#### 1. <u>Introduction</u>

- 1.1 On 24/01/2022, an application for the variation of an existing Premises Licence under s34 of the Licensing Act 2003 was made in respect of One Eight Six Didsbury, 700 Wilmslow Road, Manchester, M20 2DN in the Didsbury West ward of Manchester. A location map of the premises is attached at Appendix 1.
- 1.2 A 28-day public consultation exercise was undertaken in accordance with Licensing Act 2003 regulations; requiring the application to be advertised by the displaying of a blue notice at or on the premises, a notice published in a newspaper or similar circulating in the local area, and details of the application published on the Council's website.
- 1.3 Representations may be made for or against an application during the consultation period. To be 'relevant' and, therefore, able to be taken into account in determining the application, they must be about the likely effect of the grant of the premises licence on the promotion of the licensing objectives. Where representations are made by persons who are not a responsible authority, they must not be frivolous or vexatious.
- 1.4 Relevant representations have been received in respect of this application and so it must be determined by a Licensing Hearing Panel in accordance with the Council's Constitution.

#### 2. Current Licence

2.1 The premises licence holder is 1862 Ltd and a copy of the current licence is attached at **Appendix 2.** 

#### 3. The Application

- 3.1 A copy of the application is attached at **Appendix 3.**
- 3.2 The variation application is for:
  - The addition of Live Music and Recorded Music
  - The extension of the hours for the provision of Alcohol and late night refreshment
  - The extension of the opening hours

In accordance with the Live Music Act 2012 and Deregulation Act 2015, performances of Live Music and Recorded Music between the hours of 0800 and 2300 hours have been deregulated and so should not be regarded as licensable activities for the purposes of this application.

3.2.1 Any further details provided relating to any of the individual licensable activities are specified on the application form at **Appendix 3**.

#### 3.3 Activities unsuitable for children

3.3.1 The applicant has not highlighted any adult entertainment or services, activities, other entertainment or matters ancillary to the use of the premises that may give rise to concern in respect of children.

#### 3.4 Steps to promote the licensing objectives

- 3.4.1 The applicant proposes to promote the licensing objectives by taking the additional steps identified in the operating schedule.
- 3.4.2 These steps must be translated into conditions by the licensing authority to be included in any granted premises licence, unless the conditions are modified by the Panel following consideration of relevant representations. These conditions are set out in the Schedule of Conditions at **Appendix 6**.

#### 3.5 Further documentation accompanying the application

- 3.5.1 The applicant has submitted the following documents in support of their application, which are included with the application form, at **Appendix 4**:
  - Age Verification Policy
  - Dispersal Policy

#### 4. Relevant Representations

- 4.2 Summary of the representations:

- 4.3 Any conditions proposed by objectors are set out in the Schedule of Conditions at **Appendix 6**.
- 4.4 Agreements on conditions have not been reached with any objectors
- 5. Key Policies and Considerations
- 5.1 Legal Considerations
- 5.1.1 Hearings under the Licensing Act 2003 operate under the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.
- 5.2 **New Information**
- 5.2.1 In accordance with Regulation 18 of the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings)
  Regulations 2005, the authority may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their application, representations

or notice either before the hearing or, with the consent of all parties, at the hearing.

#### 5.3 **Hearsay Evidence**

5.3.1 The Panel may accept hearsay evidence and it will be a matter for the Panel to attach what weight to it that they consider appropriate. Hearsay evidence is evidence of something that a witness neither saw nor heard, but has heard or read about.

#### 5.4 The Secretary of State's Guidance to the Licensing Act 2003

- 5.4.1 The Secretary of State's Guidance to the Licensing Act 2003 is provided for all parties involved in licensing. It is a key medium for promoting best practice, ensuring consistent application of licensing powers across England and Wales and for promoting fairness, equal treatment and proportionality.
- 5.4.2 Section 4 of the 2003 Act provides that, in carrying out its functions, a licensing authority must 'have regard to' guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182. The Guidance is therefore binding on all licensing authorities to that extent. However, the Guidance cannot anticipate every possible scenario or set of circumstances that may arise and, as long as licensing authorities have properly understood this Guidance, they may depart from it if they have good reason to do so and can provide full reasons.
- 5.4.3 Departure from the Guidance could give rise to an appeal or judicial review, and the reasons given will then be a key consideration for the courts when considering the lawfulness and merits of any decision taken.

