1. Introduction

- 1.1 On 18/01/2023, an application for the variation of an existing Premises Licence under s34 of the Licensing Act 2003 was made in respect of Area, 50 Sackville Street, Manchester, M1 3WF in the Piccadilly ward of Manchester. A location map of the premises is attached at **Appendix 1**.
- 1.2 A 28-day public consultation exercise was undertaken in accordance with Licensing Act 2003 regulations; requiring the application to be advertised by the displaying of a blue notice at or on the premises, a notice published in a newspaper or similar circulating in the local area, and details of the application published on the Council's website.
- 1.3 Representations may be made for or against an application during the consultation period. To be 'relevant' and, therefore, able to be taken into account in determining the application, they must be about the likely effect of the grant of the premises licence on the promotion of the licensing objectives. Where representations are made by persons who are not a responsible authority, they must not be frivolous or vexatious.
- 1.4 Relevant representations have been received in respect of this application and so it must be determined by a Licensing Hearing Panel in accordance with the Council's Constitution.

2. Current Licence

2.1 The premises licence holder is RVLC Limited and a copy of the current licence is attached at **Appendix 2**.

3. The Application

- 3.2.1 In accordance with the Live Music Act 2012 and Deregulation Act 2015, performances of Live Music and Recorded Music between the hours of 0800 and 2300 hours have been deregulated and so should not be regarded as licensable activities for the purposes of this application.
- 3.2.2 Any further details provided relating to any of the individual licensable activities are specified on the application form at **Appendix 3**.
- 3.3 Activities unsuitable for children
- 3.3.1 The applicant has not highlighted any adult entertainment or services, activities, other entertainment or matters ancillary to the use of the premises that may give rise to concern in respect of children.
- 3.4 Steps to promote the licensing objectives
- 3.4.1 Beyond the conditions already included in the currently granted Premises Licence, the applicant has not proposed any further steps or conditions to promote the licensing objectives.

4. Relevant Representations

4.1 A total of 11 relevant representations were received in respect of the application (**Appendix 4**). The personal details of all members of the public have been redacted. Original copies of these representation will be available to the Committee at the hearing.

- 4.3 The objectors have not proposed any conditions.
- 4.4 No agreements on conditions have been reached.
- 5. **Key Policies and Considerations**
- 5.1 Legal Considerations
- 5.1.1 Hearings under the Licensing Act 2003 operate under the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.
- 5.2 **New Information**
- 5.2.1 In accordance with Regulation 18 of the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005, the authority may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice either before the hearing or, with the consent of all parties, at the hearing.
- 5.3 **Hearsay Evidence**

5.3.1 The Panel may accept hearsay evidence and it will be a matter for the Panel to attach what weight to it that they consider appropriate. Hearsay evidence is evidence of something that a witness neither saw nor heard, but has heard or read about.

5.4 The Secretary of State's Guidance to the Licensing Act 2003

- 5.4.1 The Secretary of State's Guidance to the Licensing Act 2003 is provided for all parties involved in licensing. It is a key medium for promoting best practice, ensuring consistent application of licensing powers across England and Wales and for promoting fairness, equal treatment and proportionality.
- 5.4.2 Section 4 of the 2003 Act provides that, in carrying out its functions, a licensing authority must 'have regard to' guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182. The Guidance is therefore binding on all licensing authorities to that extent. However, the Guidance cannot anticipate every possible scenario or set of circumstances that may arise and, as long as licensing authorities have properly understood this Guidance, they may depart from it if they have good reason to do so and can provide full reasons.
- 5.4.3 Departure from the Guidance could give rise to an appeal or judicial review, and the reasons given will then be a key consideration for the courts when considering the lawfulness and merits of any decision taken.

5.5 Manchester Statement of Licensing Policy

- 5.5.1 Section 4 of the 2003 Act provides that, in carrying out its functions, a licensing authority must 'have regard to' its statement of licensing policy.
- 5.5.2 The Licensing Policy sets out the vision the licensing authority has for the regulation of licensed premises throughout Manchester and outlines the standards expected in order to ensure the promotion of the licensing objectives in the city. The Panel may depart from the policies should it consider doing so would benefit the promotion of the licensing objectives. Reasons are to be given for any such departure from the Policy.
- 5.5.3 Section 4 of the Policy (Operation of the Policy) sets out how the Licensing Policy is intended to be used in practice for licence applications and licensed premises.
- 5.5.4 Relevant to this application and the grounds of the representations made, the Panel are recommended to have regard to the following sections of the Policy:

Section 6: What we aim to encourage

This section identifies certain types of venues and initiatives the licensing authority aims to encourage in order to promote an inclusive evening and night-time economy not simply focused on the consumption of alcohol. We aim to encourage:

 Premises that will extend the diversity of entertainment and attract a wider range of participants

- Live music, especially original material, which will provide a range of live performances and styles of music, provided that such entertainment does not undermine the licensing objectives
- National cultural institutions, global sports events and cultural festivals
- Non-drink-led premises, including restaurants, cafes, theatres and cinemas
- Communication and integration with local residents and businesses through licensees consulting with those in the local area prior to an application
- Participation in Pubwatches, off licence forums and other crime-reduction partnerships
- Engagement with the NITENET radio scheme and DISC secure information sharing platform by city centre venues through the Cityco Manchester Business Crime Reduction Partnership
- Designing out crime in the layout of the premises

Section 7: Local factors

This section sets out key issues that applicants are expected to take into account relevant to the individual characteristics of the premises when preparing their operating schedule and address any local factors relevant to their premises.

Having regard to the grounds of the representations made, the Panel are recommended to have regard to the following Factors:

- Identified risk factors specific to the licensed premises
- Evidence of pre-existing problems in the area
- Consistency with relevant Council strategies
- The proximity of the premises to local residents and other local businesses, particularly in relation to the potential for nuisance
- Proximity to sensitive uses
- Ability to clean and maintain the street scene

Section 8: Manchester's standards to promote the licensing objectives

This section identifies the standards that the licensing authority expects of licensed premises in Manchester. It is recognised that not all standards will be appropriate to apply in every situation to every premises, and applicants are not obliged to include all standards in their operating schedule. The degree to which standards would be appropriate is expected to be proportionate to the risk posed against the promotion of the licensing objectives having regard to the individual circumstances of the premises. The standards are not exhaustive and the licensing authority will have regard to any relevant issues raised in any representation that may fall outside them.

MS1	Implement effective security measures at the premises
MS2	Effective general management of the premises
MS4	Prevent the use of illegal drugs, new psychoactive substances
	(NPS) and the spiking of drinks at the premises
MS7	Maintain a safe capacity
MS8	Prevent noise nuisance from the premises

MS10 Operate effective cleansing arrangements, including ensuring the premises and surrounding area are kept clean and free of litter, and adequate arrangements for the secure and responsible storage of refuse

6. **Conclusion**

- 6.1 A licensing authority must carry out its functions under this Act ("licensing functions") with a view to promoting the licensing objectives:
 - the prevention of crime and disorder
 - public safety;
 - the prevention of public nuisance; and
 - the protection of children from harm.
- 6.2 In considering the matter, the Panel should take into account any representations or objections that have been received from responsible authorities or other persons, and representations made by the applicant or premises user as the case may be. In reaching the decision, regard must also be had to relevant provisions of the national guidance and the Council's licensing policy statement.
- The Panel must take such of the steps set out below that it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:
 - To grant the licence subject to the conditions consistent with the operating schedule accompanying the application, which the Panel may modify to such extent as they consider appropriate;
 - b) To reject the whole or part of the application
- 6.4 The conditions consistent with the operating schedule may be modified to alter or omit any of them or to add any new condition, including restricting the times at which licensable activities authorised by the licence can take place.
- 6.5 However, conditions should not be imposed on a licence which are unrelated to the variation sought.
- 6.6 All licensing determinations should be considered on the individual merits of the application.
- 6.7 The Panel's determination should be evidence-based, justified as being appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and proportionate to what it is intended to achieve. Findings on any issues of fact should be on the balance of probability.
- 6.8 It is important that a licensing authority should give comprehensive reasons for its decisions in anticipation of any appeals. Failure to give adequate reasons could itself give rise to grounds for an appeal.
- 6.9 The Panel is asked to determine the application.

Annex 1 – Mandatory conditions

Door Supervisors

- 1. Only individuals licensed by the Security Industry Authority shall be used at the premises to undertake security activities, which include guarding against: -
 - (a) Unauthorised access or occupation (e.g. through door supervision),
 - (b) Outbreaks of disorder, or
 - (c) Damage,

unless otherwise entitled by virtue of section 4 of the Private Security Industry Act 2001 to carry out such activities.

Supply of alcohol

- 2. No supply of alcohol may be made under this premises licence:
 - (a) At a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence or,
 - (b) At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- 3. Every retail sale or supply of alcohol made under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either —
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 5. (1) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price, which is less than the permitted price.
 - (2) For the purposes of the condition set out in (1) above—
 - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula-

$$P = D + (D \times V)$$

where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol:
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence
 - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- (3) Where the permitted price given by paragraph (2)(b) would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that subparagraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- (4) (a) Sub-paragraph (4)(b) applies where the permitted price given by paragraph (2)(b) on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.

