### Summary

Interim Steps hearing for Summary Review of the premises licence under s53C of the Licensing Act 2003

### Recommendations

The Sub-Committee must take such of the steps under section 53(B) of the Licensing Act 2003 (if any), that it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The steps are:

1. To modify the conditions of the licence;
2. To exclude any of the licensable activities from the licence;
3. To remove the designated premises supervisor;
4. To suspend the licence

The conditions of the licence are modified if any of them is altered or omitted or any new condition is added. Modification of the conditions of the premises licence can include altering or modifying existing conditions or adding any new conditions, including those that restrict the times at which licensable activities authorised by the licence can take place. Where the Sub-Committee consider that none of the above steps are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, no action should be taken in respect of the licence.

## 1. **Introduction**

- 1.1 On 17<sup>th</sup> March 2022, an application was made by Greater Manchester Police under s53A of the Licensing Act 2003 for a Summary Review of the Premises Licence for Irish World Heritage Centre, Irish World Heritage Centre, 1 Irish Town Way, Manchester, M8 0AE in the Cheetham ward of Manchester. A location map and photograph of the premises is attached at **Appendix 1**.
- 1.2 Summary reviews can be undertaken when the police consider that the premises concerned are associated with serious crime or serious disorder (or both). The summary review process allows interim conditions to be quickly attached to a licence and for the review of the licence to be fast tracked.
- 1.3 A 10 working-day public consultation exercise is undertaken in accordance with Licensing Act 2003 regulations, requiring the application to be advertised by the displaying of a blue notice at or on the premises and details of the application to be published on the Council's website.
- 1.4 Under section 53C of the Licensing Act 2003, the licensing authority must hold a full review of the premises licence and determine the review within 28 days after the day of receipt of the application.
- 1.5 Following the review under section 53C, the licensing authority must then review the interim steps in place and determine whether it is appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives for the steps to remain in place, or if they should be modified or withdrawn.

## 2. **The Application**

- 2.1 A copy of the application is attached at **Appendix 2**.
- 2.2 An application for the summary review of premises licence number 148190 under section 53A of the Licensing Act 2003 was submitted by Greater Manchester Police on 17<sup>th</sup> March 2022. The grounds of the application for review are that in the opinion of a senior police officer the premises are associated with serious crime or serious disorder or both.
- 2.3 **Interim Steps pending the review**
- 2.3.1 Within 48 hours of receiving a summary review application, under s53B of the Licensing Act 2003 the licensing authority must consider whether it is necessary to take interim steps pending the review of the licence for the promotion of the licensing objectives.
- 2.3.2 The premises licence holder may make representations against the interim steps taken by the licensing authority. Also under s53B, the licensing authority must within 48 hours of the time of its receipt of the representations, hold a hearing to consider those representations.
- 2.3.3 On the date of the review hearing, the licensing authority is required to review any interim steps that are in place and consider whether it is appropriate for

the promotion of the licensing objectives for the steps to remain in place, or if they should be modified or withdrawn.

### 3. **Current Premises Licence**

- 3.1 A copy of the current licence is attached at **Appendix 3**.
- 3.2 The premises licence holder is Irish World Heritage Centre and has held the licence since 17/01/2013..
- 3.3 The designated premises supervisor is Mr Martin Connolly who has held this position since 17/01/2013.
- 3.4 The licensable activities permitted by the licence are:
- The sale by retail of alcohol
  - Performance of plays
  - Boxing or wrestling entertainments
  - Live Music
  - Recorded Music
  - Performances of dance

### 4. **Key Policies and Considerations**

#### 4.1 **Legal Considerations**

- 4.1.1 Hearings under the Licensing Act 2003 operate under the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

#### 4.2 **New Information**

- 4.2.1 In accordance with Regulation 18 of the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005, the authority may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice either before the hearing or, with the consent of all parties, at the hearing.

#### 4.3 **Hearsay Evidence**

- 4.3.1 The Panel may accept hearsay evidence and it will be a matter for the Panel to attach what weight to it that they consider appropriate. Hearsay evidence is evidence of something that a witness neither saw nor heard, but has heard or read about.

