Summary

In 2020/21, as in previous years, the local authority will need to determine the local formula to distribute funding to mainstream schools and academies for the financial year 2020/21. The formula applies directly to maintained schools for the financial year, and for academies it will form the basis for their funding, distributed to them by the Education and Skills Funding Agency. The local formula must comply with statutory guidance, but within these restrictions the final decision on the formula rests with the local authority after consultation with schools and the Schools Forum. In consultation with Schools Forum and schools the local authority made the decision to maintain the existing local funding formula (LFF) in full in 2018/19 - 2019/20. This report provides consideration as to whether this approach continues 2020/21 onwards.

Recommendations and Conclusions

Based on the analysis undertaken by the Local Authority it is recommended that Schools Forum approves maintaining the Local Funding Formula for 2020/21. Overall the LFF, Model 1, provides slightly greater funding across all schools and thus provides greater protection in the transition to hard NFF. This approach will be reviewed in light of further announcements related to the implementation of hard NFF.

23 September 2019 - Schools Forum: Schools Funding Settlement

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 A report was brought to Forum on 23rd September 2019 detailing Manchester's local funding formula (LFF) factors as compared to the national funding formula (NFF) factors in 2019/20. The Department for Education (DfE) have confirmed their commitment to moving to a hard funding formula nationally, but have not established implementation timelines.
- 1.2 In 2018/19 and 2019/20 the Council continued with the LFF as it was felt this afforded Manchester schools financial stability whilst preparing for the eventual move towards the hard NFF. In the September 2019 Schools Forum meeting, the Forum asked the Local Authority to consider whether Manchester LFF needs closer alignment to the NFF.

2. NATIONAL FUNDING FORMULA

- 2.1 Mainstream schools funding continues to be delivered in most part through the Schools Block of the Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG). As for 2019/20, each Local Authority (LA) area allocation will be determined using a National Funding Formula (NFF). The LA are responsible for distributing this funding between schools through a Local Funding Formula, (LFF). This is known as a 'soft' NFF.
- 2.2 More LA areas are closer to NFF based on their 2019/20 formulae than in 2018/19. The implementation date of a hard formula is still to be established.
- 2.3 In 2018/19 and 2019/20, the Local Authority made the decision to continue full implementation of the LFF. This afforded schools financial stability whilst preparing for the eventual move towards the hard NFF. Schools Forum is asked to reconsider what steps, if any, should be taken to align LFF factors to those under the NFF to ensure that Manchester continues to adopt the most financially viable options for local schools. Table one below shows a breakdown by formula factor of 2019/20 schools block budgets under three different models:
 - i. **Model 1:** 2019/20 LFF (current)
 - ii. **Model 2:** 2019/20 APT re-run with NFF values, uplifted by Manchester's Area Cost Adjustment (ACA)
 - iii. **Model 3:** 2019/20 APT re-run with 50% transition to NFF values on each formula factor, uplifted by ACA

This is broken down at a school level in Appendix one.

2.4 Model 1 results in slightly higher funding levels than under Models 2 and 3. Net budgets across the three models offer similar levels of funding, which is because the protection provided by the Minimum Funding Guarantee (MFG) largely negates the impact of changes to individual pupil-led factor values in the short term. There is no apparent pattern to the protection provided under MFG; it simply protects pupil-led funding levels from year-on-year changes in pupil characteristics.

Key points to note are:

- a) Basic entitlement funding under Model 1 is £28.6m higher than under Model 2 (NFF values).
- b) Deprivation funding under Model 1 LFF is £17.4m lower than under Model 2; and £8.8m lower than under Model 3.
- c) Net funding across basic entitlement and deprivation, however, is highest under the current Model 1. At the moment, Manchester funnels a majority of

- formula funding under basic entitlement due to significant levels of inherent deprivation in the city.
- d) Lump sum funding is highest under the current Model 1. To note, school-led funding is not protected under MFG.
- 2.5 Analysis of the school level budgets detailed in Appendix one finds that 54% of Manchester schools would have seen gains in 2019/20 under Model 2, whilst the other 46% of schools are better off under the current Model 1. 0% of schools are better off under Model 3, which suggests that it would not be beneficial to schools to gradually transition towards NFF factor values, and rather, an immediate transition may be seen as more favourable.
- 2.6 Schools better off under Model 2 saw gains ranging between +0.01% and +1.04% of schools' budgets, whilst losses under Model 2 ranged from between -0.01% and -2.89%. The average gain in budget under Model 2 (compared to Model 1) was £2,026 and the average loss was -£2,672.
- 2.7 Total funding categorised by phases (with "all-through" schools classed as "secondary") across the three models can be seen in Graph one below.