- (b) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.
- 6. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to
 - drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
 - (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
- 7. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 8. The responsible person must ensure that
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and

(c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

For the purposes of conditions 6, 7 and 8 above, a responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the operating schedule

- 1. The fire-fighting equipment shall be in the charge of a person who has been trained in its use, and that person, or some other suitable person deputised to be in charge of the fire-fighting equipment, shall be present whenever the premises are in use for the purpose of this licence, and also for such period before and after the use of the premises, as may be necessary to check that the fire-fighting equipment is in order.
- 2. The licence holder shall ensure that noise shall not emanate from the licensed premises such as to cause persons in the neighbourhood to be unreasonably disturbed. Any form of amplification shall be so controlled by the licensee so as to prevent such a disturbance.
- 3. The Licence holder shall at all times ensure that persons on or leaving the licensed premises conduct themselves in an orderly manner and do not in any way cause annoyance to residents and/or persons passing by.
- 4. The licence holder shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that persons leaving licensed premises and using adjacent car parks and highways do not conduct themselves in a manner so as to cause annoyance to residents and/or persons passing by.
- 5. Whilst the premises are being used for public entertainment, drunkenness or other disorderly conduct shall not be permitted. In case any disorderly conduct should occur, the Licensee shall assist in the capture, expulsion and conviction of the offender.
- 6. No glassware in the form of open bottles or glassware shall be taken in or off the premises.
- 7. Licensees, when door staff are in attendance, shall ensure that all glassware is removed from patrons entering or leaving the licensed area and subsequently safely disposed of.
- 8. Where the Licensee or his employer engages any persons at or about the entertainment premises in the capacity of security staff the Licensee shall maintain a log in a form approved by the Council, showing in respect of each period of duty of that person:

- a) the name, date of birth and residential address of that person:
- b) the time at which he / she commenced that period of duty with a signed acknowledgement by that person;
- c) the time at which he / she finished the period of duty with a signed acknowledgement by that person;
- d) any times during the period of duty when he / she was not on duty;
- e) if that person is not an employee of the Licensee or his / her employer, the name of the person by whom that security person is employed or through whom the services of that person were engaged.
- 9. The log shall be so kept that it can be readily inspected at any reasonable time by an authorised Officer of the Council or a Police Officer and, once a log has been completed, it must be retained on the premises for at least 12 months.
- 10. An adequate number of suitable and efficient fire-fighting appliances shall be installed and maintained in the said licensed premises to the satisfaction of the City Architect and a record of such maintenance is to be attached or fixed to each appliance.
- 11. All music (live or recorded) played must be channelled through the noise limiting device.
- 12. The premises shall become a member of, and maintain its membership of, the local Pub Watch scheme.
- 13. A sign shall be prominently located at the exit(s) requesting that customers leaving the premises do so quietly and with consideration to neighbours.

Annex 3 – Conditions attached after hearing by the licensing authority

- 1. 30 minutes before the premises closes to the public the volume of music shall be lowered to encourage dispersal.
- 2. Management shall liaise with local residents to resolve any problems associated with the carrying on of licensable activities. A direct telephone number for the manager of the premises shall be available to residents in the vicinity.
- 3. No rubbish, including bottles, shall be moved, removed or placed in outside areas between 23:00 and 07:00 hours.
- 4. Door staff shall remind patrons to leave quietly upon exiting the premises.
- 5. SIA trained door staff shall be employed, with a register kept of all door supervisors recording details of door supervisors, i.e. name, address, date of birth, badge number, time started and finished duty, each entry shall be signed by that person. That register shall be made available to an authorised officer of the council, the security industry or a police constable.

- 6. The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system. All public areas of the licensed premises, including all public entry and exit points, and the street environment shall be covered, enabling facial identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV cameras shall continually record while the premises are open to the public and recording shall be kept available and unedited for a minimum of 28 days with the date and time stamping. A staff member who is conversant with the operation of the CCTV system shall be present on the premises at all times when they are open to the public and shall be able to produce/download/burn CCTV images upon request by a Police Officer or an Authorised Officer of the Licensing Authority. Any footage shall be in a format that can be played back on a standard personal computer or standard DVD player. Where the recording is on a removable medium (i.e. compact disc, flash card etc), a secure storage system to store those recordings mediums shall be provided.
- 7. A member of staff employed at the premises shall attend at least 6 meetings per year of the Pub & Club Watch.
- 8. Persons under the age of 18 shall be allowed in the main bar provided they are taking a meal at the premises and are accompanied by a parent or guardian aged 18 years or over.
- 9. A maximum of 10 persons under the age of 18 shall be allowed in the private area in the lower ground floor of the bar to attend private functions provided they are accompanied by a parent or guardian aged 18 years or over.
- 10. No person aged under 18 shall be on the premises after 2000.
- 11. On Sunday to Thursday, door supervisors shall be on duty from 21:30 hours until the area immediately outside the premises is clear of customers at the close of business. Door supervisors shall ensure that persons arriving or departing do so without causing incidents of disorder or public nuisance. Door supervisors shall be employed at the ratio of 1 door supervisor for every 100 customers (or part thereof).
- 12. On Fridays and Saturdays, a minimum of 2 SIA registered door-staff shall be employed from 2100 hours until the area immediately outside the premises is clear of customers at the close of business. Door supervisors shall ensure that persons arriving or departing do so without causing incidents of disorder or public nuisance. When the occupancy exceeds 200 persons, additional door supervisors shall be employed at the ration of 1 door supervisor for every 100 customers (or part thereof).
- 13. The Challenge 25 Scheme shall be operated at the premises to ensure that any person who appears to be under the age of 25 shall provide documented proof that they are over 18 years of age before being allowed to purchase alcohol. Proof of age shall only comprise a passport, photo card Driving Licence, HM Forces warrant card or a card bearing the PASS hologram.
- 14. The premises shall display prominent signage indicating that the Challenge 25 Scheme is in operation.

- 15. An incident log (which may be electronically recorded) shall be kept at the premises for at least 6 months and made available upon request to Greater Manchester Police or an authorised officer of the licensing authority.
- 16. All staff shall be trained in recognising signs of drunkenness, how to refuse service, under-aged sales and the Conditions in force under the Premises licence. Documented records of training shall be kept for each member of staff. Training shall be regularly refreshed, and records shall be made available upon request by Greater Manchester Police or an Authorised Officer of the Licensing Authority.
- 17. The designated premises supervisor shall ensure that tables are cleared of all bottles and glasses on a regular basis during trading hours to avoid an accumulation of glassware.
- 18. The premises and immediate surrounding area shall be kept clean and free from litter at all times the premises are open to the public.
- 19. All waste shall be properly presented and placed out for collection no earlier than 30 minutes before the scheduled collection times.
- 20. A log shall be kept at the premises to record all refused sales of alcohol for the reasons that the persons are, or appear to be, under-age. The log shall record the date and time of the refusal and the name of the member of staff who refused the sale. The log shall be available on request by the Police or an Authorised Officer of Manchester City Council. The log shall be checked on a regular basis by the Designated Premises Supervisor to ensure that it is being used by staff and each check shall be recorded in the log.
- 21. A minimum of 7 days' notice shall be given to Greater Manchester Police and the Licensing and Out of Hours Team of any events held that are organised by an external promoter, including full details of the nature of the event and of the promoter.
- 22. All management and supervisory staff shall be trained in the Award for Personal Licence Holders following completion of a 2-month probation period.

The extension of licensing hours would make AREA one of the few establishments in the Gay Village area that is open between 3 and 5 AM on Fridays and Saturdays, attracting large crowds of late-night partygoers, many of whom are likely to be inebriated. This would inevitably lead to increased noise levels (public nuisance), which are already a significant problem in the building and are not limited to weekends only.

Furthermore, there is a risk that the sale of illegal substances will increase and become more widespread, creating a threat to public safety in terms of the clientele attracted and the crime that services that clientele. These are serious concerns that must be taken into consideration when deciding on the granting of an extended license.

I would like to draw your attention once more to the serious problems that residents faced with the club that occupied 50 Sackville Street before AREA. Despite the promises of the new proprietors to address these issues, their assurances have proven unreliable. The noise levels were unbearable for residents, and we hope that this situation will not be repeated with AREA.

In conclusion, I strongly urge the council to take my objections into consideration and to deny the application for an extended 5am license for AREA. The sound nuisance regulations must be enforced to ensure the safety, security, and quality of life of residents in Regency House.

1. **Introduction**

- On 21/04/2023, an application for the grant of a Premises Licence under s17 of the Licensing Act 2003 was made in respect of Affetto Food Ltd, 386 Barlow Moor Road, Manchester, M21 8BH in the Chorlton Park ward of Manchester. A location map and photograph of the premises is attached at **Appendix 1**.
- 1.2 A 28-day public consultation exercise was undertaken in accordance with Licensing Act 2003 regulations; requiring the application to be advertised by the displaying of a blue notice at or on the premises, a notice published in a newspaper or similar circulating in the local area, and details of the application published on the Council's website.
- 1.3 Representations may be made for or against an application during the consultation period. To be 'relevant' and, therefore, able to be taken into account in determining the application, they must be about the likely effect of the grant of the premises licence on the promotion of the licensing objectives. Where representations are made by persons who are not a responsible authority, they must not be frivolous or vexatious.
- 1.4 Relevant representations have been received in respect of this application and so it must be determined by a Licensing Hearing Panel in accordance with the Council's Constitution.