#### 4.4 **The Secretary of State's Guidance to the Licensing Act 2003**

- 4.4.1 The Secretary of State's Guidance to the Licensing Act 2003 is provided to licensing authorities in relation to the carrying out of their functions under the 2003 Act. It also provides information to magistrates' courts hearing appeals against licensing decisions and has been made widely available for the benefit of those who run licensed premises, their legal advisers and the general public. It is a key medium for promoting best practice, ensuring consistent

application of licensing powers across England and Wales and for promoting fairness, equal treatment and proportionality.

- 4.4.2 Section 4 of the 2003 Act provides that, in carrying out its functions, a licensing authority must 'have regard to' guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182. The Guidance is therefore binding on all licensing authorities to that extent. However, the Guidance cannot anticipate every possible scenario or set of circumstances that may arise and, as long as licensing authorities have properly understood this Guidance, they may depart from it if they have good reason to do so and can provide full reasons.
- 4.4.3 Departure from the Guidance could give rise to an appeal or judicial review, and the reasons given will then be a key consideration for the courts when considering the lawfulness and merits of any decision taken.

#### 4.5 **Manchester Statement of Licensing Policy**

- 4.5.1 Section 4 of the 2003 Act provides that, in carrying out its functions, a licensing authority must 'have regard to' its statement of licensing policy.
- 4.5.2 The Licensing Policy sets out the vision the licensing authority has for the regulation of licensed premises throughout Manchester and outlines the standards expected in order to ensure the promotion of the licensing objectives in the city. The Panel may depart from the policies should it consider doing so would benefit the promotion of the licensing objectives. Reasons are to be given for any such departure from the Policy.
- 4.5.3 There are a number of references in the Policy to the licensing authority's expectations of applicants. The licensing authority will not apply the Policy rigidly, but will always have regard to the merits of the case with a view to promoting the licensing objectives.
- 4.5.4 Relevant to this application, the Panel are recommended to have regard to the following sections of the Policy:

##### ***Section 6: What we aim to encourage***

This section identifies certain types of venues and initiatives the licensing authority aims to encourage in order to promote an inclusive evening and night-time economy not simply focused on the consumption of alcohol. We aim to encourage:

- Premises that will extend the diversity of entertainment and attract a wider range of participants
- Live music, especially original material, which will provide a range of live performances and styles of music, provided that such entertainment does not undermine the licensing objectives
- National cultural institutions, global sports events and cultural festivals
- Non-drink-led premises, including restaurants, cafes, theatres and cinemas
- Communication and integration with local residents and businesses through licensees consulting with those in the local area prior to an application



- Participation in Pubwatches, off licence forums and other crime-reduction partnerships
- Engagement with the NITENET radio scheme and DISC secure information sharing platform by city centre venues through the Cityco Manchester Business Crime Reduction Partnership
- Designing out crime in the layout of the premises

### **Section 7: Local factors**

This section sets out key issues that applicants are expected to take into account relevant to the individual characteristics of the premises and address any local factors relevant to their premises.

Having regard to this application, the Panel are recommended to have regard to the following Factors:

- Identified risk factors specific to the licensed premises
- Consistency with relevant Council strategies
- The proximity of the premises to local residents and other local businesses, particularly in relation to the potential for nuisance

### **Section 8: Manchester's standards to promote the licensing objectives**

This section identifies the standards that the licensing authority expects of licensed premises in Manchester. It is recognised that not all standards will be appropriate to apply in every situation to every premises. The degree to which standards would be appropriate is expected to be proportionate to the risk posed against the promotion of the licensing objectives having regard to the individual circumstances of the premises. The standards are not exhaustive and the licensing authority will have regard to any relevant issues raised in any representation that may fall outside them.

