensing objectives. Paragraphs 7.25 to 7.35 of the Policy (The proximity of the premises to local residents and other local businesses, particularly in relation to the potential for nuisance) set out that the authority considers that later hours will typically be more sensitive and higher risk in causing problems (7.29) and that the lateness of the terminal hour will often be a contributory factor in the potential for disturbance (7.31). The Policy also states that the authority expects terminal hours will normally be earlier to promote the licensing objectives for licensed premises in areas with higher density of residential property (7.32).
- 3.5 Further at para 14.63 the s182 Guidance recommends that statements of licensing policy should provide clear indications of how the licensing authority 'will secure proper integration of its licensing policy with local crime prevention, planning, transport, tourism, equality schemes and the night time economy. ... Co-ordination and integration of such policies, strategies and initiatives are therefore important.'
- 3.6 The Council's vision for the area as set out in the Ancoats and New Islington Regeneration Framework (as updated November 2016) is "to guide the positive regeneration of the area comprehensively and to deliver an attractive and successful residential-led neighbourhood with opportunities for a wider mix of complementary uses where increasing numbers of people would choose to live, work and spend leisure time".
- 3.7 The proposed policy has a clear strategic vision and seeks to integrate with existing policies, taking into account the actual and future residential-led

- locality and considering the likely effect of licensable activities on that vision. The draft policy thus sets out a mechanism in accordance with the s182 Guidance to promote that vision and the licensing objectives.
- 3.8 The title of the special policy has also been amended to "special hours policy' to clarify its purpose. Changes have also been made to update references to the revised s182 Guidance issued following the original drafting of the policy, and to remove the factors which will not be considered as exceptional.

4.0 Conclusion

The Northern Quarter has frequently suffered from late night antisocial behaviour due to it's late night licenses in the area. The type of clientele that visit the area for these late night licenses are also an issue. Regularly looking for trouble, littering, and treating the area poorly. I regularly struggled to get a good night's sleep during the week because of this, and this affected my performance at work. I was also greeted with sick/vomit and smashed glass on the door steps to my building when leaving for work, which is not very pleasant.

With Ancoats becoming more of a residential area in recent years, aimed at working professionals, it makes sense to implement a curfew in the area. As a working professional myself, and someone who has lived in Ancoats for 3 years now, there is a nice community feel with the current bars and restaurants, and the area isn't taken over in the evenings by antisocial drunkards, or students looking to misbehave (a significant problem that the Northern Quarter has).

I believe this license is important to Ancoats to maintain the standards of the area, and ensure that the area isn't dominated by late night bars to the detriment of the residential community in the area. 7 Brothers are a role model for the type of licensed establishment that should operate in the Ancoats area, and i believe this license will help invite other business that aren't bars into the area. Personally, i'd like to see more shops, florists, and public services.

We believe that such a blanket policy would deter quality Restaurants and Bars from investing in our area. We do not want the streets around our homes to be filled with noisy revellers at 3 and 4 in the morning. Equally we do not wish the streets to be soulless and deserted after 9 pm, which they currently are. We have already experienced a number of premises open and close after a very short trading period giving the area an abandoned feel.

We are concerned about the stance the City Council is taking, purportedly on behalf of residents, for what is effectively a "blanket curfew" in the area of 23.00 no matter what the nature of the business or the licensable activity. As residents we believe that the Licensing Act 2003 gives us the flexibility to oppose inappropriate applications whilst maintaining the residential nature of the area through conditions, enforcement and review procedures Under the Licensing Act 2003 there is a mechanism for declaration of a "Cumulative Impact Zone" by the Council. This is where effectively the amount of licensed premises in an area is having an adverse impact on the promotion of the licensing objectives. We do not believe that this is the case in

Ancoats. In our area there is no indication or submission that this is the case and it appears that the Council wants to impose a measure with equivalent effect to a Cumulative Impact Zone by other means.