Graph one: 2019/20 Funding to Primary and Secondary phases under Models 1, 2, and 3



The primary to secondary funding ratio under the models is comparable on the whole, rounded to 57:43 primary:secondary across all three models.

3. FUNDING FLOOR PROTECTION

- 3.1 Stage one of the funding process outlines funding allocated to the local authority by the DfE under the NFF, which is currently protected by a funding floor protection. This ensured that Manchester's 2019/20 NFF allocations saw at least a 1% gain in per-pupil funding rates when compared to 2017/18 APT baselines.
- 3.2 The funding floor calculation has changed from 2020/21 onwards with:
 - a) the baseline moving from 2017/18 data to 2019/20 NFF allocations,
 - b) the protection increasing from 1% to 1.84%.
 - This change is overall expected to <u>reduce</u> the amount received in additional funding under the funding floor.
- 3.3 Illustrative NFF allocations for 2019/20 show that the LA received additional funding due to the funding floor totalling c.£26m. Provisional NFF allocations for 2020/21 show that the amount received by the LA under the funding floor has reduced to c.£18m for next year, and it should be noted that this reduction comes after the 4% increase to NFF factor values announced in September.
- 3.4 The LA expects that this additional funding received under the funding floor protection will continue to decrease on a year-by-year basis, as use of rolling baselines will gradually minimise the amount of protection required. The DfE have yet to confirm how the funding floor baseline will operate in future years, and while it is expected that it will remain part of the funding formula, the LA estimates that in a 5-6 year period, the funding floor protection will not be required.

4. CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- 4.1 Mirroring the NFF values exactly has a negligible impact on budgets in the short term due to the function of the MFG. Considering a more gradual move towards NFF values has similar results on the whole, however, does not benefit schools on an individual level.
- 4.2 Whilst net levels of funding under the current LFF Model 1 and Model 2 with NFF values are similar, Model 2 moves a significant proportion of the funding under the MFG protection, which currently stands at +0.5%. MFG levels for 2020/21 will range between +0.5% and +1.84% as per DfE guidelines, however, it is clear that adopting Model 2 leaves schools vulnerable to fluctuations in overall funding caused by fluctuating levels of protection.
- 4.3 Based on the analysis undertaken by the Local Authority it is recommended that Schools Forum approves maintaining the Local Funding Formula for 2020/21. Overall the LFF, Model 1, provides slightly greater funding across all schools and thus provides greater protection in the transition to a hard NFF. This approach will

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- be reviewed in light of further announcements related to the implementation of hard NFF.

Summary

The recently published provisional Dedicated School Grant (DSG) allocations 2020/21 are provided in the report. Final notification of DSG allocations are expected week commencing 16 December 2019.

Schools Finance Regulations sets out that certain amounts can be deducted from maintained school budgets with the approval of the sector representative at Schools Forum.

Recommendations

Schools Forum members are asked to note and comment on:

- ➤ DSG 2020/21 provisional funding announcements.
- ➤ That the Local Authority is not seeking to request for a block transfer from schools block to high needs.
- Manchester is expected to receive the confirmed DSG 2020/21 notification week commencing 16 December 2019.
- > Pressure arising from the 20% reduction to the central schools block historical commitments.

In accordance with Schools Forum powers, maintained school representatives are asked to approve de-delegation for the following:

- ➤ Trade Union Duties (£186k which at current pupil levels equates to £4.82 per school aged pupil section 7)
- ➤ Education Services Grant General Duties (£500k which at current pupil levels equates to £12.39 per school aged pupil section 8).
- Free School Meal checking software (£42k which at current pupil levels equates to £1.05 per school aged pupil section9).

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 Following the three year funding announcements in September, the Department for Education (DfE) have recently published provisional Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG) allocations 2020/21, based on October 2018 pupil data. To note, actual DSG allocations received in December will be based on October 2019 pupil data and will vary.
- 1.2 The provisional allocations to the four DSG blocks: schools, high needs, central services schools and early years block is outlined in table one below.

