As a local resident I would like to assure you of my support for small, independent local businesses and especially in the Mills; and would love there to be a local cafe close by.

My 2 concerns were:

Drinking outside post 23.00

Music (recorded or live) outside post 23.00

In a residential area I believe these are reasonable concerns. If you are happy to assure me that these two things will not happen I would have no further objections at all and would hope to be able to support your cafe in the future.

If you wish to visit us, please get in touch to make sure we are available. If you don't feel like doing so, I will write a few words about us and address your concerns below.

Bridge 5 Mill is a work and events space and a not for profit organisation, with a focus on social change and sustainable values. For nearly 25 years, we have supported many grassroot organisations, campaigners, charities and institutions with a social and environmental positive impact. Some of the organisations currently renting offices at Bridge 5 Mill are Manchester Carers Centre, Common Word, Sheba Arts, Carbon Coop, People Powered Retrofit, Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament, The Pride Project etc. On the other side, some of the organisations who hired our event spaces recently include GMCA, GMCVO, Innovation Unit, UoM, Nurses United, Homeless link, Mind in Salford, Global Justice Now!, Friends of the Earth to name a few. We are also part of a group of organisations comprising Veg Box People and The Kindling Trust who run Woodbank Community Food Hub in Stockport and the Kindling Farm in Tarbock.

Our largest event room on our top floor has a maximum capacity of 100 and our ground floor two event rooms are 60 and 40 people maximum respectively. All other floors are offices. For context, the Coop Live Arena will have a capacity of 23,500 and the Etihad after expansion nearly 62,000.

We have applied for a premises licence to help us support local community events and groups, such as small gigs, book clubs and other critical thinking and wellbeing activities, in a space that is safe and inclusive. This is also a first step to help us open a small cafe serving organic and local produce foods for the local area. The premises licence will allow us to secure more hires and generate additional income, such as selling beers and ciders throughout the day during a conference for example. We do intend to increase our events, but are not planning to become primarily a bar or a club, as it is not our mission.

Our application, for the purpose of clarity is for the following:

Sale or supply of alcohol Mon-Sun 11.00-00.30

Provision of late night refreshments Mon-Sun 07.00-00.00

Play of recorded music (indoors) Mon-Sun 07.00-01.00

We will not play music outdoors past 23.00 therefore it is not a licensable activity, and not subject to representations on this application.

On the occasion of a late event, we would stop serving at 00.00 and give 30 min for event attendees to finish their drinks - not 1am.

We would normally operate indoors but for some occasions where we may have food and drinks outdoors, we hear your concerns and are willing to restrict the sale or supply of alcohol outdoors past 23.00, including no drinking outdoors past 23.00.

We're confident our activities and our small scale, will continue to be well managed and will not lead to any significant nuisances, and shall there be any unreasonable noise emanating from our premises, we are happy to review our operations.

We hope this addresses your concerns sufficiently and it is all we have to answer for in regards to our premises and application here.

The traffic and density planned for this area (with the Coop Live, Etihad and other residential developments) will inevitably lead to more disturbance at a scale we also as a small organisation are concerned with. We have been advocating for better infrastructure and safety for our area and will continue to do so as part of our consultations for the Neighborhood Development Framework for Holt Town. For your reference, MCC and Canal and River Trust are responsible for the maintenance and improvements of the canal and towpath. We were made aware that part of the plans for the expansion of the Etihad is a collaboration with MCC and Canal and River Trust to develop and improve it. We asked to be kept in the loop. I suggest you consult MCC for these particular concerns.

I would like to raise my concerns about the late licence and especially the outdoor aspect of this licence.

Public safety - the area is poorly lit and on a quiet part of Ashton Canal, late night drinking will cause a public safety risk.

Prevention of public nuisance: This is a residential area and the licence should reflect this. With the outdoor space being on the canal the noise will be carried by the water making this more noisy for residents. This may cause noise nuisance and late night drunk anti-social behaviour.

Prevention harm to children: this residential area has a high proportion of young families, with schools and nurseries - late night noise will effect sleep which causes harm.

A licence until midnight would be more appropriate and no outdoor drinking past 23.00 as is the case in most residential areas (for example the bars in the marina have no drinking outside past 23.00)

Please take these points into consideration.

We have applied for every day of the week because an event may happen on any given day as opposed to operating licensable activities every day. We would not have the capacity for it.

Our application, for the purpose of clarity, is for the following:

Sale or supply of alcohol Mon-Sun 11.00-00.30

Provision of late night refreshments Mon-Sun 07.00-00.00 (for your reference, this is for hot food and hot drinks)

Play of recorded music (indoors) Mon-Sun 07.00-01.00

We will not play music outdoors past 23.00 therefore it is not a licensable activity, and not subject to representations.

On the occasion of a late event, we would stop serving at 00.00 and give 30 min for event attendees to finish their drinks.

We would normally and generally operate indoors but for some occasions where we may have food and drinks outdoors, we hear your concerns and are willing to restrict the sale or supply of alcohol outdoors past 23.00, including no drinking outdoors past 23.00.

