I am Police Constable 17659 Isherwood of the Greater Manchester Police, Licensing Officer for the City of Manchester Division, currently based in the Licensing Team at Manchester Town Hall Extension.

Part of my remit as licensing officer is to oversee all of the licensed premises on the City of Manchester Division. The objective of the role is to promote and maintain the 4 licensing objectives at licensed premises, those being the Prevention of Crime and Disorder, Public Safety, Prevention of Public Nuisance and the Protection of Children from Harm.

The Queens Arms

The premises are situated on Honey Street in the Cheetham Hill area of Manchester and the premises licence was issued on 10/02/2015. The Premises Licence Holder (PLH) and Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) is Mr Ky Nguyen who has held these positions since the licence was granted.

<u>Incident</u>

The incident which resulted in review proceedings being instigated is as follows:

At 0115 hours on Sunday 6th September 2020 Greater Manchester Police (GMP) were contacted by staff at North Manchester General Hospital who informed us that a male had been dropped off at the hospital and had wounds on his body which appeared to consistent with him being stabbed.

Subsequent enquiries revealed that the male had been stabbed at the Queens Arms on Honey Street and that he had suffered wounds to his torso and armpit and that the wounds were potentially life threatening.

Enquiries at the Queens Arms revealed blood both inside and outside the premises and found that the named PLH and DPS Ky Nguyen was no longer involved with the premises and another male claimed to be the landlord.

No contact was made from the premises in relation to this serious incident and a crime for Attempted Murder has been submitted. Enquiries to trace the offenders are continuing. The Incident and Crime reports can be found at pages 3-6 of the bundle and I now submit these as exhibits AE?1 and AEI/2.

It was established that the stabbing occurred at 0045 hours. The premises are supposed to close at 2300 hours each day.

The victim has since had surgery and is-recovering.

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On Monday 7th September 2020 I applied for a summary review of the premises licence due to the premises being associated with serious crime. The certificate was signed by Superintendent Boyce.

Interim Steps Hearing

The Interim Steps hearing took place on Wednesday 9th September 2020 at Manchester Town Hall where GMP outlined our concerns regarding the premises to the committee. We asked the committee to suspend the Premises Licence pending the outcome of the full review hearing and, after deliberation; the committee took the decision to suspend the Premises Licence pending the full review hearing on Monday 5th October 2020. During this hearing the PLH/DPS Ky Nguyen informed the committee that he had not had any involvement with the premises since February 2019 and that he had no objection to the Premises Licence being suspended or subsequently revoked.

Conclusion

It is clear that an extremely serious crime has taken place at the premises and could very easily have resulted in a young man losing his life and the incident took place an hour and 45 minutes after the premises should have been closed. No call was made from any person at the premises to inform the police or ambulance about the stabbing and the first time it was brought to our attention was when the hospital staff made contact.

There is no CCTV from the premises as the hard drive was not even connected to any wiring whatsoever which is in direct breach of Annex 3 condition 1.

By the PLH/DPS's own admission he has nothing to do with the premises and hasn't done so for the previous 20 months.

All in all there is nothing to suggest that these premises should be allowed to continue to operate as licensed premises and it is feared that if they were allowed to do so then further serious crimes will occur there, which will go unreported.

The licensing objectives of the Prevention of Crime and Disorder and Public Safety have been completely undermined and ignored and no duty of care has been shown from any person involved with the premises.


As such GMP would strongly urge the committee to revoke the Premises Licence forthwith.





CERTIFICATE UNDER SECTION 53A(1)(b) OF THE LICENSING ACT 2003

I hereby certify that in my opinion the premises described below are associated with serious crime / serious disorder / both serious crims and serious disorder.

I am a Superintendent ³ in the Greater Manchester police force.

I am giving this certificate because I am of the opinion that other procedures under the Licensing Act are inappropriate in this case, because⁴:

The standard review of the premises licence under section 51 Licensing Act 2003 is inappropriate due to length of time a standard review would take, there are serious concerns as to the serious nature of the incident which require immediate resolution. Greater Manchester Police believe that serious crime has occurred at the premises.

Greater Manchester Police (GMP) will say that the premises are associated with

serious crime. Serious crime is defined within the statutory guidance as per section 81(3)(a) and (b) of the Regulation of Investigatory Powers Act 2000, which states that the conduct constitutes an offence for which a person 21 years of age or over with no previous convictions could reasonably be expected to be sentenced to imprisonment for 3 years or more. Therefore due to the serious crime which has taken place at the premises GMP feel that it is necessary for an expedited review to take place.

The premises are situated on Honey Street in the Cheetham Hill area of Manchester and the premises licence was issued on 10/02/2015. The Premises Licence Holder (PLH) and Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) is Ky Nguyen who has held these positions since the date the licence was issued.

No contact was made from the premises in relation to this serious incident and a Crime for Attempted Murder has been submitted. Enquireis to trace the offenders are continuing.

The powers under sections 53A to 53C of the 2003 Act, are aimed at tackling serious crime and serious disorder, in particular (but not exclusively) the use of guns and knives.

The powers contained under section 53A of the Licensing Act 2003 are necessary and proportionate in light of the association that the premises has to serious crime.

In the interim Greater Manchester Police would request that the Licensing Authority consider suspension of the Premises Licence until the full review is heard before the committee. Serious Crime has occurred at the premises and until the Licensing Committee hear the full review and all the evidence that will be disclosed, to allow the premises to continue to operate as a licensed premises gives concerns that further crime will occur. Greater Manchester Police will say that the licensing objectives of the prevention of crime and disorder can only be promoted if the premises licence was supsended until the final determination of the summary review application.

The standard review of the premises licence under section 51 Licensing Act 2003 is inappropriate due to length of time a standard review would take, there are serious concerns in relation to the lack of action taken by the premises.

Notes for guidance:

1. A certificate of the kind mentioned in the form must accompany the application in order for it to be valid under the terms of the Licensing Act 2003. The certificate must explicitly state the senior officer's opinion that the premises in question are associated with serious crime, serious disorder or both.

Serious crime is defined by reference to section 81 of the Regulation of Investigatory Powers Act 2000. In summary, it means:

- conduct that amounts to one or more criminal offences for which a person who has attained the age of eighteen and has no previous convictions could reasonably be expected to be sentenced to imprisonment for a term of three years or more; or
- conduct that amounts to one or more criminal offences and involves the use of



violence, results in substantial financial gain or is conduct by a large number of persons in pursuit of a common purpose. Serious disorder is not defined in legislation, and so bears its ordinary English meaning.