We as residents are very concerned that, for example, a restaurant premises would be restricted to standard permitted hours and have to close at 11pm when many of our members are still returning home from work or social activities. Under the proposals we would be forced to travel into the City Centre in order to get a late meal or alcoholic drink, areas of which are unpleasant and unsafe to visit later in the evening. We are appalled by the suggestion of Harinder Dhaliwall in his representation letter that we are able to get a late meal or drink a short distance away in the Northern Quarter. That area is also increasingly residential. Will our

area also become the dumping ground when Mr Dhaliwall and Manchester Life move onto future projects? We understand the licensing objectives and the importance of promoting them, indeed the licensing objectives are sensible and often assist residents in preventing inappropriate applications, however in order to introduce a Cumulative Impact Policy there must be an evidential basis for the decision and this is not the case in the Ancoats and New Islington Area. We are further encouraged by the new businesses proposal to create a bespoke bar and restaurant forum for the Ancoats and New Islington area (a similar one currently operates for the City Centre bars) to be attended by local operators, residents and invites to Manchester City Council and Greater Manchester Police. We do not see how the various department's objections to a restaurant which opens until 00.00 during the week and 01.00 on Friday and Saturday can possibly have an adverse impact on the promotion of the licensing objectives and we would support such an application. At recent resident's meetings RoMRA (royal mills residents) Paragon, McConnell, Old Sedgewick, New Sedgewick and Fairbairn residents all unanimously voted in favour of a terminal hour for Licensable Activities of 2300 hours Sun- Thurs and 0030 hours Fri-Sat. The secretary to these residents groups has also consulted with various residents in Ice Plant, MM2, George Leigh Street, Express Building and Victoria Square who also want this however they do not have a residents association so they would speak individually in support of our wishes. As residents within this area, and therefore most likely to be effected by the Policy we would ask the City Council officers to take account of our wishes and support our proposals.

None of these involved drink or involved people socialising in the area (indeed, on one occasion it was people stood smoking outside a nearby bar who came to my aid and saved me from further damage - they very genuinely may have saved my life) but instead gangs of youths who are obviously under 18 passing through the area. There were no police and no CCTV cameras. I feel safe walking through the NQ at night as there are people there. I do not feel safe when I cross Great Ancoats street and begin walking through Ancoats to my own home. No matter how many street lamps you put up, quiet streets are scary. This should be your focus...

A blanket ban is dangerous and lazy. You already have the powers to strip a premises of its license should it be causing nuisance; you already have the power

to turn down an application should you think it will cause nuisance. You do not need further powers. You already have enough.

If you think you can count on students coming from all over th UK and worldwide purely on the basis of prestige and academic draw of the unis themselves you are tragically misreading the situation, the key draw of Manchester to undergrads has been the sub cultures and lifestyle available to those coming, which are negated by measures such as this. That revenue stream will wane and when it dries up, what's going to support the city then? Property bubble will not. New office space and unaffordable housing will not. People want to live in and around town for access to its fruits. If those fruits are sterilised a-cultural zones, bleached of their character, you lose the draw and no one will want to pay £900pcm to stay in a drab and dreary, wholly uninspiring, even if impressively tall ghost block.

I am a GM of a popular restaurant/bar on Burton Road, West Didsbury. We currently have an 11pm curfew and it's ruining our business. We have informal meetings with several other GMs about the issue on the road, though we are impotent because of a loud and powerful minority group of local residents, backed up by estate agents desperate to see how far they can keep pushing prices in the area. Of those GMs and owners, we have lost five in six months as their business collapse under increasing rents and the tightening of hoops by licensing and the council that are bleeding Burton Road. Even though only 30 myself, I'm old enough to remember when Burton Road was in Withington and when the pubs were rough and frequent by local mobsters and when the only shops in the area were bookies, pound shops and video (some adult video) shops and of course the institution that is the Great Kathmandu, and when your house would fetch £25,000 even on the leafiest Street in the area. Fast forward a few years and spurred by vibrant. creative and popular venues that popped up, particularly bars and mixed venues and the area saw a bit of life breathed into it. It soon became a popular destination on a weekend, or a Wednesday for a pub quiz or Thursday (the new Friday!) for some espresso martinis and house prices have rocketed.