2. The Application

- 2.1 A copy of the application is attached at **Appendix 2.**
- 2.2 The applicant is Affetto Food Ltd.
- 2.3 The description of the premises given by the applicant is: 'Delicatessen / Restaurant'
- 2.4 The proposed designated premises supervisor is Mr Andrea Stephen D'Avanzo.

2.5 The licensable activities applied for:

The supply of alcohol for consumption both on and off the premises: Monday to Sunday 8am to 12midnight

- 2.5.1 In accordance with the Live Music Act 2012 and Deregulation Act 2015, performances of Live Music and Recorded Music between the hours of 0800 and 2300 hours have been deregulated and so should not be regarded as licensable activities for the purposes of this application.
- 2.5.2 Any further details provided relating to any of the individual licensable activities are specified on the application form at **Appendix 2**.

2.6 Activities unsuitable for children

2.6.1 The applicant has not highlighted any adult entertainment or services, activities, other entertainment or matters ancillary to the use of the premises that may give rise to concern in respect of children.

2.7 Steps to promote the licensing objectives

- 2.7.1 The applicant proposes to promote the licensing objectives by taking the steps identified in the operating schedule.
- 2.7.2 These steps must be translated into conditions by the licensing authority to be included in any granted premises licence, unless the conditions are modified by the Panel following consideration of relevant representations. These conditions are set out in the Schedule of Conditions at **Appendix 4**.

3. Relevant Representations

A total of 6 relevant representations were received in respect of the application (**Appendix 3**), with 2 being submitted as joint representations. The personal details of all members of the public have been redacted. Original copies of these representations will be available to the Panel at the hearing.

- 3.2 Summary of the representations:

	Of those representations submitted against the application the general consensus amongst those objecting is that the granting of a premises licence for the premises at 386 Barlow Moor Road would have a detrimental effect on the upholding and enforcement of the Four Licensing Conditions and would also impact negatively upon their wellbeing.	
	It has been reported by several objectors that, presently, there exists an ongoing issue with day-time traffic accessing adjacent roads to the premises and frequent instances of unauthorised and inconsiderate parking on pavements and, also, cars and other vehicles blocking residents driveways, which subsequently forces pedestrians to walk on the highway, thereby creating associate safety	

issues. It is felt that authorising licensable activities for the timings as applied for would only serve to extend the current traffic/parking problems into the late evening, which would be/is unacceptable for local residents.

There is also a belief that there would be an increased risk of antisocial behaviour / public nuisance issues arising from the premises should the application be granted for the hours and licensable activities applied for. The main concern expressed is the potential for noise and antisocial behaviour likely to be generated by intoxicated patrons/customers of the premises, particularly into the evening period The plan to operate an external drinking area at the premises is also of concern to those residents who have objected to the application (moreso those who have young children) and it has also been reported that there are existing issues in the locality relating to littering, public urination and rodent infestation, and that it would be highly likely that these issues would only be exacerbated should the application be granted.

Several objectors have also expressed concern that the existing levels of crime within the local area could increase as a direct consequence of the premises being allowed to operate and could lead to a direct impact upon nearby residential premises. It was reported by a number of the objectors that a burglary incident had taken place at a premises immediately adjacent to the premises at 386 Barlow Moor Road and that the incident had had a direct impact upon properties immediately adjoining the premises.

It is felt that the local area already has sufficient, similar licensed premises and that the addition of another outlet offering the same licensable activities (albeit with longer trading hours) would offer no additional benefit to the local area and economy. The overall consensus is that the application should be refused.

The sole representation in support of the application does express some of those same concerns as expressed by those objecting to

the application; parking issues and potential noise/public nuisance issues etc. (and that it is to be hoped that whoever operates the premises does so in a responsible and considerate manner towards local residents), but it is stated in the representation that it would be/is their preference to have 'A well run restaurant at the end of the road rather than a boarded up shop.'.

4. Key Policies and Considerations

4.1 Legal Considerations

4.1.1 Hearings under the Licensing Act 2003 operate under the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

4.2 **New Information**

4.2.1 In accordance with Regulation 18 of the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings)
Regulations 2005, the authority may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice either before the hearing or, with the consent of all parties, at the hearing.

4.3 **Hearsay Evidence**

4.3.1 The Panel may accept hearsay evidence and it will be a matter for the Panel to attach what weight to it that they consider appropriate. Hearsay evidence is evidence of something that a witness neither saw nor heard, but has heard or read about.

4.4 The Secretary of State's Guidance to the Licensing Act 2003

- 4.4.1 The Secretary of State's Guidance to the Licensing Act 2003 is provided for all parties involved in licensing. It is a key medium for promoting best practice, ensuring consistent application of licensing powers across England and Wales and for promoting fairness, equal treatment and proportionality.
- 4.4.2 Section 4 of the 2003 Act provides that, in carrying out its functions, a licensing authority must 'have regard to' guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182. The Guidance is therefore binding on all licensing authorities to that extent. However, the Guidance cannot anticipate every possible scenario or set of circumstances that may arise and, as long as licensing authorities have properly understood this Guidance, they may depart from it if they have good reason to do so and can provide full reasons.
- 4.4.3 Departure from the Guidance could give rise to an appeal or judicial review, and the reasons given will then be a key consideration for the courts when considering the lawfulness and merits of any decision taken.

4.5 Manchester Statement of Licensing Policy

- 4.5.1 Section 4 of the 2003 Act provides that, in carrying out its functions, a licensing authority must 'have regard to' its statement of licensing policy.
- 4.5.2 The Licensing Policy sets out the vision the licensing authority has for the regulation of licensed premises throughout Manchester and outlines the standards expected in order to ensure the promotion of the licensing objectives in the city. The Panel may depart from the policies should it consider doing so would benefit the promotion of the licensing objectives. Reasons are to be given for any such departure from the Policy.
- 4.5.3 Section 4 of the Policy (Operation of the Policy) sets out how the Licensing Policy is intended to be used in practice for licence applications and licensed premises.
- 4.5.4 Relevant to this application and the grounds of the representations made, the Panel are recommended to have regard to the following sections of the Policy:

Section 6: What we aim to encourage

This section identifies certain types of venues and initiatives the licensing authority aims to encourage in order to promote an inclusive evening and night-time economy not simply focused on the consumption of alcohol. We aim to encourage:

- Premises that will extend the diversity of entertainment and attract a wider range of participants
- Live music, especially original material, which will provide a range of live performances and styles of music, provided that such entertainment does not undermine the licensing objectives
- National cultural institutions, global sports events and cultural festivals
- Non-drink-led premises, including restaurants, cafes, theatres and cinemas
- Communication and integration with local residents and businesses through licensees consulting with those in the local area prior to an application
- Participation in Pubwatches, off licence forums and other crimereduction partnerships
- Engagement with the NITENET radio scheme and DISC secure information sharing platform by city centre venues through the Cityco Manchester Business Crime Reduction Partnership
- Designing out crime in the layout of the premises

Section 7: Local factors

This section sets out key issues that applicants are expected to take into account relevant to the individual characteristics of the premises when preparing their operating schedule and address any local factors relevant to their premises.

Having regard to the grounds of the representations made, the Panel are recommended to have regard to the following Factors:

- Evidence of pre-existing problems in the area
- Consistency with relevant Council strategies
- The proximity of the premises to local residents and other local businesses, particularly in relation to the potential for nuisance
- Ability to clean and maintain the street scene

Section 8: Manchester's standards to promote the licensing objectives

This section identifies the standards that the licensing authority expects of licensed premises in Manchester. It is recognised that not all standards will be appropriate to apply in every situation to every premises, and applicants are not obliged to include all standards in their operating schedule. The degree to which standards would be appropriate is expected to be proportionate to the risk posed against the promotion of the licensing objectives having regard to the individual circumstances of the premises. The standards are not exhaustive and the licensing authority will have regard to any relevant issues raised in any representation that may fall outside them.