We're confident our activities and our small scale, will continue to be well managed and will not lead to any significant nuisance. We don't think Db levels limitations were relevant to us because the play of recorded music is intended as background music (for example at the end of a small fundraising gig), therefore we don't believe there will be any noise emanating from our premises significantly enough for concerns. If this ever happens, we are happy to review our operations.

I would like to make a representation re the Premises License application for Bridge 5 Mill:

Regarding the OUTDOOR provision of regulated entertainment (recorded music) Mon to Sun until 1am, and the OUTDOOR provision of late night refreshments (alcohol) Mon to Sun from 11pm to midnight:

Very supportive of the business' intent to run events with a positive community impact, and expansion of the offering to include refreshments (alcohol) and regulated entertainment - within the indoor spaces.

Further consideration is needed <u>around the outdoor element of the plans; the 'garden</u> area' at the rear of the premises

Therefore, noise from these activities continuing in the outdoor spaces after 11pm would be likely to create a noise nuisance for the neighbouring properties. The application requests permission to serve alcohol and play music both indoors and outdoors from 11pm to midnight/1am every day of the week and at the weekends. There is currently no mitigation proposed to limit the volume of these activities in the outdoor spaces.

Therefore suggest that after 11pm, the provision of late refreshment (alcohol) and regulated entertainment (recorded music) should be limited to the indoor spaces only, to avoid creating a noise nuisance for the existing neighbouring properties.

Dear Sir/Madam,

I strongly object to the license being issued in regards to the following;

- Provision of regulated entertainment (recorded music): Mon to Sun 7am to 1am
- The provision of regulated entertainment (recorded music,) will take place both indoors and outdoors.

My objection is based upon the fact that granting the license mainly goes against "The prevention of public nuisance" objective, along with "Public safety" and "The prevention of crime and disorder" objectives. My arguments against the granting of the license are as follows;

- Significant impact on the quality of life of all those that live nearby due to the venue being able to play music indoors and outdoors for eighteen hours a day, seven days a week
- Five distinct spaces, leading to multiple sources of music.
- There's almost no parking in the area, I know there are transport links but with a proposed capacity of up to 212, this will inevitably lead to an excess of cars parked in the area, that's within the Eastlands Resident Parking Scheme. The surrounding streets are also all double yellows meaning there will be very limited, legal parking options.
- If the garden is the entrance, and presumably also the main exit, this is directly onto the street. Beswick Street is quite a busy street for vehicle traffic, and especially combing with the risk of illegal parking, I believe there to be a considerable road safety risk for those leaving the venue late at night, compounded by the fact patrons will likely have been drinking.
- If granted, as far as I can see and without time to contact yourselves in order to view licenses issued to venues in this area, this would be the only venue this side of the Northern Quarter to have such a license. With all venues closing before 12am, the majority of which by 11pm. So why would Bridge 5 be the exception?
- I believe that the outdoor area, even without music would generate a lot of noise due to the patrons, as this is right on the canal, with no means of dissipating the noise.
- Due to the nature of the mill, canal, and surrounding buildings, sound can very easily travel along the canal, disrupting even more residents.

Further to this, I'd also like to highlight the danger of patrons falling into the canal. There have been a number of deaths in Manchester (2007-2021, 77 bodies were recovered from Manchester canals), where drunk people have fallen into the canal and drowned. I know that there are other venues on the canal, such as Cask and Flawd in New Islington Marina, but the marina is very well lit and has life rings. This stretch of the canal is has neither lighting nor life rings. Plus if the venue can play music outdoors, I fear any cries for help may not be heard.

Please accept this as formal notification of the Greater Manchester Police objection to the premises licence in relation to the above premises on the grounds of Prevention of Crime and Disorder, Public Safety and the Prevention of Public Nuisance.

The application has offered numerous conditions but GMP would ask that extra conditions are attached to the premises licence to better ensure that the 4 licensing objectives are upheld:

The premises shall operate a CCTV system that complies with the minimum requirements of the GMP Licensing Team.

The premises licence holder must ensure that:

- (i) Cameras are located to cover all public areas.
- (ii) The system records clear images enabling the identification of individuals.
- (iii) All recorded footage is securely retained for a minimum period of twenty-eight days.
- (iv) The CCTV system operates at all times the premises are open for licensable activities.
- (v) All equipment must have constant and accurate time and date generation.
- (vi) The CCTV system is fitted with security functions to prevent recordings being tampered with.
- (vii) There is at least one member of trained staff at the premises when licensable activities are taking place able to provide viewable copies on request to police or authorised local authority officers as soon as is reasonably practicable in accordance with all relevant data protection legislation.

SIA security shall be employed at the premises based on a written risk assessment which shall be kept on the premises and made available to Responsible Authorities upon request.

A refusals record must be kept at the premises which details all refusals to sell alcohol. This record must include the date and time of the incident, the name of the staff member who refused the sale, and the reason the sale was refused. All entries must be made within 24 hours of the refusal. The record must be made available for inspection and copying within a reasonable time of a request by an officer of a Responsible Authority.

The Designated Premises Supervisor shall ensure that a written notice of authority is kept at the premises for all staff who sell alcohol. The notice shall be made available for inspection upon request of the police or an authorised officer of the licensing authority and all staff selling alcohol must be in possession of identification to enable to verify their identity against the notice.