MS1 Implement effective security measures at the premises

MS2 Effective general management of the premises

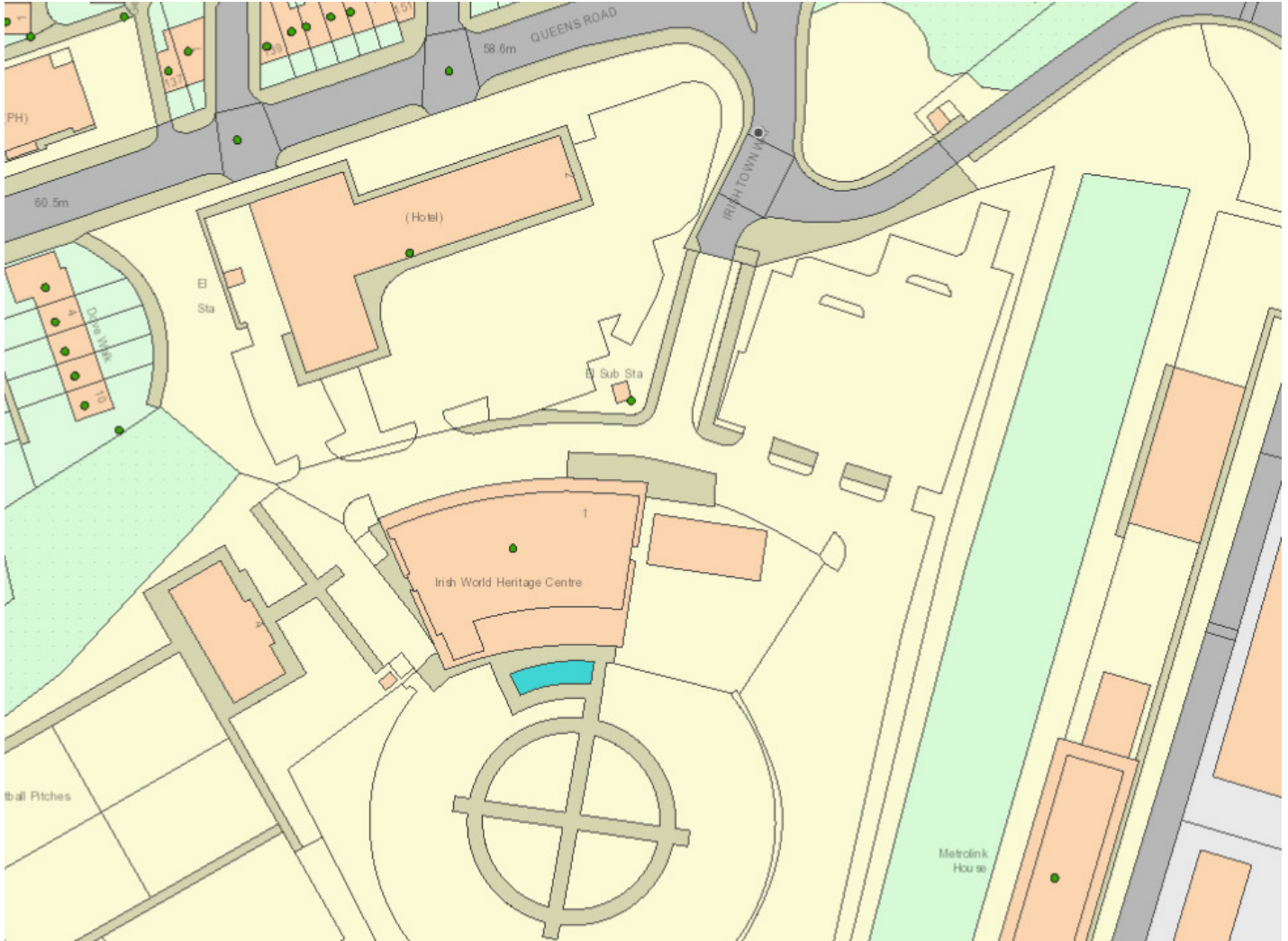
MS3 Responsible promotion and sale of alcohol

MS9 Effectively manage exterior spaces (eg beer gardens, smoking areas, table and chair areas on the highway)

## **5. Conclusion**

- 5.1 A licensing authority must carry out its functions under this Act ("licensing functions") with a view to promoting the licensing objectives:
- the prevention of crime and disorder
  - public safety;
  - the prevention of public nuisance; and
  - the protection of children from harm.
- 5.2 In reaching the decision, regard must be had to relevant provisions of the national guidance and the Council's licensing policy statement.
- 5.3 The Panel must consider what steps are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