That same house bought for £25,000 in 1990 has now been valued at £450,000. That increase in value has not come despite the bars and nightlife, in many ways it's because of it. It became trendy for young professionals. But these bars are dropping like flies. I believe in the next six months we will lose another five and within a year it will return to bookies and poundshops and once more become an extension of Withington high Street, an area currently plagued by anti-social problems, an area completely ignored by the local council. The first thing to happen will be houses lying empty as young profs struggle to justify the high rents and crowded transport links. Then the rents will inevitably have to drop and by doing so will see more students spread from the Central Road nexus and take over more of the traditional, family dominated streets. Noise and mess will increase, house prices will drop. The tiny crumb of property you've coveted and protected and invested your life savings into will wither before your eyes and then

all the tomes you pushed for the bars to shut at 11pm, for no one to be allowed outside of the venue, restrictions on access, the letters under the door, the snide phone calls, all of those things will come back to haunt you. In five years West Didsbury will one giant pot hole between the Parkway and Princess Road, the new Fallowfield, nothing there of interest, a dot on the map between Chortlon and Didsbury Village, ravaged by local kids.

In five years, post-brexit Britain, realistically, where do you see Ancoats/New Islington? Who do you see living there? What do you see drawing them there? How do you see them affording to live there? Ancoats is an area of high incidents of crime, violence and sexual violence. But people, young people move there to take advantage of the local nightlife. These are young people willing to spend slightly above their means to live in a poky flat because on a weekend, or even after work, God forbid ven past 11pm you can go and unwind and enjoy your youth. These flats do not attract old people, or families. They are built to attract foreign investors who lap them up mostly because of chronic lack of originality in investment, set the rent sky high and play on the high demand we have for house of any kind right now. Won't last. Will fail. Will fail even before the shoddy materials and workmanship become obvious although in several of these developments in my experience that's as little as six months.

Good luck to you. Shag every last penny out of this town because when it crumbles again we can live where we want, and try and build it up much competently than the Sir R Leech council, out and away from the greasy pockets of far East and Gulf State investors taking over our country, house by house, road by road, council by council.

I would say don't do it. But part of me just wants to see it happen and in a decade when we're basically the old Manchester/New Detroit we can just have another go. The slash and burn approach is all we seem to know.

Sounds pretty outrageous, but bars and cafes (yes even ones that shut at 11pm) that people could relax in (that did not sell alcohol as a matter of course) would provide quieter social hubs, with less antisocial behaviour and provide a lucrative revenue stream for the city and local business (particularly eateries). It would help to dissolve the boozy lad culture.

But above all just invest council money in local business. Commission infrastructure projects, provide jobs for local people, they'll pay those taxes and reinvest the money in the city by spending their wages. Keep what they spend in the city by investing in the things they spend on. Where I work staff get a 25% discount. That means when they finish work they are incentivised, and often do put the money we give them for their time and hard work, back in our business. That means we can afford to stay open to provide them with a job, it means we can be in the position to offer better wages and it means we can in turn offer them lower prices and make their discount go further. Those three things are in principle the obligations of a council and our council 'the most right wing council in the country' despite being an ostensibly labour dictatorship is failing miserably.

Q2. What effects do you believe this would have in the area?

I am an independent Licensing consultant working on behalf of operators, residents and local authorities, conducting investigations at venues Licensed under the Licensing Act 2003. I have become aware of the above public consultation that is currently taking place as we are currently applying for a licence within the area covered by the draft special policy. Unfortunately it appears that staff of Manchester City Council are already enforcing the policy which calls into question the legitimacy of this consultation when officers have already decided the outcome.

From reading the draft policy and its supporting documents it appears to be based on a consultation document prepared for the Ancoats and New Islington Neighbourhood Development Framework. As this document states, this consultation was conducted in order to assist the council in its functions as a planning authority.