SCHOOLS BLOCK

- 2.1 Schools block funding for a local authority area is calculated bottom up school-by-school on the basis of the National Fund Formula (NFF). Local authority areas above the NFF, like Manchester, receive funding floor protection, which totals c.£26m for Manchester in 2019/20. If the NFF was applied in full with no funding floor protection, Manchester's schools would receive on average £350 per pupil less than they do now.
- The recent announcement includes funding for cost pressures, in light of which all authorities will see at least a 1.84% per pupil increase in allocations. At current pupil levels, Manchester's schools block funding is likely to increase by 1.22% (£4.972m) in cash terms.
- 2.3 Tables two demonstrates the percentage changes in per pupil terms on local authorities when comparing the provisional 2020/21 NFF allocations against their respective 2019/20 NFF baselines. Manchester has seen the lowest percentage increase (both in cash terms and on a per pupil basis) when compared against other North West authorities. When compared to other core cities, Manchester has had the second lowest increase on a per pupil basis (Nottingham being lowest).

- 2.4 The percentage per pupil increase between 2019/20 and 2020/21 NFF allocations for Manchester is estimated at an average of 2.13% by the DfE. However, this average includes an anomalous increase for a newly opened free school, which is excluded to arrive at the more realistic per pupil increase of 1.85%.
- 2.5 Given the provisional schools block allocations for 2020/21, which funds individual primary, secondary and all-through schools' budgets, along with the confirmation of Teachers' Pay and Pension Grants, it is not expected that the recent funding announcement causes significant concern for Manchester schools.
- 2.6 Beyond 2020/21 DfE have reiterated their intention to implement a hard NFF. Manchester could potentially see a sharp reduction in funding levels if the transition to the formula does not include a funding floor protection mechanism. Consideration to Manchester moving closer to NFF is detailed in agenda item 4 of the papers provided to Forum.

Impact of National Funding Formula increases on the Local Funding Formula to Manchester Schools

- 2.7 Local Authorities are able to provide for a per pupil protection, Minimum Funding Guarantee (MFG) calculation, in their formula of between +0.5% to +1.84%; amounts outside of this would need separate approval from the Secretary of State. It is also permissible to limit gains under capping arrangements; capping to be no greater than the amount of MFG.
- 2.8 Given the provisional 2020/21 schools block funding the local authority are seeking to set a minimum MFG of at least +0.5%. The MFG rate will be confirmed once the cost of formula funding using the October 2019 census dataset is known and the DSG settlement is confirmed in December.
- 2.9 The DfE has applied a 4% increase to all core factors of the National Funding Formula, except free schools meal (cost of meal 1.8% to be applied), and premises which remain at historical cost. Manchester's funding levels have seen an average 1.85% per pupil increase and continue to be protected under the funding floor. Schools Forum is asked to note that the Local Authority will seek

to increase funding for: pupils, pupil characteristics, and protection under the MFG as much as is affordable within the formula. This is ultimately dependent on data from the October 2019 census, including numbers on roll and deprivation characteristics, and as yet a figure cannot be confirmed. Further updates will be brought to Forum after final 2020/21 DSG allocations are published in December.

3 HIGH NEEDS BLOCK (HNB)

- 3.1 All local authorities will receive an increase of at least 8% per head for two to eighteen year old population through the funding floor. Above this minimum increase, the formula will be capped at 17%, allowing LAs to see a maximum increase of up to 17% per head of population. Provisionally Manchester's HNB should receive an increase of £11.31m in 2020/21.
- 3.2 The LA is not seeking to transfer from schools block to the high needs block (HNB), based on the provisional 2020/21 DSG allocation. The increase in the HNB allocation is to be used to manage the existing pressures and fund anticipated high needs pupil growth, as set out in section three of this report.
- 3.3 Table three below demonstrates the percentage changes in per pupil terms on local authorities when comparing the provisional 2020/21 NFF allocations against their respective 2019/20 NFF baselines. The table outlines the number of authorities where the funding floor (minimum) and the funding cap (maximum) has been applied.
- 3.4 Manchester's per pupil increase has not been impacted by either the 8% funding floor or 17% funding cap. Manchester's provisional per pupil rate has increased by 14.33%, which is higher than the North West average, and slightly below the average for the Core cities. Manchester's per pupil value has increased from £590 to £674 relative to the 2019/20 NFF baseline.