- MS1 Implement effective security measures at the premises
- MS2 Effective general management of the premises
- MS3 Responsible promotion and sale of alcohol
- MS5 Prevent on-street consumption of alcohol
- MS8 Prevent noise nuisance from the premises
- MS10 Operate effective cleansing arrangements, including ensuring the premises and surrounding area are kept clean and free of litter, and adequate arrangements for the secure and responsible storage of refuse
- MS12 Prevent underage sales of alcohol, including proxy sales

5. Conclusion

- 5.1 A licensing authority must carry out its functions under this Act ("licensing functions") with a view to promoting the licensing objectives:
 - the prevention of crime and disorder
 - public safety;
 - the prevention of public nuisance; and
 - the protection of children from harm.
- 5.2 In considering the matter, the Panel should take into account any representations or objections that have been received from responsible authorities or other persons, and representations made by the applicant or premises user as the case may be. In reaching the decision, regard must also be had to relevant provisions of the national guidance and the Council's licensing policy statement.
- 5.3 Having regard to the representations, the Panel must take such of the steps set out below that it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:
 - a) To grant the licence subject to:

- i. the conditions consistent with the operating schedule accompanying the application, which the Panel may modify to such extent as they consider appropriate, and
- ii. any mandatory conditions that must be included in the licence;
- b) To exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;
- c) To refuse to specify the person proposed in the application as the designated premises supervisor;
- d) To reject the application.
- 5.4 The conditions consistent with the operating schedule may be modified to alter or omit any of them or to add any new condition, including restricting the times at which licensable activities authorised by the licence can take place.
- 5.5 All licensing determinations should be considered on the individual merits of the application.
- 5.6 The Panel's determination should be evidence-based, justified as being appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and proportionate to what it is intended to achieve. Findings on any issues of fact should be on the balance of probability.
- 5.7 It is important that a licensing authority should give comprehensive reasons for its decisions in anticipation of any appeals. Failure to give adequate reasons could itself give rise to grounds for an appeal.
- 5.8 The Panel is asked to determine the application.

a) General – all four licensing objectives (b, c, d and e) (please read guidance note 10)

The Licensee shall ensure that all times when the premises are for any licensable activity, there are sufficient competent staff on duty at the premises for the purpose of fulfilling the terms and conditions of the licence and for preventing crime and disorder. The Licensee shall ensure that all staff will undertake training in their responsibilities in relation to the sale of alcohol, particularly with regard to drunkenness and underage persons.

Supply of alcohol

- 1- No supply of alcohol may be made:
 - (a) At a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence or,
 - (b) At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.

(c)

- 2 Every retail sale or supply of alcohol made under will be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4 A responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price, which is less than the permitted price.
- 5 A responsible person will ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- 6 -The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

- 1 A full CCTV system shall be maintained and operated at the premises with cameras positioned both internally and externally.
- 2 Recorded CCTV images shall be maintained and stored for a period of twenty-eight days and shall be produced to the Police or Licensing Authority upon request.
- 3 CCTV shall be in operation at any time a person is in the premises. Where CCTV is recorded onto a hard drive system, any DVDs subsequently produced shall be in a format so it can be played back on a standard PC or DVD player.
- 4 Any person left in charge of the premises must be trained in the use of any such CCTV equipment, and be able to produce CCTV images to an officer from a responsible authority upon request.
- 5 Plans indicating the position of CCTV cameras to be submitted to GMP prior to the premises opening.
- 6 Open containers of alcohol shall not be removed from the premises, save for consumption in the delineated external area shown on the plan attached to the licence.

c) Public safety

- 1. A first aid box shall be available at the premises at all times.
- 2. Regular safety checks shall be carried out by staff.
- 3. Management shall liaise with Greater Manchester Fire Authority as necessary to ensure compliance with all necessary fire regulations.
- 4. The premises shall maintain an Incident Log and public liability insurance.

d) The prevention of public nuisance


- 1. Noise from the premises shall not be such as to cause a noise nuisance to occupants of nearby premises.
- 2. The exterior of the building shall be cleared of litter at regular intervals.
- 3. Notices shall be positioned at the exits to the building requesting customers to leave in a quiet manner.
- 4. Doors and windows at the premises are to remain closed after 11pm, save for access and egress.
- 5. An Al Fresco and Smoking Policy shall be implemented and adhered to
- 6. Deliveries, servicing and collections, including waste collections shall not take place outside the following 0730 to 2000 Monday to Saturday. There shall be no deliveries or waste collections on Sundays or Bank Holidays.
- 7. No noise shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.

e) The protection of children from harm

- 1. The premises licence holder certificate holder will ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - a. The designated premises supervisor will ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - b. The policy will require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 25 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either
 - i. a holographic mark, or
 - ii. an ultraviolet feature.
- 2. Staff training shall include the Challenge 21 and 25 Policy and its operation. In particular, staff shall be trained to take such action as is necessary to prevent the sale of alcohol to persons over the age of 18 where those customers are engaged in the distribution of alcohol to persons under the age of 18.
- 3. All staff will be trained for UNDERAGE SALES PREVENTION regularly.
- 4. A register of refused sales shall be kept and maintained on the premises.

Dear Planning department.

. I have the following objections.

- a. Hours that alcohol will be sold. There are many older people and young children living on this road. There are also many people who work. This is a residential road. It is not acceptable for people to be drinking alcohol until midnight on weekdays and 0200 am on bank holidays. This will cause difficulties to people who need to sleep. The requirement that people smoke outside will mean that there is considerable noise which will affect those in the houses close to the property. This is likely to be made worse because there is a small garden/waste area to the side of the property. IF there are plans to put tables there for guests to drink and eat then the noise will spread up the road and affect many of the local residents. This will be a public nuisance.
- b. Hours that the premises will be open. Even if alcohol is not being sold, it is likely that there will be noise as guests come and go. This will also be a public nuisance.
- c. Lack of available parking. I had to arrange to park my car in a driveway due to the difficulties in parking. It is sometimes the case that guests are unable to find parking space on the street. Parking difficulties are particularly acute in the evening when those living in the road are back from work. There is nowhere for the guests of this establishment to park. This is a public safety issue.



I am also concerned that my street will feel less safe and will be less safe with a restaurant/ bar serving alcohol late into the night at the end of the road due to antisocial behaviour as a result of intoxication with alcohol. I would not be in favour of a premises serving alcohol late into the night within such close proximity to my home.

We should like to raise our concerns about this Premises Licensing (new) Application.

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These are:

1. Public safety

Traffic and parking on Maple Avenue

There is already a problem with day-time traffic and parking in our street due to people wanting to shop in Chorlton or who are employed in Chorlton but live elsewhere. This would be greatly increased by the proposed business and would extend into evening and night-time hours and public holidays. Cars coming into our street, parking on pavements, and needing to turn on the street and in our driveways would increase the danger to children, older and disabled people, cyclists, and animals. Since is tree-lined, many people cannot walk on the pavements where the trees grow and so walk along the roadway. Increased traffic, especially in dark evenings, would increase the danger for residents and non-residential pedestrians.

Parking on pavements on Barlow Moor Road

Some cars already park on the pavement in front of 386 Barlow Moor Road, causing difficulties for pedestrians, especially anyone who has a sight or mobility disability. (See attached photograph 1.) We are concerned that this would become a greater problem if the proposed shop and restaurant used that space for employee parking, delivery parking, customer parking, or to place tables and seating areas on the pavement.

Air quality and pollution

The air quality in the centre of Chorlton and on our street is poor and is likely to be damaging the health of residents, especially children growing up here. Although we hope that the road improvements currently being undertaken in Chorlton might

alleviate this problem, an increase in traffic on Barlow Moor Road and would undermine intended improvements. Rodent infestation There is a recognised problem of rats in the alleyways leading off Barlow Moor Road nearer to the centre of Chorlton, and in other areas of Chorlton such as Beech Road, where there are numerous licensed eateries and bars. The rats are attracted by the food waste from these. We are concerned that the extension of the hospitality areas of Barlow Moor Road, the more residential parts of Barlow Moor Road and adjoining avenues, would attract rats into our gardens. (The possibility of this is suggested by the sudden appearance of rats in our gardens during the Covid lockdown periods when restaurants in central Chorlton were closed and rats searched further for food sources.) Rats are clearly a health hazard to residents, including children. To our knowledge, the only access to 386 Barlow Moor Road is through the front door. If so, all waste will need to be removed through this door and possibly be stored on the pavement or in the small garden adjoining **Debris** There is already an intermittent problem with debris discarded from the shop and flats at this address into our garden and side pathway. This is evidenced by the accident caused when a broken metal stool and a strip of artificial grass fell from 386 Barlow Moor Road in April 2020. one of the residents tripped over these on 13th April 2020, while taking rubbish from the house to the refuse bins in our side passage. His face was sliced open to the bone and he needed plastic surgery treatment that night at Wythenshawe

Hospital and was also given a scan to check for brain damage. We are worried that this sort of hazard might be increased.

2. Public nuisance

Noise and litter

We are concerned about likely noise levels during the long opening and licensing hours that have been applied for. It seems inevitable that customers and deliveries will increase the noise levels for residents, disturbing normal residential life. If customers congregate outside the restaurant to smoke, vape, or drink (as with many Chorlton bars and eateries), this would affect the quality of life for residents, and will create more problems with noise and litter (especially discarded vape cartridges etc) as well as further damage to the increasingly-threatened urban green environment and ecology.

Entry to 386 Barlow Moor Road is directly from the pavement. A 'smoking area' will inevitably be on the pavement and is likely to cause smoking-related litter.

Fumes

We are also concerned that fumes from kitchen extraction/exhaust systems will come into our side passage and garden, inhibiting our ability to use and enjoy the

space around our property without exposure to unpleasant fumes and toxic gases produced by commercial cooking.