#### 5.5 Manchester Statement of Licensing Policy

- 5.5.1 Section 4 of the 2003 Act provides that, in carrying out its functions, a licensing authority must 'have regard to' its statement of licensing policy.
- 5.5.2 The Licensing Policy sets out the vision the licensing authority has for the regulation of licensed premises throughout Manchester and outlines the standards expected in order to ensure the promotion of the licensing objectives in the city. The Panel may depart from the policies should it consider doing so would benefit the promotion of the licensing objectives. Reasons are to be given for any such departure from the Policy.
- 5.5.3 Section 4 of the Policy (Operation of the Policy) sets out how the Licensing Policy is intended to be used in practice for licence applications and licensed premises.
- 5.5.4 Relevant to this application and the grounds of the representations made, the Panel are recommended to have regard to the following sections of the Policy:

#### Section 6: What we aim to encourage

This section identifies certain types of venues and initiatives the licensing authority aims to encourage in order to promote an inclusive evening and night-

time economy not simply focused on the consumption of alcohol. We aim to encourage:

- Premises that will extend the diversity of entertainment and attract a wider range of participants
- Live music, especially original material, which will provide a range of live performances and styles of music, provided that such entertainment does not undermine the licensing objectives
- National cultural institutions, global sports events and cultural festivals
- Non-drink-led premises, including restaurants, cafes, theatres and cinemas
- Communication and integration with local residents and businesses through licensees consulting with those in the local area prior to an application
- Participation in Pubwatches, off licence forums and other crime-reduction partnerships
- Engagement with the NITENET radio scheme and DISC secure information sharing platform by city centre venues through the Cityco Manchester Business Crime Reduction Partnership
- Designing out crime in the layout of the premises

#### Section 7: Local factors

This section sets out key issues that applicants are expected to take into account relevant to the individual characteristics of the premises when preparing their operating schedule and address any local factors relevant to their premises.

Having regard to the grounds of the representations made, the Panel are recommended to have regard to the following Factors:

- Identified risk factors specific to the licensed premises
- Evidence of pre-existing problems in the area
- Consistency with relevant Council strategies
- The proximity of the premises to local residents and other local businesses, particularly in relation to the potential for nuisance
- Ability to clean and maintain the street scene

#### Section 8: Manchester's standards to promote the licensing objectives

This section identifies the standards that the licensing authority expects of licensed premises in Manchester. It is recognised that not all standards will be appropriate to apply in every situation to every premises, and applicants are not obliged to include all standards in their operating schedule. The degree to which standards would be appropriate is expected to be proportionate to the risk posed against the promotion of the licensing objectives having regard to the individual circumstances of the premises. The standards are not exhaustive and the licensing authority will have regard to any relevant issues raised in any representation that may fall outside them.

- MS1 Implement effective security measures at the premises
- MS2 Effective general management of the premises
- MS3 Responsible promotion and sale of alcohol

- MS4 Prevent the use of illegal drugs, new psychoactive substances (NPS) and the spiking of drinks at the premises
- MS5 Prevent on-street consumption of alcohol
- MS6 Provide a Duty of Care for intoxicated or vulnerable customers and medical emergencies
- MS7 Maintain a safe capacity
- MS8 Prevent noise nuisance from the premises
- MS9 Effectively manage exterior spaces (e.g. beer gardens, smoking areas, table and chair areas on the highway)
- MS10 Operate effective cleansing arrangements, including ensuring the premises and surrounding area are kept clean and free of litter, and adequate arrangements for the secure and responsible storage of refuse
- MS11 Ensure the wellbeing of children on the premises
- MS12 Prevent underage sales of alcohol, including proxy sales

#### 6. **Conclusion**

- A licensing authority must carry out its functions under this Act ("licensing functions") with a view to promoting the licensing objectives:
  - the prevention of crime and disorder
  - public safety;
  - the prevention of public nuisance; and
  - the protection of children from harm.
- In considering the matter, the Panel should take into account any representations or objections that have been received from responsible authorities or other persons, and representations made by the applicant or premises user as the case may be. In reaching the decision, regard must also be had to relevant provisions of the national guidance and the Council's licensing policy statement.
- 6.3 The Panel must take such of the steps set out below that it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:
  - To grant the licence subject to the conditions consistent with the operating schedule accompanying the application, which the Panel may modify to such extent as they consider appropriate;
  - b) To reject the whole or part of the application
- 6.4 The conditions consistent with the operating schedule may be modified to alter or omit any of them or to add any new condition, including restricting the times at which licensable activities authorised by the licence can take place.
- 6.5 However, conditions should not be imposed on a licence which are unrelated to the variation sought.
- 6.6 All licensing determinations should be considered on the individual merits of the application.

- 6.7 The Panel's determination should be evidence-based, justified as being appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and proportionate to what it is intended to achieve. Findings on any issues of fact should be on the balance of probability.
- 6.8 It is important that a licensing authority should give comprehensive reasons for its decisions in anticipation of any appeals. Failure to give adequate reasons could itself give rise to grounds for an appeal.
- 6.9 The Panel is asked to determine the application.