- 5.4 In making its decision with regard to this interim steps hearing, the steps the Panel can take are:
- a) To modify the conditions of the licence;
  - b) To exclude any of the licensable activities from the licence;
  - c) To remove the designated premises supervisor;
  - d) To suspend the licence
- 5.5 The conditions of the licence, with the exception of mandatory conditions in Appendix 1 of the licence, may be modified to alter or omit any of them or to add any new condition, including restricting the times at which licensable activities authorised by the licence can take place.
- 5.6 All licensing determinations should be considered on the individual merits of the application.
- 5.7 The Panel's determination should be evidence-based, justified as being appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and proportionate to what it is intended to achieve. Findings on any issues of fact should be on the balance of probability.
- 5.8 It is important that a licensing authority should give comprehensive reasons for its decisions in anticipation of any appeals. Failure to give adequate reasons could itself give rise to grounds for an appeal.
- 5.9 **The Panel is asked to determine what steps, as set out in 5.4 above, are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives.**

I am giving this certificate because I am of the opinion that other procedures under the Licensing Act are inappropriate in this case, because<sup>4</sup>:

The standard review of the premises licence under section 51 Licensing Act 2003 is inappropriate due to length of time a standard review would take, there are serious concerns as to the extreme violence which has occurred at the premises and the lack of action from the premises.

Greater Manchester Police (GMP) will say that the premises are associated with Serious Disorder. Therefore due to the Serious Disorder which has taken place at the premises GMP feel that it is necessary for an expedited review to take

The premises are situated on Irish Town Way in the Cheetham area of Manchester and the premises licence was issued on 17<sup>th</sup> January 2013. The Premises Licence Holder (PLH) is Irish World Heritage Centre and the Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) is Martin Connolly who has held this position since the licence was issued.

The incident which has triggered this Summary Review is as follows:

At 2256 hours on Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> March 2022 GMP received a 999 call stating that there was a group of travellers fighting at The Irish Heritage centre and that one male was unconscious.

At 2258 GMP received another 999 call from a female stating that there was a large disturbance at the premises and that guns and knives had been mentioned.

At 2301 hours there was a further update that the unconscious male was now conscious but that the fighting was still continuing and that the assistant manager was trying to separate them but no weapons had been seen.

Due to the mention of guns and knives a rendezvous point was established and police patrols made for this location and by 2302 hours there were patrols at the RV point.

At 2304 hours there was a further update to say that the fighting was still continuing and that there was glass everywhere and an old lady had been hit.

At 2305 hours the caller stated that there were 10 males and 5 females fighting with 2 other men and another female and a separate caller stated that the males were wrecking the place.

A further call came in at the same time from yet another caller stating that there were over 40 travellers fighting and that chairs and glasses were being thrown everywhere. A female could be heard shouting for people to get into the kitchen. North West Ambulance Service were asked to make to the RV point but not to go straight to the premises due to the mention of guns and knives.

At 2306 hours the GMP call taker noted that they could hear screaming and shouting on the other end of the call.

At 2308 hours there was a further update that the offenders were destroying the place and were behind the bar throwing bottles and glasses.

At the same time yet another call came in stating that there were many people injured and that there were 10-15 people fighting and that an old lady who was an NHS volunteer had been punched in the face.

At 2310 hours the initial caller stated that the group were all travellers and that they had been in the premises most of the day.

At the same time yet another caller stated that there were people fighting in the foyer and were getting bottles and glasses from the bar. They stated that there was a security guard on site.

At 2312 hours the caller updated that the fighting was still ongoing and that they were using glasses.

At 2313 hours the caller stated that the staff were hiding in the kitchen but the offenders were trying to get into the kitchen.

At 2314 hours another caller stated that there was fighting in the car park and that there were vehicles crashing into each other.

At the same time a GMP Firearms patrol was despatched straight to the premises.

At 2317 the Firearms officers arrived and immediately requested the GMP Tactical Aid Unit to attend and the location as well as dog handlers.