3. Crime and Disorder

We are worried that changes in the nature of the business lead to further crime and the possibility of danger to our house, possessions and persons. On 14th April 2023 there was a break-in to the Vape shop and 386 Barlow Moor Road. The burglar
 We are concerned that attracting more customers and possibly rowdy behaviour to the building could increase criminal behaviour affecting us and our property.

Chorlton has a very large number of bars and restaurants. The addition of another licensed restaurant – especially one with extremely long opening hours and on a stretch of Barlow Moor Road that has previously been free from such businesses – is unnecessary to the local economy. It threatens the well-being of neighbouring residents, including children and older people, would create public nuisance, and could increase Chorlton's problems with crime and disorder.

We hope you will consider these issues when your deliberate the licensing application for 386 Barlow Moor Road and reject it.

- On 24/04/2023, an application for the variation of an existing Premises Licence under s34 of the Licensing Act 2003 was made in respect of Seven Sins, 43 Lever Street, Manchester, M1 1FN in the Piccadilly ward of Manchester. A location map of the premises is attached at **Appendix 1**.
- 1.2 A 28-day public consultation exercise was undertaken in accordance with Licensing Act 2003 regulations; requiring the application to be advertised by the displaying of a blue notice at or on the premises, a notice published in a newspaper or similar circulating in the local area, and details of the application published on the Council's website.
- 1.3 Representations may be made for or against an application during the consultation period. To be 'relevant' and, therefore, able to be taken into account in determining the application, they must be about the likely effect of the grant of the premises licence on the promotion of the licensing objectives. Where representations are made by persons who are not a responsible authority, they must not be frivolous or vexatious.
- 1.4 Relevant representations have been received in respect of this application and so it must be determined by a Licensing Hearing Panel in accordance with the Council's Constitution.

2. Current Licence

2.1 The premises licence holder is St Joseph Limited and a copy of the current licence is attached at **Appendix 2**.

3. The Application

- 3.1 A copy of the application is attached at **Appendix 3.**
- 3.2 The variation is to:
 - increase the hours for the supply of alcohol to 1100 to 0200 on Sunday to Wednesday
 - increase the hours for recorded music to 1100 to 0200 on Sunday to Wednesday
 - increase the hours for late night refreshment to 2300 to 0200 Monday to Sunday
 - increase the opening hours to 1100 to 0230 Sunday to Wednesday
 - add a number of conditions to Annex 2. The conditions requested to be added are included in full in Appendices 3 (Application) and 5 (Schedule of Conditions)

The current and proposed hours are given on the next page.

- 3.2.1 In accordance with the Live Music Act 2012 and Deregulation Act 2015, performances of Live Music and Recorded Music between the hours of 0800 and 2300 hours have been deregulated and so should not be regarded as licensable activities for the purposes of this application.
- 3.2.2 Any further details provided relating to any of the individual licensable activities are specified on the application form at **Appendix 3**.
- 3.3 Activities unsuitable for children
- 3.3.1 The applicant has not highlighted any adult entertainment or services, activities, other entertainment or matters ancillary to the use of the premises that may give rise to concern in respect of children.
- 3.4 Steps to promote the licensing objectives
- 3.4.1 The applicant proposes to promote the licensing objectives by taking the steps identified in the operating schedule.
- 3.4.2 These steps must be translated into conditions by the licensing authority to be included in any granted premises licence, unless the conditions are modified by the Panel following consideration of relevant representations. These conditions are set out in the Schedule of Conditions at **Appendix 5**.

4. Relevant Representations

4.1 One relevant representation was received in respect of the application (**Appendix 4**). No redactions have been made as no personal details were included in the representation.

- 5.1.1 Hearings under the Licensing Act 2003 operate under the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.
- 5.2 **New Information**
- 5.2.1 In accordance with Regulation 18 of the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings)
 Regulations 2005, the authority may take into account documentary or other
 information produced by a party in support of their application, representations
 or notice either before the hearing or, with the consent of all parties, at the
 hearing.

5.3 **Hearsay Evidence**

5.3.1 The Panel may accept hearsay evidence and it will be a matter for the Panel to attach what weight to it that they consider appropriate. Hearsay evidence is evidence of something that a witness neither saw nor heard, but has heard or read about.

5.4 The Secretary of State's Guidance to the Licensing Act 2003

- 5.4.1 The Secretary of State's Guidance to the Licensing Act 2003 is provided for all parties involved in licensing. It is a key medium for promoting best practice, ensuring consistent application of licensing powers across England and Wales and for promoting fairness, equal treatment and proportionality.
- 5.4.2 Section 4 of the 2003 Act provides that, in carrying out its functions, a licensing authority must 'have regard to' guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182. The Guidance is therefore binding on all licensing authorities to that extent. However, the Guidance cannot anticipate every possible scenario or set of circumstances that may arise and, as long as licensing authorities have properly understood this Guidance, they may depart from it if they have good reason to do so and can provide full reasons.
- 5.4.3 Departure from the Guidance could give rise to an appeal or judicial review, and the reasons given will then be a key consideration for the courts when considering the lawfulness and merits of any decision taken.

5.5 Manchester Statement of Licensing Policy

- 5.5.1 Section 4 of the 2003 Act provides that, in carrying out its functions, a licensing authority must 'have regard to' its statement of licensing policy.
- 5.5.2 The Licensing Policy sets out the vision the licensing authority has for the regulation of licensed premises throughout Manchester and outlines the standards expected in order to ensure the promotion of the licensing objectives in the city. The Panel may depart from the policies should it consider doing so would benefit the promotion of the licensing objectives. Reasons are to be given for any such departure from the Policy.
- 5.5.3 Section 4 of the Policy (Operation of the Policy) sets out how the Licensing Policy is intended to be used in practice for licence applications and licensed premises.
- 5.5.4 Relevant to this application and the grounds of the representations made, the Panel are recommended to have regard to the following sections of the Policy:

Section 6: What we aim to encourage

This section identifies certain types of venues and initiatives the licensing authority aims to encourage in order to promote an inclusive evening and night-time economy not simply focused on the consumption of alcohol. We aim to encourage:



- 6.2 In considering the matter, the Panel should take into account any representations or objections that have been received from responsible authorities or other persons, and representations made by the applicant or premises user as the case may be. In reaching the decision, regard must also be had to relevant provisions of the national guidance and the Council's licensing policy statement.
- 6.3 The Panel must take such of the steps set out below that it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:
 - To grant the licence subject to the conditions consistent with the operating schedule accompanying the application, which the Panel may modify to such extent as they consider appropriate;
 - b) To reject the whole or part of the application
- 6.4 The conditions consistent with the operating schedule may be modified to alter or omit any of them or to add any new condition, including restricting the times at which licensable activities authorised by the licence can take place.
- 6.5 However, conditions should not be imposed on a licence which are unrelated to the variation sought.
- 6.6 All licensing determinations should be considered on the individual merits of the application.
- 6.7 The Panel's determination should be evidence-based, justified as being appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and proportionate to what it is intended to achieve. Findings on any issues of fact should be on the balance of probability.
- 6.8 It is important that a licensing authority should give comprehensive reasons for its decisions in anticipation of any appeals. Failure to give adequate reasons could itself give rise to grounds for an appeal.
- 6.9 The Panel is asked to determine the application.

 - (b) At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- 3. Every retail sale or supply of alcohol made under this licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 4. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 5. (1) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price, which is less than the permitted price.
 - (2) For the purposes of the condition set out in (1) above-
 - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula-

$$P = D + (D \times V)$$

where -

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence
 - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
 - (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
 - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence:
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- (3) Where the permitted price given by paragraph (2)(b) would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that subparagraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- (4) (a) Sub-paragraph (4)(b) applies where the permitted price given by paragraph (2)(b) on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
 - (b) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.
- 6. (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 - (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises
 - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to
 - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic

- in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
- 7. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 8. The responsible person must ensure that
 - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

For the purposes of conditions 6, 7 and 8 above, a responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.

Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the operating schedule

- 1. An effective and adequate internal and external CCTV system covering all high-risk areas shall be installed, maintained and operated at the premises.
- 2. The premises shall become a member of, and maintain its membership of, the local Pub and club network and work with City Safe.
- 3. Staff shall be provided with comprehensive, ongoing training to make them aware of all legislation relevant to their employment and shall include first aid/alcohol and drug awareness safety/evacuation procedures and child safety all training shall be logged

and recorded.

- 4. Regular written risk assessments shall be carried out in respect of all activities that take place at the premises.
- 5. The management and staff shall ensure that glasses are collected regularly. Staff shall make regular inspections for broken glass and staff shall clear any broken glass found away immediately.
- 6. Acoustic lobbies on all doors.
- 7. Till monitoring system shall be in place.
- 8. Double glazed windows shall be in place.