9.1 This final version of the Framework includes the results of a public consultation. Once approved, the framework will become a material consideration for the Council as Local Planning Authority.

As such the document and consultation was not conducted in respect of alcohol licence application to which purpose it is now being used. I would also question the relevance of the public consultation document from 2014. From documents it appears that following two public meetings and a letter drop the City Council received 39 attendees and 19 responses. It is not clear how many people attended both meetings and also wrote letters. I can find no evidence within the reports of the meetings and consultation were an 11pm terminal hour was requested or proposed. Since 2014 the residential population in this area has exploded to over 3000 and continues growing. Few if any of these incoming residents have had the opportunity to officially give their views on how the area in which they now live should develop. I have had the opportunity to speak to some of these residents associations and they express concerns regarding lifeless streets and empty business units before the introduction of this policy, and fear that it can only make this situation worse.

Under the Licensing Act 2003 the council already has the ability to consult and declare an area a Cumulative Impact Zone. It appears that the draft policy is attempting to circumnavigate this piece of legislation because its implementation is evidence based. The Revised Licensing Act Guidance under S182 sets out procedure for Special Policy to be adopted, although it is directed to Cumulative impact I would interpret this as any Special Policy. This interpretation is based on Page 109 of the revised guidance in particular 14.29 and the consultation with those specified in 5(3) of the Licensing Act. As a result I cannot see how this consultation is a valid one to comply with the S182 guidance steps to a special policy and may leave the council open to a Judicial Review if implemented.

The draft Policy makes no attempt to differentiate between different types of venues. It takes no account of a venues size, facility for vertical drinking, live music venue, alcohol led or a restaurant. It is recognised by the government Alcohol reduction strategy and the Manchester Licensing Policy that non drink led premises including restaurants can have a beneficial and positive impact on an area and the age profile of persons using it (Manchester Licensing Policy 2016/21 6.2). The proposed policy also fails to recognise the different days of the week, and the neighbourhoods expectations, with equal hours being applied for weekdays as for Fridays and Saturday evenings.

There are already a number of venues operating within the defined area with hours exceeding those proposed by the draft policy. A number of units have licences to 2330, 0100, 0300 and 0400.

I would also question the draft policy's aspirations in recognising the positive input that licensed venues have to the economy of Greater Manchester in terms of revenue, business rates and employment. Two businesses have already opened and closed in this area as they were not financially viable (Off licence and Mexican). By supporting the draft policy the council are reducing the business opportunities in this area and further empty units and deserted streets will result.

I would therefore ask councillors to consider amending the policy to take account of the issues raised within this response.

Q2. What effects do you believe this would have in the area?

I am responding on behalf of the Manchester Pub & Club Watch Committee. As a Licensing Solicitor with over 30 years' experience in this field, I believe that the implementation of the above Policy would be detrimental to the wellbeing of both the businesses and residents of Ancoats and New Islington.

Having read through the proposed Special Policy, I have a number of concerns regarding how this Policy will be implemented and the reasons why it is considered necessary in this particular area. I also believe that the Policy is based on the results of an outdated Consultation dating back to 2014, and that the importance of such a decision would surely require a new Consultation and research to be carried out.

There are a number of issues within this Policy that, in my opinion, would make it both impractical and disproportionate to the vibrant and eclectic communities within Manchester.

It appears that the reason for the implementation of this Special Policy is due to the regeneration of the area. Other areas within Manchester have been subject to regeneration without this kind of Special Policy being required. Why is this area so markedly different?

At Appendix 4, 4.1.2 the Policy states that "unless an applicant can demonstrate there are exceptional circumstances to justify" then all licensable activities will only be permitted until 23:00. There is no definition included of what might constitute an "exceptional circumstance" or who would be responsible for making that decision.

It is stated later in the document that neither quality of management nor size of venue will be considered as an "exceptional circumstance". Some thought has clearly been given to what is not exceptional, but some guidance on what the Council might consider to be exceptional would be helpful. There is no indication currently as to what "exceptional" might be, and I believe it is important to have transparency so far as possible.