By 2322 hours the incident had been brought under control and the police

officers started sweeping the building to look for injured parties and victims. As a result of this incident a Crime for Violent Disorder and a Crime for Grievous Bodily Harm hve been submitted.

Clearly this was a terrifying incident for all those who were caught up in it, both staff and customers alike, and unfortunately an elderly female volunteer has received nasty facial injuries as a result of being punched in the face. GMP are concerned that there may be reprisals in relation to this incident as there often are following violent brawls of this nature and GMP's senior officers are not confident that the premises remaining open as a licensed premises is in the best interests of public safety.

The powers contained under section 53A of the Licensing Act 2003 are necessary and proportionate in light of the association that the premises has to Serious Disorder.

In the interim Greater Manchester Police would request that the Licensing Authority consider suspension of the Premises Licence until the full review is heard before the committee. Serious Disorder has occurred at the premises and until the Licensing Committee hear the full review and all the evidence that will be disclosed, to allow the premises to continue to operate as a licensed premises gives concerns that further violence will occur at the premises and the licensing objectives will be further undermined. Greater Manchester Police will say that the licensing objectives of the Prevention of Crime and Disorder and Public Safety can only be promoted if the premises licence was suspended until the final determination of the summary review application.

The standard review of the premises licence under section 51 Licensing Act 2003 is inappropriate due to length of time a standard review would take. There are serious concerns as to the serious level of violence that has occurred. Greater Manchester Police believe that Serious Disorder has occurred at the premises.

## Annex 1 – Mandatory conditions

### Door Supervisors

Only individuals licensed by the Security Industry Authority shall be used at the premises to undertake security activities, which include guarding against: -

- a) Unauthorised access or occupation (e.g. through door supervision),
- b) Outbreaks of disorder, or
- c) Damage

### Supply of alcohol

1. No supply of alcohol may be made under this premises licence:
  - a) At a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence or,
  - b) At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended
2. Every retail sale or supply of alcohol made under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
3.
  - (1) The responsible person shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
  - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises in a manner which carries a significant risk of leading or contributing to crime and disorder, prejudice to public safety, public nuisance, or harm to children–
    - a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to–
      - i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
      - ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
    - b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic (other than any promotion or discount available to an individual in respect of alcohol for consumption at a table meal, as defined in section 159 of the Act);
    - c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less;
    - d) provision of free or discounted alcohol in relation to the viewing on the premises of a sporting event, where that provision is dependent on–
      - i) the outcome of a race, competition or other event or process, or
      - ii) the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring;
    - e) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
4. The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
5. The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
6.
  - (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
  - (2) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of

age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.

7. The responsible person shall ensure that–
- a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures–
    - i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
    - ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
    - iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
  - b) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.

### **Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the operating schedule**

1. All staff shall be trained to recognise and reuse service to customers who have had too much to drink, to handle potential trouble makers and to defuse difficult situations.
2. CCTV shall be installed at the premises and all recorded images kept for 28 days.
3. There shall be prominent signage requesting customer respect local residents and leave quietly.
4. No person in possession of a drink in a sealed or unsealed container shall be allowed to enter the premises, except for the purposes.
5. No drink shall be removed from the premises in an unsealed container.
6. No person under the age of 18 shall be permitted on the premises after 2100 unless attending a private/pre-booked function.
7. No person under the age of 18 shall be allowed in the Bar after 2100.

### **Annex 3 – Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority**

1. Telephone numbers for local taxi firms should be displayed in a prominent position and provide a facility for customers to order cabs with a ring back service.
2. The management must have in operation a strategy for the quiet and rapid dispersal of their customers from the premises throughout the evening and early hours of the morning. Such a strategy will need to be approved by the relevant responsible authorities.
3. No music noise shall emanate from the premises so as to cause nuisance to any of the nearby residential properties.
4. All windows and doors to be kept closed except for access and egress whilst regulated entertainment is taking place.
5. Management and staff shall ensure that noise from customers using external areas is kept to a minimum during operational hours. This would include any persons that are smoking.
6. Glass waste should not be emptied in any external area except between the hours of 0730 and 2000 Monday to Friday and 0830 and 2000 Saturday, Sunday and Bank Holidays.