Annex 3 - Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority

- 1. The Challenge/Think 25 policy shall be implemented in full and appropriate identification sought from any person who appears to be under the age of 25. The only acceptable forms of identification shall be a passport, photographic driving licence and those carrying the PASS logo.
- 2. Staff training shall include the Challenge/Think 25 policy and its operation. In particular staff shall be trained to take such action as is necessary to prevent the sale of alcohol to persons over the age of 18, where those customers are engaged in the distribution of alcohol for persons under the age of 18. This training shall be given to a new member of staff before they commence paid employment.
- 3. No children under the age of 16 shall be on the premises after 2000. In addition, no children under the age of 18 shall be on the premises unaccompanied after 2100
- 4. No noise shall emanate from the premises nor vibration be transmitted through the structure of the premises which gives rise to a nuisance.
- 5. Deliveries/ waste disposal to take place between 0730 and 2000 Monday to Saturday. No deliveries/ waste disposal shall take place on Sundays or Bank Holidays.
- 6. The emptying of bottle bins shall take place between 0900 and 2000.
- 7. All windows and doors shall be kept closed during regulated entertainment except for access and egress to and from the premises.
- 8. No external speakers
- 9. Management shall ensure quiet dispersal of customers at closing time and that they leave the immediate vicinity of the premises in an orderly fashion.
- 10. The exterior of the building shall be cleared of litter during non-operational hours prior to opening and whilst the premises is open.
- 11. Smoking policy shall be submitted and approved by Public Protection prior to opening the premises to the public.
- 12. On a Friday and Saturday SIA registered door staff shall be employed at the premises at a ratio of 1:100 from 2100 hours until 30 minutes after closing to assist with the safe and orderly dispersal of customers. At all other times SIA door staff shall be employed at the premises in accordance with a risk assessment to be carried out by the DPS. When employed, door staff will wear high visibility arm bands.

7 Sins Smoking Policy

Licensing and Out of Hours (LOOH) have assessed the likely impact of the grant of this application taking into account a number of factors, including the hours and activities applied for, the nature of the area in which the premises is located and any potential risk that granting the application could have on any of the four licensing objectives.

As a result of this assessment the Licensing and Out of Hours Team have concerns of granting the application, in its current form, is likely to lead to the Public Safety objective being undermined.

In reaching this decision we have given particular consideration to Manchester City Council's Statement of Licensing Policy 2021 - 2026 specifically: Working to prevent the threat of terrorism.

The premises is located on Lever Street within the Northern Quarter district of the city centre. There are commercial properties nearby and a number of alcohol led licensed premises in close proximity.

The application is for a variation, to extend the terminal hour for the provision of regulated entertainment and the supply of alcohol as licensable activities permitted by the Premises Licence, until 02:00hrs, Sunday to Wednesday, to extend the terminal hour for the provision of late-night refreshments until 02:00hrs, Monday to Sunday and to increase the opening hours of the premises to 02:30hrs, Sunday to Wednesday.

Within the application there are no proposed steps regarding training staff in Counter Terrorism Awareness. Terror attacks have the potential to target

bars, pubs and nightclubs therefore relevant training should be in place for all staff.

Furthermore, a licensed premises in the city centre is expected to be prepared with regards to the threat of a terror attack and should have a documented security risk assessment in place.

To: Martyn's Law:

- At all times that the premises are open to the public for licensable activities, all staff on-duty at the premises, including all door supervisors, and all on-duty managers must have completed Action Counters Terrorism (ACT) Awareness e-learning training. 1. **Introduction**

- 1.1 On 27/04/2023, two applications for the variation of an existing Premises Licence under s34 of the Licensing Act 2003 were made in respect of Love Factory (formerly Summer of Love), Dantzic Street, Manchester, M4 4DD in the Cheetham ward of Manchester. A location map of both premises is attached at **Appendix 1**.
- 1.2 The applications were submitted at the same time, by the same person (on the same email), and both have the attracted the same representations. Both are known by the same name. On the basis that they are likely to be considered by the Committee at the same time, both have been included in this one set of papers. The differences are referred to in the papers.
- 1.3 A 28-day public consultation exercise was undertaken in accordance with Licensing Act 2003 regulations; requiring the applications to be advertised by the displaying of a blue notice at or on the premises, a notice published in a newspaper or similar circulating in the local area, and details of the applications published on the Council's website.
- 1.4 Representations may be made for or against an application during the consultation period. To be 'relevant' and, therefore, able to be taken into account in determining the application, they must be about the likely effect of the grant of the premises licence on the promotion of the licensing objectives. Where representations are made by persons who are not a responsible authority, they must not be frivolous or vexatious.
- 1.5 Relevant representations have been received in respect of each application and so they must be determined by a Licensing Hearing Panel in accordance with the Council's Constitution.

2. Current Licences

- 2.1 The premises licence holder of licence 260078 is Animal Crossing Music Ltd and a copy of the current licence is attached at **Appendix 2**.
- The premises licence holder of licence 272412 is Summer of Love Limited Ltd and a copy of the current licence is attached at **Appendix 2a**.

3. The Applications

- 3.1 A copy of the application to vary licence 260078 is attached at **Appendix 3.**
- 3.2 A copy of the application to vary licence 272412 is attached at **Appendix 3a**

3.3 Changes requested

The variations both request the same changes to hours, as follows:

To extend the hours for the sale of alcohol, regulated entertainment and opening as follows:

Sale of alcohol and Regulated Entertainment until 01:00 daily. Opening Hours until 01:30 daily.

In addition, one application - application 287631 - requests removal of the condition below and replacement with new conditions. The proposed new conditions are included in **Annex 5** "Schedule of Conditions"

Condition requested to be removed from licence 272412 (Condition 9 of Annex 2):

Other than the event 'The Summer of Love Festival' there shall be no amplified music in the marquees or in any of the external licensed areas after 20:00 hours.

For information: the current hours on each licence are the same and are as below.

Provision of regulated entertainment - both indoors and outdoors (plays, films, live music, recorded music, performances of dance and anything of a similar description to live music, recorded music or performances of dance):

Mon to Sun 11am to 11pm

Supply of alcohol for consumption both on and off the premises:

Mon to Sun 11am to 11pm

Opening hours:

Mon to Sun 11am to 11.30pm

Seasonal variation at New Year only applies to all activities and opening: From the start of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the to the end of permitted hours on New Year's Day

- 3.3.1 In accordance with the Live Music Act 2012 and Deregulation Act 2015, performances of Live Music and Recorded Music between the hours of 0800 and 2300 hours have been deregulated and so should not be regarded as licensable activities for the purposes of this application.
- 3.3.2 Any further details provided relating to any of the individual licensable activities are specified on the application forms at **Appendix 3 and 3a**.
- 3.3.3 The applicants have not highlighted any adult entertainment or services, activities, other entertainment or matters ancillary to the use of the premises that may give rise to concern in respect of children.
- 3.4 Steps to promote the licensing objectives
- 3.4.1 The applicants propose to promote the licensing objectives by taking the steps identified in the operating schedule.

- 3.4.2 These steps must be translated into conditions by the licensing authority to be included in any granted premises licence, unless the conditions are modified by the Panel following consideration of relevant representations. These conditions are set out in the Schedule of Conditions at **Appendix 5**.
- 3.5 Further documentation accompanying the application
- 3.5.1 The applications were each accompanied by a "sample noise report" in support of the application.

4. Relevant Representations

4.1 A total of 4 relevant representations were received in respect of each application. The representation from LOOH is the same for each but was submitted separately for each application; representations from residents were received once only and refer to both applications in the subject line. All representations are included in the one appendix, **Appendix 4.** The personal details of all members of the public have been redacted. Original copies of these representations will be available to the Committee at the hearing.

- 4.3 No conditions have been proposed by any objector so there are none to include in the Schedule of Conditions at **Appendix 5**.
- 4.4 No agreements on conditions have been reached with any objector.

5. **Key Policies and Considerations**

5.1 **Legal Considerations**

5.1.1 Hearings under the Licensing Act 2003 operate under the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

5.2 **New Information**

5.2.1 In accordance with Regulation 18 of the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings)
Regulations 2005, the authority may take into account documentary or other
information produced by a party in support of their application, representations
or notice either before the hearing or, with the consent of all parties, at the
hearing.

5.3 **Hearsay Evidence**

5.3.1 The Panel may accept hearsay evidence and it will be a matter for the Panel to attach what weight to it that they consider appropriate. Hearsay evidence is evidence of something that a witness neither saw nor heard, but has heard or read about.

5.4 The Secretary of State's Guidance to the Licensing Act 2003

- 5.4.1 The Secretary of State's Guidance to the Licensing Act 2003 is provided for all parties involved in licensing. It is a key medium for promoting best practice, ensuring consistent application of licensing powers across England and Wales and for promoting fairness, equal treatment and proportionality.
- 5.4.2 Section 4 of the 2003 Act provides that, in carrying out its functions, a licensing authority must 'have regard to' guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182. The Guidance is therefore binding on all licensing authorities to that extent. However, the Guidance cannot anticipate every possible scenario or set of circumstances that may arise and, as long as licensing authorities have properly understood this Guidance, they may depart from it if they have good reason to do so and can provide full reasons.
- 5.4.3 Departure from the Guidance could give rise to an appeal or judicial review, and the reasons given will then be a key consideration for the courts when considering the lawfulness and merits of any decision taken.

5.5 Manchester Statement of Licensing Policy

5.5.1 Section 4 of the 2003 Act provides that, in carrying out its functions, a licensing authority must 'have regard to' its statement of licensing policy.

