1. Introduction

- 1.1 On 25/03/2024, an application for the grant of a Premises Licence under s17 of the Licensing Act 2003 was made in respect of Royal Vida, Deansgate Court, 244 Deansgate, Manchester, M3 4BQ in the Deansgate ward of Manchester. A location map and photograph of the premises is attached at **Appendix 1**.
- 1.2 A 28-day public consultation exercise was undertaken in accordance with Licensing Act 2003 regulations; requiring the application to be advertised by the displaying of a blue notice at or on the premises, a notice published in a newspaper or similar circulating in the local area, and details of the application published on the Council's website.
- 1.3 Representations may be made for or against an application during the consultation period. To be 'relevant' and, therefore, able to be taken into account in determining the application, they must be about the likely effect of the grant of the premises licence on the promotion of the licensing objectives. Where representations are made by persons who are not a responsible authority, they must not be frivolous or vexatious.
- 1.4 Relevant representations have been received in respect of this application and so it must be determined by a Licensing Hearing Panel in accordance with the Council's Constitution.

2. The Application

- 2.1 A copy of the application is attached at **Appendix 2**.
- 2.2 The applicant is SPV Entertainment Limited.
- 2.3 The description of the premises given by the applicant is: 'The venue is currently licensed as a night time venue with limited days opening. The application is to accommodate the daytime and early evening opening as a restaurant and late evening to early hours as a late night venue.'
- 2.4 The proposed designated premises supervisor is Ali Raza Ahmad.

2.5 The licensable activities applied for:

Provision of regulated entertainment (live music, recorded music, performances of dance and anything of a similar description to live music, recorded music or performances of dance):

Sun to Mon 11am to 2am, Tues 11am to 4am, Weds to Thurs 11am to 2am, Fri to Sat 11am to 4am

The provision of regulated entertainment (live music, recorded music, performances of dance and anything of a similar description to live music, recorded music or performances of dance) will take place indoors.

Provision of late night refreshment:

Sun to Mon 11pm to 2am, Tues 11pm to 4am, Weds to Thurs 11pm to 2am,
Fri to Sat 11pm to 4am

The provision of late night refreshment will take place indoors.

The supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises only:

Sun to Mon 11am to 2am, Tues 11am to 4am, Weds to Thurs 11am to 2am,
Fri to Sat 11am to 4am

Opening hours:

Sun to Mon 11am to 2.30am, Tues 11am to 4.30am, Weds to Thurs 11am to
2.30am, Fri to Sat 11am to 4.30am

2.5.1 In accordance with the Live Music Act 2012 and Deregulation Act 2015, performances of Live Music and Recorded Music between the hours of 0800 and 2300 hours have been deregulated and so should not be regarded as licensable activities for the purposes of this application.

2.5.2 Any further details provided relating to any of the individual licensable activities are specified on the application form at **Appendix 2**.

2.6 **Activities unsuitable for children**

2.6.1 The applicant has not highlighted any adult entertainment or services, activities, other entertainment or matters ancillary to the use of the premises that may give rise to concern in respect of children.

2.7 **Steps to promote the licensing objectives**

2.7.1 The applicant proposes to promote the licensing objectives by taking the steps identified in the operating schedule.

2.7.2 These steps must be translated into conditions by the licensing authority to be included in any granted premises licence, unless the conditions are modified by the Panel following consideration of relevant representations. These conditions are set out in the Schedule of Conditions at **Appendix 4**.

3. **Relevant Representations**

3.1 A total of 23 relevant representations were received in respect of the application (**Appendix 3**). The personal details of all members of the public have been redacted. Original copies of these representations will be available to the Panel at the hearing.