## Annex 1 – Mandatory conditions

## **Door Supervisors**

- 1. Only individuals licensed by the Security Industry Authority shall be used at the premises to undertake security activities, which include guarding against: -
  - (a) Unauthorised access or occupation (e.g. through door supervision),
  - (b) Outbreaks of disorder, or
  - (c) Damage,

unless otherwise entitled by virtue of section 4 of the Private Security Industry Act 2001 to carry out such activities.

## Supply of alcohol

- 2. No supply of alcohol may be made under this premises licence:
  - (a) At a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the

premises licence or,

- (b) At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- 3. Every retail sale or supply of alcohol made under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
  - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
  - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either
    - (a) a holographic mark, or
    - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 5. (1) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price, which is less than the permitted price.
  - (2) For the purposes of the condition set out in (1) above-
    - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979
    - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula-

$$P = D + (D \times V)$$

where-

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence
  - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
  - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
  - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer

to prevent the supply in question; and

- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- (3) Where the permitted price given by paragraph (2)(b) would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that subparagraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- (4) (a) Sub-paragraph (4)(b) applies where the permitted price given by paragraph (2)(b) on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
  - (b) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.
- 6. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
  - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises
    - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to
      - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
      - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
    - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
    - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
    - (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
    - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
- 7. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

- 8. The responsible person must ensure that
  - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures
    - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
    - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
    - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
  - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
  - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

For the purposes of conditions 6, 7 and 8 above, a responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

### Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the operating schedule

- 1. There shall be no irresponsible drinks promotions.
- 2. All staff shall receive training to ensure compliance with the Licensing Act 2003.
- 3. Full Health and Safety risk assessments shall be carried out at the premises.
- 4. Staff shall receive training in Health and safety and food issues as appropriate.
- 5. An effective waste management system shall be implemented.
- 6. Management shall carry out risk assessments regarding any school visits or children's parties at the premises.

## Annex 3 - Conditions attached after hearing by the licensing authority

- 1. There shall be no external speakers at the premises.
- 2. The outside area to be closed and cleared of patrons by 2300 hours every day of the week.

The purpose of this Dispersal Policy is to ensure, so far as it is possible, that minimum disturbance or nuisance is caused to our neighbours and to ensure that the operation of the premises makes the minimum impact upon the neighbourhood in relation to potential nuisance and anti-social behaviour. This will be achieved by exercising pro-active measures towards and at the end of the evening.

By ensuring that this Dispersal Policy document is brought to the attention of Management and Staff we will seek to encourage the efficient, controlled and safe dispersal of our patrons during our closing period.

- 1. At the end of the evening management and staff will assist with the orderly and gradual dispersal of patrons allowing a limited period of 'drinking-up' time. Measures to be taken during this period will include:
  - Staff members should visit each group or individual in the premises advising that the premises are now closed and that they should make preparations to leave the venue.
  - music levels should be reduced to a minimum or turned off completely
  - Lighting levels will be gradually increased
  - Staffing levels at service points may be reduced and staff redirected to other duties such as customer dispersal, glass collection and cloakroom duties.
  - Empty glasses should be collected from each table
- 2. Staff Members (including door personnel when employed) will advise patrons to leave the premises quickly and quietly out of respect for our neighbours.
- 3. Notices will be displayed requesting our customers to leave quietly and in an orderly manner out of consideration to neighbours and their attention will be drawn to these notices by members of staff.

- 4. There should be visible management and staff presence in the customer areas during closing time to ensure all customers leave quietly, orderly and quickly.
- 5. We will ensure the removal of all bottles and drinking receptacles from any patron before exiting the premises (this does not apply in the case of consumption in any delineated external drinking area.)
- 6. We will actively discourage our customers from assembling outside the premises at the end of the evening.

I would like to make comments regarding the proposed changes:

- There is already an issue with urine/ faeces / vomit on the side streets off Wilmslow Road, and that is from premises which close much earlier than this proposed variation – this is unpleasant and unsanitary for residents.
- There is already a public noise nuisance from people leaving premises on Wilmslow Road / Barlow Moor Road and cutting through the side streets en route home.
- There is already a public noise nuisance / danger to public safety from taxis picking up customers from the The Nelson and speeding round the one way system from Crossway to Churchwood Rd.
- There is already an issue with customers from The Nelson and Dog and Partridge standing on the pavements to smoke / drink – meaning residents have to walk into the road to avoid them / endure antisocial behaviour, which is a risk to public safety. The premises in question will mean this will be carried over to yet another pavement.
- There is already an issue with aggressive behaviour / crime and disorder due to excessive alcohol consumption in existing premises – eg smashed bottles, fights, public urination / defecation / vomiting

All the above points will apply to the new premises, and as the proposed opening hours are even later, it will mean there is more potential for public nuisance / crime and disorder.