- 5.5.2 The Licensing Policy sets out the vision the licensing authority has for the regulation of licensed premises throughout Manchester and outlines the standards expected in order to ensure the promotion of the licensing objectives in the city. The Panel may depart from the policies should it consider doing so would benefit the promotion of the licensing objectives. Reasons are to be given for any such departure from the Policy.
- 5.5.3 Section 4 of the Policy (Operation of the Policy) sets out how the Licensing Policy is intended to be used in practice for licence applications and licensed premises.
- 5.5.4 Relevant to this application and the grounds of the representations made, the Panel are recommended to have regard to the following sections of the Policy:

Section 6: What we aim to encourage

This section identifies certain types of venues and initiatives the licensing authority aims to encourage in order to promote an inclusive evening and night-time economy not simply focused on the consumption of alcohol. We aim to encourage:

- Premises that will extend the diversity of entertainment and attract a wider range of participants
- Live music, especially original material, which will provide a range of live performances and styles of music, provided that such entertainment does not undermine the licensing objectives
- National cultural institutions, global sports events and cultural festivals
- Non-drink-led premises, including restaurants, cafes, theatres and cinemas
- Communication and integration with local residents and businesses through licensees consulting with those in the local area prior to an application
- Participation in Pubwatches, off licence forums and other crime-reduction partnerships
- Engagement with the NITENET radio scheme and DISC secure information sharing platform by city centre venues through the Cityco Manchester Business Crime Reduction Partnership
- Designing out crime in the layout of the premises

Section 7: Local factors

This section sets out key issues that applicants are expected to take into account relevant to the individual characteristics of the premises when preparing their operating schedule and address any local factors relevant to their premises.

Having regard to the grounds of the representations made, the Panel are recommended to have regard to the following Factors:

- Identified risk factors specific to the licensed premises
- The proximity of the premises to local residents and other local businesses, particularly in relation to the potential for nuisance
- Ability to clean and maintain the street scene

Section 8: Manchester's standards to promote the licensing objectives

This section identifies the standards that the licensing authority expects of licensed premises in Manchester. It is recognised that not all standards will be appropriate to apply in every situation to every premises, and applicants are not obliged to include all standards in their operating schedule. The degree to which standards would be appropriate is expected to be proportionate to the risk posed against the promotion of the licensing objectives having regard to the individual circumstances of the premises. The standards are not exhaustive and the licensing authority will have regard to any relevant issues raised in any representation that may fall outside them.

- MS2 Effective general management of the premises
- MS8 Prevent noise nuisance from the premises
- MS9 Effectively manage exterior spaces (e.g. beer gardens, smoking areas, table and chair areas on the highway)
- MS10 Operate effective cleansing arrangements, including ensuring the premises and surrounding area are kept clean and free of litter, and adequate arrangements for the secure and responsible storage of refuse

6. Conclusion

- 6.1 A licensing authority must carry out its functions under this Act ("licensing functions") with a view to promoting the licensing objectives:
 - the prevention of crime and disorder
 - · public safety;
 - the prevention of public nuisance; and
 - the protection of children from harm.
- 6.2 In considering the matter, the Panel should take into account any representations or objections that have been received from responsible authorities or other persons, and representations made by the applicant or premises user as the case may be. In reaching the decision, regard must also be had to relevant provisions of the national guidance and the Council's licensing policy statement.
- 6.3 The Panel must take such of the steps set out below that it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives for each application:
 - To grant the licence subject to the conditions consistent with the operating schedule accompanying the application, which the Panel may modify to such extent as they consider appropriate;
 - b) To reject the whole or part of the application
- 6.4 The conditions consistent with the operating schedule may be modified to alter or omit any of them or to add any new condition, including restricting the times at which licensable activities authorised by the licence can take place.
- 6.5 However, conditions should not be imposed on a licence which are unrelated to the variation sought.

- 6.6 All licensing determinations should be considered on the individual merits of the application.
- 6.7 The Panel's determination should be evidence-based, justified as being appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and proportionate to what it is intended to achieve. Findings on any issues of fact should be on the balance of probability.
- 6.8 It is important that a licensing authority should give comprehensive reasons for its decisions in anticipation of any appeals. Failure to give adequate reasons could itself give rise to grounds for an appeal.
- 6.9 The Panel is asked to determine the applications.



Progress Centre Noise Report 15/04/2023

The purpose of this document is to assess the noise measurements recorded on 15/04/2023 with the intention of working alongside Manchester City Council to mitigate noise nuisance to residents whilst allowing the Progress Centre events to continue effectively over the planned dates.

These are the first measurements taken at the Progress Centre and have been taken due to the noise complaints received on previous events. It is the plan moving forward that every event will have noise measurements taken throughout so we can work effectively with the Council using quantitative data to ensure sound levels remain acceptable.

This report is written by the sound engineer who will be working a large portion of these events.

Measurement types and method

Two types of measurements are being assessed in this report, these are:

- LAeq
- 1/3 Octave dB ranging from 31.5 20,000Hz

Both measurement types were taken over a 1 minute period each time ensuring the music was at a normal point when recording (not during particular points of quiet dependent on the act).

Measurements are also taken at different times of the event in order to assess any changes in the sound level as the event progresses.

The LAeq measurements were used in order to take an average level reading relevant to the human ear. This is a useful tool to gauge the overall level of the music.

1/3 Octave measurements were taken in order to assess more in-depth information on the levels at particular frequencies. This may be very useful going forward as if we are able to find the particular problematic frequencies affecting residents then they can be targeted independently reducing noise issues for residents.

Locations

Three locations have been chosen for these measurements in an attempt to assess the impact on the surrounding area.

It should be noted that these locations were chosen with no knowledge of the actual location of the noise complaints and are instead estimations as to where noise may be an issue. It should also be noted that all these measurements were taken on the ground in public areas and noise levels may differ if you are in a tall flat complex for similar building.

The first location is our 'constant' and will not change moving forward. This will allow for direct comparisons to be made between events in order to ensure we can easily monitor when the sound is becoming too loud.

This first location is onsite of the Progress centre in the direction of the loudspeakers and away from the large areas of people in order to achieve the clearest measurements of the loudspeakers with minimal affect from audience noise.


The second location is at the intersection of Cotter St and Ardwick Green N. This location is behind the direction of the speakers and was chosen due to the residential properties located within close proximity to the Progress Centre.

The third location is Baring Street Carpark which is located next to the 'Unite Students' flats. This location was chosen as it is in the direction of the loudspeakers and next to a large number of residential flats.

Measurements

This section of the report will show plots of the measurements, the tables containing the exact measurements is in the appendix of this document.

Onsite (constant location):



Figure(1) displays the LAeq measurements onsite at Progress Centre at three different times of the night. This shows that the sound level remained largely the same between the hours of 16:20 and 20:50 with only a 1dB(A) increase. This was achieved despite the audience being far larger at 20:50 than 16:20 and likely largely due to the delay speakers put in place for this event. This is also likely to be due to the purposeful reduction in bass frequencies as the music began to get louder therefore reducing the overall average LAeq and reducing the amount of low frequency noise affecting residents.


Figure(2) shows the 1/3 Octave measurements, again measured at 3 separate times throughout the night. We can see lots of crossover in these results and little in the way of a clear change between the different times, this is likely caused by different acts playing different music with different frequency content each time a measurement is taken.


We can however see that on average the low frequencies either remain the same or reduce as the night gets later despite the overall LAeq level increasing slightly. This is likely due to the purposeful reduction in low frequencies as the night got later.

Cotter St:

No readings were taken at Cotter St due to the fact that at all 3 measuring times the music from Progress Centre was inaudible at this location. Whilst this means that the residents near this location are unlikely to be affected by the events, it does not mean that other buildings in this direction such as tall flat complexes are not affected.

Baring Street Carpark:





On first inspection of *Figure(1)* one may assume that the levels from the Progress centre are fluctuating significantly. However, if we compare these measurements with the measurements taken onsite they do not match. In theory, these results should change over time relative to the results taken onsite (for example, if the level onsite increases by 2dB, we should expect to see the level in another also increase by approximately the same amount). This however is not the case here as we see very different changes over time. We can therefore conclude that it is noise from different factors affecting these results. For example, whilst attempts were made to avoid road noise during these measurements, there was definitely road noise close to this location for which almost definitely skewed these results. As the night progressed it should also be noted that other bars close to this location started to play music which may also have skewed the results.

Plan for Future Events:

Moving forward we plan on continuing to measure the sound levels for events at the Progress Centre. The onsite location will remain constant throughout these events in order to remain consistent. This allows us to effectively monitor and control the levels mitigating the noise reaching local residents.

For example, if the council did not receive noise complaint on the 15/04/2023 and are happy with the noise created by the event on this date, we are able to ensure future events have the same treatment and remain at the same level.

We would also like to request of Manchester City Council any information which may help us mitigate noise nuisance. For example, if knowledge of problematic locations or even access to flats is available then this will allow better measurements to be attained. This may allow us to find particular frequencies which are affecting the residents, we would then be able to reduce these specific frequencies therefore reducing the noise nuisance.