At 4.2.3 the Council state that they want "opportunities for a wider mix of complimentary uses where increasing numbers of people would choose to work, live and spend leisure time". This seems something of a contradiction as no licensed leisure activities would be able to draw people to the area if they were forced to terminate all activity at 23:00. Since the implementation of the Licensing Act 2003, a terminal hour of 23:00 would be considered somewhat archaic. To enforce this time on a whole neighbourhood would, in my opinion, prevent the neighbourhood from prospering and from competing with other neighbourhoods in the general area. Rather than people coming to the area for leisure, I believe that they would leave the area to seek venues with later licensed hours.

Surely it would be more beneficial to at least consider a later terminal hours for weekends – 00:30 or 01:00 on Fridays and Saturdays. Even under the Licensing Act 1964, it was possible for a premises to trade to 02:00 with the necessary Licences in place.

At 4.2.5 it states that these neighbourhoods are seen as areas where "young and skilled workers will choose to live". It goes on to say that the licensed premises in the area should "complement the needs of the local community". In my experience younger workers look for a vibrant night-life, and those choosing to live close to the City Centre do so for the convenience of the mix of bars and late-night licensed premises. Restricting the hours to 23:00 (particularly at weekends) in this area would prevent licensed premises from competing with the easily-accessible nightlife in the City Centre and elsewhere.

This Policy is also targeting 'Off Licences' which would have an impact on people residing in the area, who were looking to purchase alcohol in the evening. The Government recommended in their Guidance that "shops, stores and supermarkets" should be allowed to provide alcohol for consumption off the premises when the shop is open. It states that there should be "good reasons " for restricting the hours, and I don't believe that this requirement has been met. Restricting off-sales to 23:00 would force any local residents to go further afield to purchase alcohol. It would prevent people who had perhaps already consumed an alcoholic beverage from being able to go on foot to a local premises, and could ultimately encourage them to drive or take public transport – surely creating the possibility of an increase in public nuisance or disorderly behaviour.

The Policy does not seek to limit the number of licensed premises or the size of them, but in limiting the hours to 23:00 it is most certainly limiting the number of

licensed premises that would be able to succeed in the area. As I understood the position, 2 new licensed premises in the locality have already closed down due to their restricted trading position.

Competition within the Licensed Trade is at its most aggressive. There are a large number of licensed premises all competing for customers on price, atmosphere and licensed hours. A customer is more likely to choose a premises with longer hours, rather than having to move at closing time to another venue.

In Paragraph 4.2.8 a list of issues is provided to demonstrate the need for this terminal hour. However, Manchester City Council already has a lengthy document consisting of model Conditions which aim to deal with all these issues. An alternative option to the restrictions of this Policy would be a considered Operating Schedule and perhaps a set of Conditions tailored for this area which the Responsible Authorities could seek to impose.

Finally, at 4.2.11 it states that the Council would not seek to revoke any existing Licences, which I understand to mean that it would also not seek to restrict their hours. This would put any potential new licensed premises at an immediate disadvantage in the area, and could ultimately deter any new businesses. To secure new businesses, to the area the Council should offer an incentive rather than a reason not to move there.

As a resident of Ancoats for 5 years I've been pleased to see the development of Cutting Room Square and the new Independent Businesses that have arrived in the area. I am writing in support of all Licensed Businesses on the square being allowed to open past 11pm.

Whilst I appreciate there may be concerns from nearby residents, I think the square, and the surrounding areas would benefit hugely from Ancoats becoming a nightlife destination in it's own right, separate from the Northern Quarter and other areas of the city. It's my opinion that the benefits of a thriving neighbourhood far outweigh any potential public nuisance concerns. The calibre of bars and restaurants that the area is currently attracting is extremely high and I feel all these businesses should be supported as much as possible, rather than hindered by having to close by 11pm at weekends. The majority of residents now living, and moving to Ancoats are young professionals and I don't feel an 11pm weekend curfew would be catering for their needs.