. I have been under stress since I heard about the new changes to be made at 700 Wilmslow Rd.
The addition of music, the extension of the opening hours and the provision of alcohol for consumption both on and off the premises will definitely affect my disability.
I believe it will also cause a public nuisance. Noise coming from outside is common up until 2:00 as the Nelson pub is open until then. This makes it impossible for me to sleep and lack of sleep exacerbates my stress levels which in turn makes me ill. I cannot explain to you how ill I become. I'm already unable to work but I will be unable to function at all if the changes go ahead.
I would also like to point out that there is no police presence in Didsbury. In the event of fighting/violence etc, it will take police time to get there. This is, I believe, a safety factor that shouldn't be ignored. It may also increase crime and disorder.

I am totally against the idea of extending the licensing hours. When there is a south-westerly wind we clearly hear the motorway, an easterly wind would result in loud music booming around the village of Didsbury.

The bar is located at a busy junction and I can foresee waste paper, bottles and other rubbish being dumped by people who have probably been drinking heavily until these early hours. There could also be accidents. There is clearly a threat to public safety at this junction. I am writing in response to the application to amend the current licence for One Eight Six-700 Wilmslow Road.

I have serious concerns about the proposed alteration to the current licence. The extending of this licence by an extra hour to allow the premises to serve alcohol until 2am and to stay open to 2:30am in my opinion will cause a public nuisance to the local residents and also increase the chance of crime and public disorder in the local area.

Didsbury village is a largely residential area and an nightclub of the this type being allowed to operate to such late times will inevitably cause disturbance to the local residents. If the premises closes at 2:30am the patrons will not disperse the area until around 3am and the staff even later causing noise and potential anti-social behaviour for the local area.

In addition to this there are no parking facilities for this site so inevitably patrons and staff will need to park in the nearby residential streets, again causing disturbance to the local residents late at night.

I am also concerned that the extension to these operating hours will lead to a rise in antisocial behaviour, crime and public disorder. No other premises in the village operates till this time at night. Therefore this premises will become a focal point for anyone wanting to continue consuming alcohol until late in the morning. This I believe will lead to an increase in antisocial behaviour, violence and other associated crime. We currently have an incredibly low police presence in the village and I do not feel any issues caused by the extension of the licence hours will be adequately dealt with.

I am also very concerned that if this application is approved it will set a precedent for other business in the area to operate much later, leading to an increase in public nuisance, crime and public disorder.

I am not anti-business and I support any business that wants to operate in Didsbury but it should not be at the detriment to the local residents who live here.

## Representation

Outline your representation regarding the above application below. This representation should describe the likely effect of the grant of the licence/certificate on the licensing objectives and on the vicinity of the premises.

The Licensing & Out of Hours (LOOH) Team have considered the proposed variation application taking into account; any trading history at the premises, the location of the premises/ proximity of the premises to residential addresses and the four licensing objectives.

The premises have recently changed hands (October 2021) and have not yet reopened under new management. The LOOH team have therefore no trading history on how the premises would manage a late-night music venue within a residential area. LOOH have contacted the Premises Licence Holder (14/2/22) to attain more information but have not received a response to date.

The LOOH team have concerns directly relating to the Prevention of Public Nuisance licensing objective and the proposed terminal hours for licensable activities and opening hours. The premises currently benefit from the live music deregulation up to 11pm daily. The proposed extended hours for regulated entertainment are excessive and have the potential to prevent and disturb sleep:

up to midnight Sunday to Wednesday,

up to 1am on Thursdays and

up until 2am on Friday and Saturdays.

On leaving the premises, it is difficult for staff to contain the noise made by customers, especially when customers are away from the premises.

Manchester City Councils Statement of Licensing Policy (SLP) S7.31 states 'It is recognised that in spite of the quality of the operation of the business, where patrons are out of the control of the licensee, the lateness of the terminal hour for the premises will often be a contributory factor in the potential for disturbance.'

S 7.32 states 'Therefore, where its discretion is engaged, the authority will be mindful of the density of residential use in proximity to the premises and the level of risk of nuisance arising. The authority expects that terminal hours will normally be earlier to promote the licensing objectives for licensed premises located in areas with a higher density of residential property.' The LOOH team believe that the current de-regulation up to 11pm is a reasonable time for regulated entertainment to cease from Sunday to Thursdays when families will generally be getting up in the early morning for school/ work. The LOOH team propose a midnight finish for regulated entertainment on a Friday and Saturday, which would also aid a gradual dispersal. The LOOH request the remainder of the variation is refused.