3.5 Manchester's HNB is projected to overspend by £3.42m 2019/20, giving an expected DSG overspend of £2.46m. The additional £11.31m will fund existing

shortfalls and expected growth in both special schools and education, health & care plans (EHCPs) in 2020/21, detailed in table four below. The DfE three year announcement did not include information on how much of the additional funds will be earmarked for high needs allocation 2021/22 onwards. The DfE have stated at a recent conference the HNB increase has been front-loaded due to the current pressures within this block.

3.6 If there is no change to Manchester HNB allocations from 2021/22 onwards, there will be an in-year deficit of c.£4.40m 2022/23. Table four below shows an overview of the financial outcomes for the next three years if no population changes are applied. Schools Forum is asked to note that the local authority is seeking assurance from the DfE that population increases are to be applied to HNB funding allocation 2021/22 onwards.

4. EARLY YEARS BLOCK (EYB)

4.1 September's announcement included an additional £66m nationally for early year's provision. DfE plan to use this additional sum to fund increases to early years hourly funding rates for all authorities on the two year old offer and for the vast majority of regions on the three & four year old entitlement. Manchester saw increases of 1.6% and 1.7% to the two and three & four year old rates, respectively. Table five below shows the impact of this provisional increase on Manchester's early years block funding level.

4.2 Provisional EYB allocations for 2020/21 have not yet been released by the DfE. However, based on the Spring 2019 census data updated with the increased rates (as in table five above), the estimated EYB is £41.761m, shown in table six below. This is an estimated increase of £0.65m compared to current 2019/20 EYB funding.

4.3 In 2019/20, Manchester received a total of £338k for the Maintained Nursery Schools supplementary funding grant, this is passported equally to the two MNSs, which equates to roughly 32% of Manchester MNSs' total early years block allocations. The DfE has confirmed that in 2020/21, the MNS supplementary grant will be allocated to local authorities at their 2019/20 rate.

5. CENTRAL SERVICES SCHOOL BLOCK (CSSB)

- The CSSB funding is made up of two parts; historic commitments based on lagged actual cost, and on-going responsibilities where funding is formula driven (90% via a per pupil rate and 10% deprivation). The provisional 2020/21 CSSB allocation shows a reduction of £155k, broken down as follows:
 - ➤ Historic commitment reduced by 20% = £72k
 - ➤ On-going responsibilities per pupil allocation reduced by 2.5% = £83k
- 5.2 The historic commitment funding covers the commitment for unsupported borrowing against a school's capital scheme of £358k per year, the scheme runs

until 2032/33. The 20% reduction 2020/21 creates a pressure for the CSSB. Beyond 2020/21 it has not been confirmed whether the 20% reduction in the funding for historic commitments will continue. In the past, the DfE have repeatedly stated that they expect such commitments to be wound up sooner rather than later. Given the risk of further reductions to this part of the DSG, options needs to be developed and considered given that the repayment of borrowing continues until 2033.

5.3 Seven of the North West authorities, and two of the core cities, including Manchester received the maximum loss of -2.50% per head for on-going commitments in the CSSB, as demonstrated in table seven below.

- 5.4 The on-going responsibilities element of the CSSB funding covers:
 Admissions, Schools Forum, Copyright licenses and responsibilities LAs hold
 for all schools. The indicative reduction of £83k is a result of the per pupil rate
 change from £42.62 to £41.58 based on October 2018 pupil numbers on roll
 (NOR). It is expected that c.2k pupil increase in the October 2019 census will
 mitigate the drop in the per pupil rate for 2020/21.
- 5.5 Beyond 2020/21 it is expected that the 2.5% per pupil downward adjustment to the on-going responsibilities of the CSSB will continue for another 10 years. Manchester's on-going expected pupil numbers increases will offset part of the impact of reduced per pupil amount in the short term. Further modelling will be undertaken to assess to what extent the reduction will need managing in the future.

6. SCHOOLS BLOCK DE-DELEGATION

6.1 Schools Finance Regulations set out that certain amounts can be deducted from maintained school budgets with the approval of sector representatives at Schools Forum. Most of the items concerned were previously centrally top-sliced so that the funding was not included in the total available for distribution by formula. The "de-delegation" approach means that the deductions occur after the formula has run and individual schools can see the cost of each element to their budget share.