Special Hours Policy – Ancoats and New Islington

- 4.1 The special policy shall apply to the Ancoats and New Islington Regeneration Framework Area as identified on the map at Appendix X of this Licensing Policy.
- 4.2 The effect of the special policy is that the Council will generally only permit licensable activities for premises in the Ancoats and New Islington Regeneration Framework area until the terminal hours set out below whenever it receives relevant representation, unless an applicant can demonstrate there are exceptional circumstance to justify a departure from the policy in the individual circumstances.

11pm (Sunday to Thursday)

12am midnight (Friday, Saturday)

- 4.3 The special policy applies to on and off sales of alcohol. Where alcohol is sold for consumption on the premises, our policy will be to generally provide 30 minutes 'drinking up' time between the terminal hour for the sale of alcohol and the closing time of the premises
- 4.4 Each application will be considered on its individual merits.
- 4.5 We are adopting this policy with paragraph 10.13 of the Government's statutory Guidance in mind, which recognises that different licensing strategies may be appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives in different areas and that licensing authorities are best placed to make decisions about appropriate opening hours in their areas based on their local knowledge and in consultation with responsible authorities.
- 4.6 The Council's vision for the area as set out in the Ancoats and New Islington Regeneration Framework (as updated November 2016) is "to guide the positive regeneration of the area comprehensively and to deliver an attractive and successful residential-led neighbourhood with opportunities for a wider mix of complementary uses where increasing numbers of people would choose to live, work and spend leisure time".
- 4.7 The 2016 City Centre Strategic Plan recognises that Ancoats and New Islington are increasingly growing in popularity as places to live. The extension of the city centre boundary to include Ancoats and New Islington increases the overall population of the city centre to almost 50,000 people.
- 4.8 The expanded city centre neighbourhoods are seen as locations where young and skilled workers will choose to live, but also where a broader population, including retirees will choose to live. The City Centre Strategic Plan outlines

Ancoats and New Islington as an opportunity to deliver a range of housing tenures to meet demand. Therefore, it is important that the mix of licensed premises within this area should complement the needs of the local community.

- 4.9 The Northern Quarter is the centre for creativity within the city centre and with plans to expand this eastwards into Ancoats and New Islington, there is a high likelihood that the vibrant night time economy that has developed in the Northern Quarter would also seek to extend into Ancoats and New Islington.
- 4.10 The aim of the special policy is not to block all forms of development and so does not impose quotas on the number or type of licensed premises permitted or the capacity of those premises. However, controlling the lateness of the hours for licensed premises is regarded as particularly important, having regard to the predominantly residential character of the Ancoats and New Islington neighbourhoods.
- 4.11 With this in mind, the Council considers that a terminal hour of 11pm \9midnight on Friday and Saturday) is appropriate in this area in order to prevent issues that can arise with the night time economy during later hours, particularly such as increases in noise from patrons coming and going to licensed premises; anti-social behaviour; litter; and alcohol-related crime and disorder; which would undermine the promotion of the licensing objectives locally.
- 4.12 This approach is supported in paragraph 14.48 of the Guidance¹, which states "As part of its licensing policy, the licensing authority may also wish to consider the use of alternative measures such as fixed closing times, staggered closing times and zoning within its area, providing such mechanisms are justified on the basis of the licensing objectives and are only presumptive, with final decisions continuing to be made in relation to individual premises on a case by case basis in accordance with what is appropriate to promote the licensing objectives".
- 4.13 The Council recognises the Government's recommendation at 10.15 of the Guidance that 'shops, stores and supermarkets should normally be free to provide sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises at any times when the retail outlet is open for shopping unless there are good reasons, based on the licensing objectives, for restricting those hours'. However, in this locality, it is considered appropriate to restrict the hours permitted for the sale of alcohol.
- 4.14 The Council will not use this special policy as grounds for revoking an existing licence or certificate when relevant representations are received about problems with those premises.

4.15 The Council will regularly review the special policy in place.