Progress Centre Noise Report 15/04/2023

The purpose of this document is to assess the noise measurements recorded on 15/04/2023 with the intention of working alongside Manchester City Council to mitigate noise nuisance to residents whilst allowing the Progress Centre events to continue effectively over the planned dates.

These are the first measurements taken at the Progress Centre and have been taken due to the noise complaints received on previous events. It is the plan moving forward that every event will have noise measurements taken throughout so we can work effectively with the Council using quantitative data to ensure sound levels remain acceptable.

This report is written by the sound engineer who will be working a large portion of these events.

Measurement types and method

Two types of measurements are being assessed in this report, these are:

- LAeq
- 1/3 Octave dB ranging from 31.5 20,000Hz

Both measurement types were taken over a 1 minute period each time ensuring the music was at a normal point when recording (not during particular points of quiet dependent on the act).

Measurements are also taken at different times of the event in order to assess any changes in the sound level as the event progresses.

The LAeq measurements were used in order to take an average level reading relevant to the human ear. This is a useful tool to gauge the overall level of the music.

1/3 Octave measurements were taken in order to assess more in-depth information on the levels at particular frequencies. This may be very useful going forward as if we are able to find the particular problematic frequencies affecting residents then they can be targeted independently reducing noise issues for residents.

Locations

Three locations have been chosen for these measurements in an attempt to assess the impact on the surrounding area.

It should be noted that these locations were chosen with no knowledge of the actual location of the noise complaints and are instead estimations as to where noise may be an issue. It should also be noted that all these measurements were taken on the ground in public areas and noise levels may differ if you are in a tall flat complex for similar building.

The first location is our 'constant' and will not change moving forward. This will allow for direct comparisons to be made between events in order to ensure we can easily monitor when the sound is becoming too loud.

This first location is onsite of the Progress centre in the direction of the loudspeakers and away from the large areas of people in order to achieve the clearest measurements of the loudspeakers with minimal affect from audience noise.


The second location is at the intersection of Cotter St and Ardwick Green N. This location is behind the direction of the speakers and was chosen due to the residential properties located within close proximity to the Progress Centre.

The third location is Baring Street Carpark which is located next to the 'Unite Students' flats. This location was chosen as it is in the direction of the loudspeakers and next to a large number of residential flats.

Measurements

This section of the report will show plots of the measurements, the tables containing the exact measurements is in the appendix of this document.

Onsite (constant location):



Frequency (Hz)

Figure(1) displays the LAeq measurements onsite at Progress Centre at three different times of the night. This shows that the sound level remained largely the same between the hours of 16:20 and 20:50 with only a 1dB(A) increase. This was achieved despite the audience being far larger at 20:50 than 16:20 and likely largely due to the delay speakers put in place for this event. This is also likely to be due to the purposeful reduction in bass frequencies as the music began to get louder therefore reducing the overall average LAeq and reducing the amount of low frequency noise affecting residents.


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
We can however see that on average the low frequencies either remain the same or reduce as the night gets later despite the overall LAeq level increasing slightly. This is likely due to the purposeful reduction in low frequencies as the night got later.

Cotter St:

No readings were taken at Cotter St due to the fact that at all 3 measuring times the music from Progress Centre was inaudible at this location. Whilst this means that the residents near this location are unlikely to be affected by the events, it does not mean that other buildings in this direction such as tall flat complexes are not affected.

Baring Street Carpark:





On first inspection of *Figure(1)* one may assume that the levels from the Progress centre are fluctuating significantly. However, if we compare these measurements with the measurements taken onsite they do not match. In theory, these results should change over time relative to the results taken onsite (for example, if the level onsite increases by 2dB, we should expect to see the level in another also increase by approximately the same amount). This however is not the case here as we see very different changes over time. We can therefore conclude that it is noise from different factors affecting these results. For example, whilst attempts were made to avoid road noise during these measurements, there was definitely road noise close to this location for which almost definitely skewed these results. As the night progressed it should also be noted that other bars close to this location started to play music which may also have skewed the results.

Plan for Future Events:

Moving forward we plan on continuing to measure the sound levels for events at the Progress Centre. The onsite location will remain constant throughout these events in order to remain consistent. This allows us to effectively monitor and control the levels mitigating the noise reaching local residents.

For example, if the council did not receive noise complaint on the 15/04/2023 and are happy with the noise created by the event on this date, we are able to ensure future events have the same treatment and remain at the same level.

We would also like to request of Manchester City Council any information which may help us mitigate noise nuisance. For example, if knowledge of problematic locations or even access to flats is available then this will allow better measurements to be attained. This may allow us to find particular frequencies which are affecting the residents, we would then be able to reduce these specific frequencies therefore reducing the noise nuisance.

Distance between Love Factory main warehouse and residential windows only a few meters.

LOOH have received over 10 separate noise complaints regarding the events in 2021, one was from a residential property over 2 miles away. Officers attended and confirmed the music at several addresses matched that of the premises. This would indicate there is the potential a huge number of people affected who may not have complained.

The removal of Annex 2 Condition 9 would increase the likelihood of noise complaints from the surrounding residents, allowing the premises to operate with amplified music until 01:00 hrs every day of the week, would significantly undermine the public nuisance licensing objective.

The Manchester City Council Statement of Licensing Policy states that:

MS8 Prevent noise nuisance from the premises

Noise disturbance from licensed premises normally arises two ways. The first is in noise breakout from licensed premises themselves, which affects

adjacent properties either via transmission through the structure of the building, or through airborne sound. This can be caused by noise from music, vibration and/or raised voices.

Low-frequency energy is also more transmissible over distance and through building structures and tends not to be present in the background noise environment. The introduction of a low-frequency bass-beat will therefore be more noticeable to nearby residents, particularly late at night.

Consideration should be given to the risk of nuisance from music breakout from the premises and include all appropriate measures. Relevant measures could include:

- The provision of acoustic glazing
- The installation of sound limiters linked to any sound amplification equipment at appropriate levels
- The provision of acoustically treated ventilation
- The installation of an acoustic lobby at entrances and exits to premises to act as a physical barrier between the inside of premises and the outside environment
- Prohibition of the external playing of amplified music
- Restriction of the hours of operation of outside drinking areas
- Establishment of maximum noise levels
- The provision of a scheme of internal acoustic treatment to the premises.

Due to the previous complaints received from residents and the proximity to new residential properties, the LOOH team do not believe the variation to extend opening hours every day and removal of the condition regarding amplified music outside after 20:00 hrs would support the prevention of public nuisance licensing objective and therefore would recommend the application is refused.



long-term residents over 55 years of age, many considerably older, and some

The licence variations, if granted, will therefore make an existing problem a whole lot worse by virtue of later hours and playing of amplified music not just inside the venue, but outdoors as well.

The licence application states that "since the opening of the premises there have been no issues or complaints received regarding the operation". **This is simply untrue.** An examination of the records of the Council's Licensing and Out of Hours Team will reveal that I made a complaint one Saturday early evening last summer. The officer also informed me that some other complaints had been made. After a discussion, an officer was eventually sent out to the premises, thereafter the sound level reduced, but only for about an hour, after which it returned to the former level.

The licence application also states that "A sample noise report has been submitted with the application". I would argue that the Council should not accept this as supporting evidence as:

- 1. There is no guarantee or safeguard to ensure that the noise will actually be kept to those levels at the time of the events. DJ's are known to crank up volumes in response to their audiences' requests and responses.
- 2. The levels are meaningless if they are recorded on the site where they come from rather than in the locations where they are experienced by affected parties. Council's Duty of Care

Manchester City Council Licensing have failed in their Duty of Care to residents in allowing the original licence in the first place. Although the premises are located in an area that was once an industrial part of the city, it is now predominantly a residential area. It is in fact, one of the flagship areas for redevelopment in Manchester, containing a high proportion of residential usage.

I cannot speak for some of the other blocks of flats noted above, but I can confirm that none of the residents in the four Northwards Housing blocks on this site were informed of either the original licence application, or the variations now being proposed, as required by law. I spoke to Cllr Pat Carney a few weeks ago, and it was his view that this probably arose because the premises are in a different ward to where I live. Clearly no thought whatever given to the idea that noise can travel, especially at night. The only reason I became aware of this variation application was because I complained to Premises Licencing immediately following the events last year, and as a result was placed on a mailing list.

Speaking to some other residents, there is a consensus that licencing in Manchester is unduly lax. It seems to them that anything to promote Manchester's young and vibrant image is waved through with little regard for the consequences and only cursory

diligence. We are not "anti-fun"; indeed 25 years ago I might have been attending the premises as a paying customer. But I believe we have the right to enjoy our lives in peace in our own homes. Would you like something like this on your doorstep?

Other Nearby Residents - Objections

As I am the only person who knew about this application, I decided to place a notice in my block and the two nearly ones to explain what the licence variation meant and to invite people to sign their objection. A further 24 objections received will follow on a further joint email after this one. Yes, I am slightly disappointed by the poor response, but I do not have the time to canvass door to door, and it seems not all residents bother to read the notice board. Several people have actually asked why I am bothering as "they won't listen, we don't matter". I have a little more faith in due process and trust that you will give our objections the consideration that they deserve.