- 6.2 The local authority is seeking Forum (maintained school representatives only) approval to de-delegate the following budgets 2020/21 in respect of maintained primary and secondary schools only:
 - ➤ Trade Union Facility £186k
 - > Education Services, general duties £0.5m
 - ➤ Free School Meal (FSM) checking software £42k

7. Trade Union Facility Arrangements

- 7.1 Facilities time is provided for specific Trade Unions representatives to represent staff in other schools and academies where required and cover for these representatives are reimbursed to the employing school through this budget. This covers the support of staff at all levels of seniority and includes representatives for a range of teaching and support staff from Trade Unions. Based on current academy conversions and current pupil numbers, this equates to a de-delegated budget of £186k, which is approximately £4.82 per pupil, which is a reduction compared to previous financial year at £6.14 per pupil.
- 7.2 The Union also offers this service on a traded basis to academies, special and nursery schools, at the same rate as maintained schools. Currently forty nine academies (83%), fifteen special schools (94%) and both nursery schools purchase this SLA. The increased take-up from academies 2019/20 compared to the previous financial year has enabled a reduced rate for both maintained and academies.
- 7.3 Schools Forum members representing maintained schools are asked to approve the de-delegation of the Trade Union budget 2020/21.

8. Education Services general (ESG) duties for maintained schools

8.1 It is proposed that £0.5m is held by the LA to cover statutory general duties which were previously covered through general element of education services grant. Table seven below provides an outline of the contribution to current general rate ESG funded budgets. Based on current academy conversions and estimated pupil numbers, this equates to a budget of £0.5m, which is approximately £12.39 per pupil.

8.2 Schools Forum members representing maintained schools are asked to approve the de-delegation of the ESG budget 2020/21.

9. Free School Meal Checking Software

- 9.1 Maintained schools use the online free school meals (FSM) software to check pupils' eligibility to free school meals. The online FSM system has helped schools maximise funding through DSG and Pupil Premium, identifying additional eligible pupils. Manchester in May 2018 secured, at a significant discount, a three-year software licence from Capita for maintained schools, at a total cost £123k. The cost of these licenses 2020/21 is £42k. At this stage, it is estimated to be £1.05 per pupil, but is subject to confirmation of the October 2019 census.
- 9.2 Schools Forum members representing maintained schools are asked to approve the de-delegation of the FSM software budget 2020/21.

10. CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- 10.1 All Schools Forum members are asked to note and comment on:
 - ➤ DSG 2020/21 provisional funding announcement.
 - No request for a block transfer from schools block to high needs.
 - ➤ Manchester expects to receive the confirmed DSG 2020/21 notification week commencing 16 December 2019.
 - Pressure arising from the 20% reduction to the central schools block historical commitments.
- 10.2 In accordance with Schools Forum powers, maintained schools

representatives are asked to approve de-delegation for the following:

- ➤ Trade Union Duties (£186k which at current pupil levels equates to £4.82 per school aged pupil section 7)
- Education Services Grant General Duties (£0.5m which at current pupil levels equates to £12.39 per school aged pupil section 8).
- Free School Meal checking software (£42k which at current pupil levels equates to £1.05 per school aged pupil section 9).

Summary

Manchester's approved Scheme for Financing Schools includes a schools balance control mechanism, which is designed to control and claw back, where appropriate, schools' excessive surplus balances. The automatic clawback is based on excessive balances above the allowable threshold that have been held for more than four years.

The outcome from the September 2019 appeals following the automatic clawback mechanism 2019/20 is provided in this report.

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 In total, 34 of 114 schools maintained by the local authority were subject to the automatic clawback this year, the clawback totalled £2.12m.
- 1.2 Manchester's balance control mechanism allows for schools to appeal the automatic clawback by submitting written evidence to a sub-group of the Schools Forum. The terms of reference for the sub-group is to review appeals against the automatic clawback of excessive balances held for more than four years. The panel's decision is final. Where the clawback is £100k or greater, individual schools can choose to send representatives to attend the panel while consideration is given to their appeal. The panels were held in September 2019 and were made up of four members of Schools Forum.

2. APPEALS PANEL

- 2.1 Of the 34 schools subject to the clawback, 29 appealed clawback decision. The panel's decision took into account:
 - any extenuating circumstances
 - > multi-year budgets, underlying budget assumptions applied to the individual school's budget planning.
- 2.2 At the time of writing this report, the outcomes are: no appeals were rescinded, 26 clawback decisions were upheld (£1.443m), one decision was partially up-held (£23k), and two are on-hold, to be re-considered at a later date (£0.554m). Please see table one for a breakdown.