3.2 Summary of the representations:

GMP	<p>One of the registered directors of the applicant company has a live conviction for drink driving so GMP would question the suitability of his holding a premises licence.</p> <p>The premises has operated as a nightclub for a number of years and during this time has attracted a number of complaints from local residents due to noise and disturbance. Extending the days and hours in which the premises can operate would only lead to more complaints. Also, the conditions put forward are less robust than those attached to the existing premises licence.</p>	Refuse
Licensing and Out of Hours Compliance	<p>The premises has operated as a nightclub for a number of years and during this time has attracted a number of complaints from local residents due to noise and disturbance from patrons.</p> <p>When Royal Vida opened, LOOH were advised by the operators that it would operate as a restaurant which would hold dance classes such as salsa. However, they are advertising themselves as a nightclub on social media and it appears that this is also how they are operating. Granting this licence would very likely increase public nuisance, crime and disorder and antisocial behaviour.</p>	Refuse
Neighbourhoods Team	<p>The late opening hours proposed by this application would likely lead to an increase in noise nuisance for local residents. Also, the premises under its current licence has been operating more as a nightclub than was originally suggested, as such residents do not feel the premises has been</p>	Refuse

Deansgate Ward Councillors	This location is unsuitable for a nightclub due to there being a large number of residents who live nearby. When the premises was operating as History, residents experienced a lot of disturbance from patrons causing noise and engaging in antisocial and sometimes illegal behaviour, e.g. drug dealing. From recent advertising, it appears that this premises would attract similar clientele.	Refuse
Residents (x19)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Granting this premises licence would lead to an increase in crime and disorder. When the premises was operating as History nightclub, there was drug dealing and violence both inside and outside of the club, which as well as being illegal seriously impacted the quality of life of residents living nearby. The location is not suitable for a nightclub. • The surrounding area is already subjected to high levels of anti-social behaviour (e.g. littering, public urination, shouting in the early hours of the morning, fighting, parking in private spaces, graffiti, loitering) and this would only be exacerbated should the hours applied for be granted. • There are children living on the residential estate where the premises is, and incidents of illegal and/or antisocial behaviour would have a detrimental impact on their wellbeing, affecting for example their ability to sleep (due to noise). • The main entrance to the premises being on Longworth St rather than Deansgate is also objected to; the Deansgate entrance is considered to be more suitable and could reduce some of the problems 	Refuse

Using the Longworth St entrance on the other hand would likely cause issues of queue management.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • At a previous meeting residents were told the premises would operate as a restaurant with dance classes such as salsa being offered, however promotional material on social media suggests the premises wants to operate (and already is) as a nightclub. 	
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3.3 Any conditions proposed by objectors are set out in the Schedule of Conditions at **Appendix 4**.

4. **Key Policies and Considerations**

4.1 **Legal Considerations**

4.1.1 Hearings under the Licensing Act 2003 operate under the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

4.2 **New Information**

4.2.1 In accordance with Regulation 18 of the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005, the authority may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice either before the hearing or, with the consent of all parties, at the hearing.

4.3 **Hearsay Evidence**

4.3.1 The Panel may accept hearsay evidence and it will be a matter for the Panel to attach what weight to it that they consider appropriate. Hearsay evidence is evidence of something that a witness neither saw nor heard, but has heard or read about.

4.4 **The Secretary of State's Guidance to the Licensing Act 2003**

4.4.1 The Secretary of State's Guidance to the Licensing Act 2003 is provided for all parties involved in licensing. It is a key medium for promoting best practice, ensuring consistent application of licensing powers across England and Wales and for promoting fairness, equal treatment and proportionality.

4.4.2 Section 4 of the 2003 Act provides that, in carrying out its functions, a licensing authority must 'have regard to' guidance issued by the Secretary of State under section 182. The Guidance is therefore binding on all licensing authorities to that extent. However, the Guidance cannot anticipate every possible scenario or set of circumstances that may arise and, as long as

licensing authorities have properly understood this Guidance, they may depart from it if they have good reason to do so and can provide full reasons.

4.4.3 Departure from the Guidance could give rise to an appeal or judicial review, and the reasons given will then be a key consideration for the courts when considering the lawfulness and merits of any decision taken.

4.5 **Manchester Statement of Licensing Policy**

4.5.1 Section 4 of the 2003 Act provides that, in carrying out its functions, a licensing authority must 'have regard to' its statement of licensing policy.

4.5.2 The Licensing Policy sets out the vision the licensing authority has for the regulation of licensed premises throughout Manchester and outlines the standards expected in order to ensure the promotion of the licensing objectives in the city. The Panel may depart from the policies should it consider doing so would benefit the promotion of the licensing objectives. Reasons are to be given for any such departure from the Policy.

4.5.3 Section 4 of the Policy (Operation of the Policy) sets out how the Licensing Policy is intended to be used in practice for licence applications and licensed premises.

