Summary

1.0 Introduction

1.1 This report details proposed changes to the remit of some of the Council's Scrutiny Committees, following consultation with all six Scrutiny Chairs, the Executive Leader and Strategic Directors

2.0 Background

- 2.1 Whilst each of the six Scrutiny Committees have a wide remit of areas that come under their individual area of responsibility, it has been recognised that some of the Committees have a greater number of areas than others.
- 2.3 Although each Committee is responsible for developing and determining its own work programme for a Municipal Year, capacity has to be built into this to allow for items of business to be submitted that can not be foreseen far in advance which require Scrutiny Committees to consider in advance of any decisions being taken.
- 2.2 Whilst acknowledging that effective scrutiny does not require every area within a Committee's remit to be scrutinised in any given Municipal Year, for those Committees that have a large number of areas that it is responsible for scrutinising, this places a greater strain on their ability to ensure the Committee is fulfilling its role to the best of its abilities.

3.0 Proposals

- 3.1 It is recognised that the current demands across the committees vary and an element of alignment is necessary. Appendix 1 details the current remit of the Council's Scrutiny Committees.
- 3.2 As such it is proposed that a small number of items move committee, for example aligning all compliance in one place to enable an improved alignment of areas of responsibility. Appendix 2 details the proposed revised remit of the Council's Scrutiny Committees.
- 3.3 In addition it has also been recognised that names of committees should reflect the areas they are responsible for. Economy Scrutiny committee also covers all areas of regeneration and housing and should be reflected in its title. The Environment and Climate Change Scrutiny Committee also has responsibility for Scrutinising areas within the Council's Neighbourhood Services Directorate such as waste, recycling, parks and green spaces and as such, it is felt that this should be accurately reflected in the Committees title.

4.0 Recommendations

4.1 The recommendations are set out at the beginning of this report.