4.5.4 Relevant to this application and the grounds of the representations made, the Panel are recommended to have regard to the following sections of the Policy:

Section 6: What we aim to encourage

This section identifies certain types of venues and initiatives the licensing authority aims to encourage in order to promote an inclusive evening and night-time economy not simply focused on the consumption of alcohol. We aim to encourage:

- Premises that will extend the diversity of entertainment and attract a wider range of participants
- Live music, especially original material, which will provide a range of live performances and styles of music, provided that such entertainment does not undermine the licensing objectives
- National cultural institutions, global sports events and cultural festivals
- Non-drink-led premises, including restaurants, cafes, theatres and cinemas
- Communication and integration with local residents and businesses through licensees consulting with those in the local area prior to an application
- Participation in Pubwatches, off licence forums and other crime-reduction partnerships
- Engagement with the NITENET radio scheme and DISC secure information sharing platform by city centre venues through the Cityco Manchester Business Crime Reduction Partnership
- Designing out crime in the layout of the premises

Section 7: Local factors

This section sets out key issues that applicants are expected to take into account relevant to the individual characteristics of the premises when preparing their operating schedule and address any local factors relevant to their premises.

Having regard to the grounds of the representations made, the Panel are recommended to have regard to the following Factors:

- Identified risk factors specific to the licensed premises
- Evidence of pre-existing problems in the area
- Consistency with relevant Council strategies
- The proximity of the premises to local residents and other local businesses, particularly in relation to the potential for nuisance
- Ability to clean and maintain the street scene

Section 8: Manchester's standards to promote the licensing objectives

This section identifies the standards that the licensing authority expects of licensed premises in Manchester. It is recognised that not all standards will be appropriate to apply in every situation to every premises, and applicants are not obliged to include all standards in their operating schedule. The degree to which standards would be appropriate is expected to be proportionate to the risk posed against the promotion of the licensing objectives having regard to the individual circumstances of the premises. The standards are not exhaustive and the licensing authority will have regard to any relevant issues raised in any representation that may fall outside them.

- MS1 Implement effective security measures at the premises
- MS2 Effective general management of the premises
- MS3 Responsible promotion and sale of alcohol
- MS4 Prevent the use of illegal drugs, new psychoactive substances (NPS) and the spiking of drinks at the premises
- MS5 Prevent on-street consumption of alcohol
- MS6 Provide a Duty of Care for intoxicated or vulnerable customers and medical emergencies
- MS7 Maintain a safe capacity
- MS8 Prevent noise nuisance from the premises
- MS9 Effectively manage exterior spaces (e.g. beer gardens, smoking areas, table and chair areas on the highway)

5. Conclusion

5.1 A licensing authority must carry out its functions under this Act ("licensing functions") with a view to promoting the licensing objectives:

- the prevention of crime and disorder
- public safety;
- the prevention of public nuisance; and
- the protection of children from harm.

5.2 In considering the matter, the Panel should take into account any representations or objections that have been received from responsible authorities or other persons, and representations made by the applicant or

premises user as the case may be. In reaching the decision, regard must also be had to relevant provisions of the national guidance and the Council's licensing policy statement.

- 5.3 Having regard to the representations, the Panel must take such of the steps set out below that it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:
- a) To grant the licence subject to:
 - i. the conditions consistent with the operating schedule accompanying the application, which the Panel may modify to such extent as they consider appropriate, and
 - ii. any mandatory conditions that must be included in the licence;
 - b) To exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;
 - c) To refuse to specify the person proposed in the application as the designated premises supervisor;
 - d) To reject the application.
- 5.4 The conditions consistent with the operating schedule may be modified to alter or omit any of them or to add any new condition, including restricting the times at which licensable activities authorised by the licence can take place.
- 5.5 All licensing determinations should be considered on the individual merits of the application.
- 5.6 The Panel's determination should be evidence-based, justified as being appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and proportionate to what it is intended to achieve. Findings on any issues of fact should be on the balance of probability.
- 5.7 It is important that a licensing authority should give comprehensive reasons for its decisions in anticipation of any appeals. Failure to give adequate reasons could itself give rise to grounds for an appeal.
- 5.8 **The Panel is asked to determine the application.**
